Promote second-rung leadership in Punjab: AICC

Committee submits report to Sonia ahead of election

A report submitted by an All India Congress Committee (AICC) panel to party president Sonia Gandhi has said that the Congress needs to actively promote secondrung leaders in Punjab, where an Assembly election is slated for early next year.

The report, submitted on Thursday, said Chief Minister Captain Amarinder Singh is the tallest leader in the State but it was important to accommodate all sections.

A role for Sidhu

The panel's suggestion that the Chief Minister should give importance to other

leaders is being seen as a move to rehabilitate Navjot Singh Sidhu.

A final decision on how to accommodate Mr. Sidhu, who has been at the forefront of dissidence against Capt. Singh, has been left to Ms. Gandhi.

Bihar in fudging row as COVID toll jumps by 72% after recount

RJD hits out at Nitish Kumar govt. for massive rise in casualties in a single day

Bihar's Opposition on Thursday accused the Nitish Kumar government of fudging data after the COVID-19 death toll in the State jumped by a whopping 72.84% after a recount by the authorities.

After the revised figures were released, the Opposition Rashtriya Janata Dal (RJD) accused Chief Minister Nitish Kumar of fudging data. The government, however, said its "intent was to reach out to family members of the deceased".

On June 7, the official figure for COVID-19 deaths was 5,424. But the next day, the government said the figure had gone up to 9,375 after it recounted deaths in all the 38 districts.

In the verification exercise that lasted 15-20 days, the government added 3,951 more deaths. Most of them happened in the second wave of COVID-19 since April 2021, said health officials.

The Health Department also revised the number of recovered patients to 7,01,234 from 6,98,397 reported on June 7. The recovery rate, which was 98.7% on June 7, too, came down to 97.65% on June 9.

Among the districts, Patna had the highest death toll

with 2,303, followed by Muzaffarpur with 609 fatalities, Nalanda (463), Begusarai (454), East Champaran (425), Darbhanga (342) and Madhubani (317).

Taking potshots at the government, RJD chief Lalu Prasad tweeted in Hindi, "Nitish became fake by fudging data that brought immense worldwide disgrace but he did not feel ashamed."

Mr. Prasad's younger son and Leader of the Opposition in the Assembly, Tejashwi Yadav, tweeted: "When you get caught, the death toll rose by 4,000 in a single day. Whatever the Nitish government is telling about death toll data, there has been 20% more deaths... When Nitish government is fake, data too will be fake.

Health Minister Mangal Pandey said, "We got to know from various sources that those who died [due to COVID-19] could be more in number. After consultations with the stakeholders, the government instructed the district administrations to identify institutional deaths due to COVID-19." The intent of the exercise was to reach out to the family members of the deceased, he said.

'Intent is clean'

Senior BJP leader and party Rajya Sabha member Sushil Kumar Modi also said "the intent of the government was clean, so it updated the data of COVID-19 death toll".

"The updated data was not released by any investigating agency but by the Health Department and its intent was to provide ₹4 lakh compensation to the family members of all deceased and other help to them," he said. "If the Opposition's allegation of data fudging is right, the government would not have constituted a team to collect right data, neither would it have mustered the courage to update it."

"The spurt in the number of deaths reflects deaths reported at private hospitals, in transit to health facilities, in home isolation and those dying of post COVID-19 complications after they tested negative and were discharged from hospitals," Additional Secretary (health) Pratyaya Amrit said.

Rumours of Cabinet reshuffle at Centre also doing rounds

NEW DELHI

Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath's arrival in New Delhi for a two-day visit, including appointments lined up with Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Union Home Minister Amit Shah, has set off a buzz over a possible Cabinet expansion in Lucknow.

Mr. Adityanath's visit to the national capital comes just a few days after the BJP's national general secretary (organisation), B.L. Santhosh, was in Lucknow

on a stocktaking visit. Speculation of a Cabinet reshuffle at the Centre was also doing the rounds with BJP president J.P. Nadda holding a one-on-one meeting on Thursday with the

Second wave

While Mr. Adityanath's aides insisted that the visit was related to the second wave of the COVID-19 pandemic and raising the de-

mand for a larger allocation of vaccines to the State, they admitted that "after all that happened last week, political issues were and will be discussed".

Corrective measures

Mr. Santhosh's report to Mr. Nadda was on the work culture in Mr. Adityanath's Chief Minister's Office and the corrective measures needed, which included being more accommodative of the party's allies in the State, in the run-up the 2022 Assembly poll.

The performance of the BJP in the recently concluded panchayat polls in the State, where it came second to the Samajwadi Party, was also underlined as a worrying situation.

13 inmates in Agra jail move apex court for freedom, dignity

They started their 14 to 22 year stretches in prison as juveniles

Thirteen persons who started their 14 to 22 year stretches in the Agra Central Jail as juveniles have moved the Supreme Court for their freedom and dignity.

The writ petition, filed through advocate Rishi Malhotra, highlighted the "very unfortunate and sorry state of affairs" in Uttar Pradesh, where many prisoners allegedly continued to languish in jail despite proving their claim of juvenility.

An accused can raise a claim of juvenility at any stage of a criminal trial or even any time after his conviction and sentence for a crime. If the claim is found true, the court should maintain the conviction, but set

aside the sentence and forward the case to the Juvenile Justice Board. A juvenile can be punished only for a maximum period of three years.

'Clear rulings'

According to the petition, there were "clear and unchallenged rulings" from the Juvenile Justice Board declaring the 13 prisoners as juveniles at the time of the commission of their crimes.

"Yet, no steps have been taken to release them forthwith. The miseries are further compounded by the fact that these petitioners who are languishing in Agra Central Jail have already undergone judicial incarceration for periods ranging from 14 to 22 years," the petition said. Mr. Malhotra said they had

The claim of juvenility can be raised in appeal, even if not pressed before the trial court, and can be raised for the first time before the Supreme Court, though not pressed before the trial court and in the appellate court," the petition said, referring to a 2012 judgment of the apex

Odisha's tribals flee village fearing jab

Despite awareness drives, villagers were misled by posts on social media

Tribals in Odisha's Rayagada district fled the village after locking up their houses to avoid taking the COVID-19 vaccine. The incident took place at Champakana, under Kolnara block of Rayagada, on Wednesday.

The district administration had held an awareness camp, explaining the benefits of inoculation.

"However, when our team reached the village with 100 doses for those aged above 45, it did not find anyone available. Four to five villagers present there were not ready to take the jab," said D. Sailaja, Kolnara medical of-

Hesitancy has been a major issue for district administrations across the State.

Last month, the Rayagada district administration had to sit with the Dongria

Kondhs, a Particularly Vul-Tribal (PVTG), for days to make them agree to vaccination. Close to 1,000 Dongria Kondhs have so far been administered the vaccine.

Tough to convince

Similarly, it was difficult to convince Chuktia Bhunjia, another PVTG residing in the Sunabeda plateau of Nuapada district, on vaccination. The tribesmen said they feared they would die soon after getting the jab. Odisha has so far man-

aged to administer the first dose to 9,68,188 people aged between 18 and 44. Only 3,70,095 have received the second dose. 54,34,038 people aged above 45 have been inoculated, 11,22,935 have been given the second dose.

Buddhadeb Dasgupta passes away

His films took the audience beyond realism and and delved into magic realism

Buddhadeb Dasgupta, one of the most original icons of cinema, who helped put Indian cinema on the global stage, passed away in Kolkata on Thursday. The 77-yearold director had been suffering from kidney-related ailments for some time. He is survived by his wife, filmmaker Sohini Dasgupta, and two daughters.

Dasgupta graduated from the Scottish Church College in Kolkata and started his career as a lecturer in economics. However, he switched to making documentaries in the late 1960s. His first feature film was Dooratwa (1978). Feted with several national and international awards, his seminal works across languages include



Born in Purulia in 1944,

Phera (1988), Bagh Bahadur (1989), *Tahader* (1992), Charachar (1994), Uttara (2000), Mondo Meyer Upakhyan (2002), Kalpurush (2005) and Tope (2016). He will be remembered among the greats of Indian cinema that Bengal has produced, including the legendary Ritwik Ghatak and Mrinal Sen.

temporary Govindan Ara-Dasgupta brought Indian cinema back on the international stage after the death of Satyajit Ray in 1992, winning several international accolades.

Many awards He won 12 national awards

and was twice nominated for the prestigious Golden Bear at the Berlin International Film Festival for *Phera* in 1988 and Charachar in 1994. In 2007, he was given the Golden Athena Award at the Athens International Film Festival. A year later, he was conferred with the Lifetime Achievement Award at the Spain International Film Festival in Madrid.

The filmmaker, however, never liked comparison with legends like Ray and Sen, and preferred to be thought of alongside his great con-

vindan (1935-1991). In his interviews, Dasgupta considered himself from the generation of filmmakers like Aravindan, Adoor Gopalakrishnan and Shyam Benegal.

Film genius

The subject and treatment of his films took the audience beyond realism and delved into magic realism, and at times, surrealism. Drawn from Bengali literature, his use of images, and at times non-linear narrative, added an element of fantasy, amalgamating magic realism and lyricism of poetry in films.

An acclaimed poet, too. Dasgupta emphasised that the most important aspect of a film was not its story but the "image".

Plea in HC to postpone FMGE screening test

The Association of MD Physicians has asked the Delhi High Court to postpone the Foreign Medical Graduate Examination (FMGE) screening test scheduled for June 18 due to the prevailing COVID-19 situation in the country.

The association contended that there are a limited number of cities being notified as centres for the FMGE screening test and a large number of candidates will be forced to travel without having received even one dose of vaccine.

The petition was opposed by the National Board of Examination (NBE) and the National Medical Commission (NMC) saying that it was only a qualifying exam which can be taken even in December, if not in June and the test should not be postponed at the behest of a candidates.

FIR registered after students break into JNU library, clash with staffers

University to take disciplinary action against students; none arrested so far

The Jawaharlal Nehru University administration on Thursday alleged that a group of students broke into the central library and clashed with the staffers following which an FIR was registered with the police.

The university claimed that the students have been occupying the library for the last two days. The chief proctor office has been tasked with taking necessary disciplinary action against these students as per the university rules, it said.

According to the police, the incident took place on June 8 and based on a complaint from the university's Chief Security Officer, a case registered Wednesday.

Deputy Commissioner of Police (South West) Ingit Pratap Singh said: "Based on the complaint, a case was registered under Section 188 (disobedience to order duly promulgated by public servant) not vacate the building even during the night.

COVID norms flouted

"When no amount of persua-

sion by the librarian and the security personnel convinced these students against violating the law and CO-VID-19 guidelines, the JNU security office lodged a police complaint in view of the seriousness of the issue. It has been found that these students do not even use masks or follow other COVID-19 related guidelines," the university statement said.

The curfew imposed by the Delhi government is still in place and no new guidelines have yet been announced regarding resuming normal academic activities, it

In a statement, the university said: "This [incident] has caused health risk for library staffers and even other students residing in the hostels, since these unruly students return to hostel for lunch and dinner or other purposes."

"The students occupying the space are not permitting library staffers to sanitise the building for making it safer for students who will use the library after restoration of normalcy. All these students are instructed to vacate the library immediately," it said.

A student, requesting anonymity, said: "The library has not opened for a long time, which has left PhD students frustrated. Students have their submissions due and have not been able to access the library. The students entered the library but there was no violence." Meanwhile, JNU Students'

Union (JNUSU) termed the varsity's action as an "intimidation tactic" and demanded withdrawal of the FIR. In a statement issued, the students' body said: "The JNUSU reiterates that the university administration must reopen the library at the earliest. The administration must also withdraw the FIR and focus on issues faced by the JNU

Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia, who also holds the education portfolio, said that while students in Class 8 were promoted without any hassle due to the no detention policy, roadblocks in the promotion of students in Classes 9 and 12 needed to be curbed.

According to Mr. Sisodia, all students who gave their mid-term exams in only one subject or were unable to give mid-term exams in any subject and students, who did not receive minimum qualifying marks, will be eligible for reassessment. Such students, he said, will be assessed through assignments, projects or schoolbased tests for promotion to the next higher class and no additional physical or online assessment will be conducted for these students.

"Admissions to Delhi government schools will begin from July 5 onwards based on the registration of students. Students who are unable to register in the given date will be eligible to register in the second admission cycle which will begin from July 23 to August 6," he also

A Delhi court on Thursday dismissed the bail plea of two accused in a murder case related to the 2020 north-east Delhi riots, noting that the allegations against the duo are serious in nature.

Additional Sessions Judge

Vinod Yadav junked the plea filed by Rashid and Shoaib who are accused in the murder case of waiter Dilbar Negi whose body was found charred at a local sweet shop.

While denying relief to them, the judge relied on the chargesheet, CCTV footage and video footage played in

the court by the prosecution and defence, respectively. "It is prima facie clear that the applicants were part of unlawful assembly which was responsible for putting on fire the godown in which deceased Dilbar Negi

there," the court said. It said both the accused were clearly visible in the CCTV footage carrying a rod in their hands in an agitated posture and instigating other members of the riotous mob. The court said that it is also apparent that the riotous mob armed carrying lethal weapons had engaged in vandalism and looting with a

main objective to cause maximum damage to the lives and properties of persons belonging to other community.

'The nature of allegations against the applicants are very serious. I do not find it to be a fit case for grant of bail to both the applicants at this stage," the judge said.

Carjackers arrested from Meerut after dramatic chase

Key accused snatched service pistol and fired at police, but was caught

Three men wanted in a carjacking case were arrested after a dramatic chase in Uttar Pradesh's Meerut, the police said on Thursday. The main accused got shot in his leg while trying to escape after snatching a service pistol during a visit to the crime scene, they said.

The accused were identified as Mohan (26), Anmol (20) and Satish (27), all residents of Sonipat in Haryana, they said. The robbed car, two stolen mobile phones and the pistol used in the offence with seven live cartridges were recovered, officers said.

According to the police, in the early hours of Wednesday, they received information regarding a carjacking incident with three persons threatening the driver at gunpoint. Part of murder plan

Mr. Singh stated that on June 1, his son Aman had gone

to market, but did not return home. On June 3 around, he received a call from his son who claimed that he had been kidnapped and the kidnapper was demanding ₹3 lakh as ransom.

During probe, the location of alleged mobile phone was tracked to Jalandhar following which a team was sent there. He was traced and brought back to the Capital on Sunday, police said.

"During interrogation, it came to the knowledge that Aman, who is a small time car dealer, wanted to sell a car owned by one Ravi. On June 1, Aman went to Hisar in Haryana where his friend Ankit along with the purchaser met him. The buyer handed over ₹2 lakh to Aman and he kept the money in a bag. Ravi cheated Aman, snatched the bag and escaped," DCP (outer north) Rajiv Ranjan Singh

The buyer was putting pressure on Aman to return the money. Later, Aman went to Ialandhar with Ankit and started working as a labourer. He thought that he won't be able to return the money with the job and hence staged the kidnapping, police said.

Father's untimely demise turns youth's life upside down

Kuldeep was planning to pursue higher studies in Canada, which was his father's dream, but now has to rethink

An 18-year-old resident of Laxmi Nagar, Kuldeep Chand, now has the weight of his family on his shoulders. Gurbax Singh, a private taxi driver, had died unexpectedly due to COVID-19, leaving behind his wife, Kuldeep and another son.

A helpless Kuldeep took to his Twitter handle and sought help. Among those who noticed was Delhi Police Commissioner S.N. Shrivastava, who, with the help of the force, arranged ₹10,000 for the youth, now temporarily residing in Punjab.

Recalling the night of April 27 that changed his life, he said his father Gurbax Singh complained of chest pain and breathlessness. He, his brother Gurpreet (16) and his mother Kulpreet took him to a nearby nursing home, but his oxygen levels had dropped to 40.

"We didn't know what to do. Doctor asked us to arrange for an oxygen cylinder fearing he had contracted COVID-19. I

tried over 500 numbers but couldn't arrange one. That day, the world proved to be so selfish. One person said he'll sell the cylinder for ₹60,000," Kuldeep recalled.

Left clueless

A gurdwara in Indirapuram arranged oxygen for a few hours. But when the family was on its way to a hospital to admit him the next morning, he passed

away. In a few seconds, Kuldeep's world turned upside down. He was all set to go to Canada for higher studies. He is now clueless about sustaining his family. Kuldeep, a secondyear undergraduate from IG-NOU, took the father's body to Punjab's Rupnagar – their hometown – for cremation.

"It was my father's dream to send me to Canada so that I can settle there and eventually take the whole family. I cracked my English proficiency test and also got admission to a college. My father took loans from friends and managed to pay the first instalment but the next is due in July," he said, adding that over ₹4 lakh have been paid and another ₹4 lakh was due.

Besides, he is crushed by the memories of his father. His father used to address everyone as 'sir' or 'madam', used to wait outside offices and it was his dream to hear someone address his father as 'sir' one day. "But everything seems so blurry now. I am only 18 and suddenly I have the full responsibility of my family, of my brother's college education, my mother's health, and my own career," he said.

Staying back

Kuldeep said his relatives have suggested they stay back in Punjab, where they can do farming. But Kuldeep doesn't want to put to waste his and his brother's education. So the family has resolved to return to Delhi next week.

But unable to find any glimmer of light at the end of the tunnel, he tweeted on Wednesday, "i am kuldeep from new delhi as my father was a taxi driver and he recently expired as i left with my mom and younger brother. We are going through the worst days of life, our situation is getting worst day by day please contact us [sic]."

He had tagged Delhi Police, which immediately sent an officer who was in Punjab for work. The force helped him with ₹10,000, which Kuldeep has decided to keep for emer-

"When we go back to Delhi, I'll have some emergency needs. I'll keep this money for who said if he is unable to go to

then. I am very thankful to Delhi Police for it," said Kuldeep, Canada, he'll pursue Civil Service and work simultaneously to sustain his family.

Breakthrough infections are occurrences of COVID 14 days after taking both jabs

A study done by faculty members of a government medical college says that nearly one in nine healthcare workers contracted CO-VID-19 infection, even after receiving both shots of a vac-

The study is yet to be peer reviewed and has currently appeared in preprint on an online platform. As per the study done by faculty of Delhi government's Maulana Medical College Azad (MAMC), 36 of 326 healthcare workers at a Delhi hospital, who were part of the study, had breakthrough CO-VID-19 infections.

Breakthrough infections are occurrences of CO-VID-19, 14 days after taking both doses of a vaccine.

"A total of 36 breakthrough infections were reported in the HCWs (healthworkers)... Furthermore, COVID-19 infections occurred in 65 HCWs vaccinated with at

"Most breakthrough infection cases [94.4%] were mild and did not require supplemental oxygen therapy. Conclusion: nearly one in nine HCWs experienced a CO-VID-19 breakthrough infection in the present study," it further read.

The study also warned that since infection status of the HCWs was based on selfreport, mostly symptomatic breakthrough infections diagnosed with RT-PCR test were likely to be captured, while asymptomatic infections were potentially omit-

"The authorities appear to have taken the matter lightly treating the filing of a status report to be a formality. The tribunal expected meaningful action on the ground level which has not been taken in spite of long time available after the last hearing and finalisation of the SOP by the CPCB long back," the Bench

The Chief Secretary was also directed to furnish a compliance report by October 22.

The directions came when the green panel was hearing a plea moved by petitioner Abhay Dahiya and others against illegal dumping and burning of garbage and discharge of untreated water by several establishments, including restaurants.

Earlier, the tribunal had directed authorities to expedite the setting up of solid waste treatment plant for the management of waste generated by the restaurants and had questioned why a decentralised treatment plant had not been set up by the eateries in the area.

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Haryana moved backwards under BJP rule: Deepender

'It only leads in crime, unemployment'

written assurance for the release of our pending salary but the other demands such as regularisation of job of the Special Tiger Protection Force and other contingency staff who completed more than 15 years of service of the department have not been met."

The union hoped the government would not force its members to raise their voices again.

"Please know that the entire department and the State government have their greatest concern for the welfare of its frontline staff. You are hereby requested to call off the strike and get back to your respective camps and duties..." the letter from PCCF R.K. Singh said.



The Chief Minister said a monthly financial assistance of ₹ 3,500, to be realised from the fixed deposit, would be given to each beneficiary child till he or she attained 24 years of age. The principal amount would be credited to the bank account of each child after turning 24. The ₹ 3,500 included the Central government support



Maharashtra govt. clears action plan to protect heritage trees

State to amend Act to preserve trees more than 50 years old in urban areas

STAFF REPORTER

The Maharashtra Cabinet on Thursday passed an action plan to protect and preserve trees older than 50 years in urban areas by terming them heritage trees.

The plan includes the concept of heritage tree and plan of action for conservation; method to define age of the tree; compensatory plantation; rules to be followed before hacking trees; formation of the Maharashtra Tree Authority; structure of the local tree authority and their duties; tree census; fixing land of tree plantation; transplantation of trees; and tree cess and fine to be charged.

The State will also bring about amendments in the Maharashtra (Urban Area) Protection and Preservation of Trees Act. As per the plan, trees older than 50 will be termed heritage trees. The Environment and Climate Change Department will issue guidelines in consultation with the State Forest Department based on the existing methods.

Compensatory plantation will include planting the number of trees equivalent to the age of trees to be cut. The saplings need to be six to eight feet in height while planting and they will undergo geo-tagging with seven years of caring period. The option of monetary compensation has also been given, instead of compensatory plantation.

A State-level Tree Authority will be formed to protect and preserve heritage trees. The authority will hear applications seeking permission to cut 200 or more trees that are five or more years old. The local tree authorities will come under this bo-

CHIME telescope yields unprecedented results

Scientific collaboration detects more than 500 mysterious fast radio bursts in its first year of operation

Scientists with the Canadian Hydrogen Intensity Mapping Experiment (CHIME) Collaboration, who include researchers at the Punebased Tata Institute for Fundamental Research (TIFR) and the National Centre for Radio Astrophysics (NCRA), have assembled the largest collection of fast radio bursts (FRBs) in the telescope's first FRB catalogue.

While catching sight of an FRB is considered a rare thing in the field of radio astronomy, prior to the CHIME project, radio astronomers had only caught sight of around 140 bursts in their scopes since the first FRB was spotted in

FRBs are oddly bright flashes of light, registering in the radio band of the electromagnetic spectrum,

which blaze for a few milliseconds before vanishing without a trace. These brief and mysterious beacons have been spotted in various and distant parts of the universe, as well as in our own galaxy. Their origins are unknown and their appearance is highly unpredictable. But the advent of the

CHIME project – a large stationary radio telescope in British Columbia, Canada has been a game changer and has nearly quadrupled the number of fast radio bursts discovered to date. With more observations, astronomers hope soon to pin down the extreme origins of these curiously bright signals.

The telescope has detected a whopping 535 new fast radio bursts in its first year of operation itself, between 2018 and 2019.

"Before CHIME came along, different telescopes

had observed a handful of FRBs each, but with their own selection criteria and software. But now, with the help of CHIME, we can observe a large swathe of the sky round the clock and were able to detect FRBs at an unprecedented rate. We could gather the first large sample of FRBs with a single instrument and a single, well-understood selection

criteria which is allowing us to get a far better understanding of the properties of the FRBs as a population," said CHIME/ FRB member Shriharsh Tendulkar, also a faculty member at the TIFR-NCRA.

The new catalogue significantly expands the current library of known FRBs, and is already yielding clues as to their properties.

For instance, the newly discovered bursts appear to fall in two distinct classes: those that repeat, and those that don't. Scientists have identified 18 FRB sources that burst repeatedly, while the rest appear to be one-

When the scientists mapped their locations, they found the bursts were evenly distributed in space, seeming to arise from any and all parts of the sky. From the FRBs that CHIME was able to detect, the scientists calculated that bright fast radio bursts occur at a rate of about 800 per day across the entire sky the most precise estimate of FRBs overall rate to date. The first FRB catalogue is

to be presented later this week at the American Astronomical Society Meeting. Mr. Tendulkar said that observations showed that the repeaters looked different, with each burst

lasting slightly longer and emitting more focused radio frequencies than bursts from single, non-repeating FRBs.

"We find that repeaters emit bursts of longer duration with the radiation being detected in a narrower range of frequencies compared to the one-off FRBs. These differences strongly suggest that emission from repeaters and non-repeaters is generated either by different physical mechanisms or in different astrophysical environments," said Pragya Chawla, a Ph.D. candidate at McGill University and a member of the CHIME team.

CHIME comprises four massive cylindrical radio antennas, roughly the size and shape of snowboarding half-pipes, located at the Dominion Radio Astrophysical Observatory, operated by the National Research Council of Canada in British Columbia. The telescope receives radio signals each day from half of the sky as the Earth rotates.

While most radio astronomy is done by swivelling a large dish to focus light from different parts of the sky, CHIME stares, motionless, at the sky, and focuses incoming signals using a correlator – a powerful digital signal processor that can work through huge amounts of data, at a rate of about seven terrabytes per second, equivalent to a few per cent of the world's Internet traffic.

"Digital signal processing is what makes CHIME able to reconstruct and 'look' in thousands of directions simultaneously. That is what helps us detect FRBs a thousand times more often than a traditional telescope," says Kiyoshi Masui, Assistant Professor of Physics at the Massachusetts Institute of

Technology (MIT), who will lead the group's conference presentation at the American Astronomical Society Meeting.

For each of the 535 FRBs that CHIME detected, Professor Masui and his colleagues measured its dispersion and found that most bursts likely originated from far-off sources within distant galaxies.

The fact that the bursts were bright enough to be detected by CHIME suggests that they must have been produced by extremely energetic sources, he said. As the telescope detects more FRBs, scientists hope to pin down exactly what kind of exotic phenomena could generate such ultra bright, ultra fast signals.

According to Professor Masui, the scientists plan to use the bursts, and their dispersion estimates, to map the distribution of gas throughout the universe.

Seeds and fruits

A mechanism for CMs to cooperate on issues of Centre-State relations is welcome

Test Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee's call for cooperation among non-NDA counterparts in other States to support farmers agitating against three controversial laws made in June 2020 seems part of a larger political project. It is meant to go beyond aiding the farmers, who fear that these laws could make them more vulnerable to market fluctuations. But the focus on farm laws, which the Government says would make farming more competitive and remunerative, is an important start. While the Government reiterated this week that MSP for various crops would continue, the fact remains that regardless of the merits of these laws, they were made without adequate consultations with parties, States and the stakeholders. After a meeting with farmer leaders from Uttar Pradesh, Ms. Banerjee said she accepted their request to speak to other Chief Ministers who are not in the NDA. While reiterating her demand to repeal the three laws, she has proposed a virtual conference of CMs with the farmers and a joint letter to the Centre on the issue. Many CMs are likely to agree with her, despite political rivalries among them. At least two other CMs who were elected along with her in the recent Assembly elections share her position on the farm laws – Kerala's Pinarayi Vijayan and Tamil Nadu's M.K. Stalin. In Kerala, the previous Assembly had in December 2020 passed a unanimous resolution seeking the repeal of these laws.

That said, all non-NDA CMs may not be willing to be part of a joint platform because of their individual calculations and expediency, and the fear of retribution by the Centre. Delhi's Arvind Kejriwal, for instance, had sought the support of other CMs against unilateral actions by the Centre that curtailed the powers of his government. Ms. Banerjee had vociferously supported him, but Mr. Kejriwal was not reciprocative when she raised concerns of overreach by the Centre. The recent joint efforts by some CMs to persuade the Centre to withdraw its previous vaccination policy did not get wholehearted support from others. The CMs of Odisha and Andhra Pradesh, Naveen Patnaik and Y.S. Jagan Mohan Reddy, have sought to keep the Centre in good humour. Nevertheless, the joint efforts by CMs did lead to a change in the vaccination policy. Joint strategy on farm laws could be more difficult as their impact is uneven across States. But a broader point raised by Ms. Banerjee, about the Centre's tendency to ignore the States while formulating policy, is salient. She has also called for a continuing mechanism for CMs to cooperate on issues of Centre-State relations. Turning this into a combative platform could do more harm than good, but it is a suggestion worth pursuing. Cooperative federalism, a concept that Prime Minister Narendra Modi advocates, can be pursued more meaningfully through continuous and harmonious communication with CMs. A conversation on farm laws could be a good beginning.

Terror in the Sahel

Global powers should not stay away from the growing threat posed by Islamists in Africa

The massacre of at least 160 people in a border village in Burkina Faso over the weekend is a grim reminder of the threat the Sahel region faces from Islamist terrorism. Nobody has claimed responsibility, but Burkinabe authorities have named the Islamic State in the Greater Sahara (ISGS), which has carried out hundreds of terror strikes in recent years. The security situation in Burkina Faso, which saw its first major Islamist terrorist attack in 2015, has deteriorated steadily, especially along the borders with Niger and Mali. This has been the case with much of the Sahel region, a 5,900-km-long semi-arid territory. It has seen terrorist groups expanding their networks and stepping up attacks on civilians and soldiers. The Burkina Faso attack occurred after 137 people were killed by jihadists in Niger, in March. In Nigeria, Islamists control swathes of territories and have carried out abductions and attacks, including gunning down 27 people in a village on Sunday. Mali has been fighting terror groups since 2013.

Four main terror outfits operate in the region – the ISGS, the Islamic State West Africa Province (ISWAP), the Jama'at Nasr al-Islam wal Muslimin, the local al-Qaeda branch in Mali, and Boko Haram. Of these, the ISGS and Jama'at Nasr are reportedly in alliance to expand their influence in the Burkina-Mali-Niger border region, where they shoot down anyone who does not declare their loyalty to the jihadists. Boko Haram and the IS-WAP are fighting each other but control territories in northeastern Nigeria. France has deployed troops in the region for counter-insurgency operations and is helped by the U.S., which has a drone base in Niger. The regime change policies of the U.S. and France are partly to be blamed for the problems the Sahel countries are facing today. When a NATO invasion removed Muammar Gaddafi from power in Libya in 2011, the region lost a stable bulwark against militias and jihadists. Libya, having fallen into anarchy and civil war, became a jihadist breeding ground. When trouble spread to Mali, France made a military intervention in 2013. But it did not defeat the insurgency, which spread beyond Mali's borders. Now, jihadists find safe havens in the lawless deserts of the Sahel. When the IS-militant infrastructure was destroyed in Iraq and Syria, their foot soldiers fled to Africa, regrouping themselves in the region. The recent attacks should serve as a warning to all stakeholders. Major global powers, which worked together with regional players to defeat the IS in West Asia, should not stay away from the growing threat from Africa. They should, along with the UN, help the Sahel countries build capacity and institutions, offer stable governance

The dream of a borderless world

More than the biological virus, civilisation is experiencing a pandemic of barriers and barricades across the world

The more I see images of racist violence, of the dispossessed sea of humanity travelling hundreds of miles by foot to reach their homes, of migrants being turned back by xenophobic immigration policies at the Mexican border, of vulnerable hungry people moving from Somalia to Jordan, or Bangladesh to India, or of a white policeman suffocating an African-American with his knee pressed into his neck, the more I am compelled to think that the world needs to rise above the frenzy of labels of race, gender, caste, religion and political bias, and begin, instead, to address as one people the issues that are far more crucial to humanity. More than the biological coronavirus, civilisation is indeed experiencing an excruciating world-wide pandemic of barriers and barricades, a disease that since the fall of the Berlin Wall in 1989 has jumped from a little more than a dozen border walls to

The real image

But a different image comes to mind when you visualise a borderless earth from far away in space. The arsenal of concertina wires and checkposts are not visible. You do not see the barriers of language, culture or distance from here. And you do not see the blockade of Gaza where two million Palestinians "caged in a zoo" that could easily be a toxic slum with negligible access to medicines, food, electricity or drinking water. The landmass or the seas

and oceans stretch across the globe interspersed with rivers and mountains. The mind begins to wander across the mountains, an eternal tranquil stretch across the face of the earth.

Absorbed in the landscape, I begin to imagine a world undivided by race, gender, religion or nationalities, a global consciousness unabashedly pro-diversity that is like the white cloud moving freely or the blue sky stretching far into the horizon, a peaceful land that gives you a deep sense of belonging. The cloud is not fenced in like many threatened by death behind a razor-sharp fence that is reproduced globally, in every continent, in every nation, in every state. However, at the back of my mind, I can feel the hidden bazooka-like cameras revealing sorrowfully the apprehensive face of a mother crossing the border from Mexico to Arizona to reunite with a lost child. Cold-blooded xenophobic immigrant laws, threats and detentions clash with the deep sense of peace that I experience from the placid landscape before my eyes, resonating a flash of some utopian borderless world that might someday become a reality.

Rights for all

But as a river bursts out of a dam that its gushing waters find irksome, fences too are broken by rebels incarcerated for no crime but the love of freedom or a happier tomorrow. How long can you keep a human being locked up when the crime is struggling for the human rights of all? The insatiable desire to breakout becomes the carnival of the oppressed, an iconic symbol of that ray of hope that sustains the power of imagination and reclaims the space for freedom and the dream of reality where the past meets the future in the present.

The wandering cloud or the ef-

dancing on the edge of chaos, between the broken and the built, each telling her untold story that profoundly surpasses in its intensity the single overriding story that is always ideologically frozen in its linearity and intransigence. Their action is the action of life, powerful as the winds converging into a whirlwind, distinct, and yet a reflection of the many alliances uniting to target the rich and the powerful in their palaces and in the government buildings gradually beginning to feel insecure.

Tyranny of the majority

The fence is a testimony of death and terror of race and ultra-nationalism, something Mexicans or Palestinians or we in India can very well realise, cut off as we are from the rest of the world lest we infect it with an unsurpassable wave of death and human suffering. We stand fractured by not only borders but political and economic and social and ethnic differences. Surveillance, lockdowns and military vigilance at the borders are a lame excuse of self defence camouflaging the tvranny of the majority aiming at the expulsion of the "other".

Between the rich and the poor, between the business class and the tourist class travelling in the same plane, reaching the same destination or crashing together,

between an upmarket gated community and the suburbia of poverty and hunger, between the mosque and the temple, there is the jarring sense of imbalance, screaming out in a burlesque of the inordinate magnificence of bigotry and self-indulgence.

An onslaught

Sorrowfully, racism now seems to be embedded in the very idea of the fence. The world overflows with stern vigilantism, the cold and heartless bureaucracy, the secret agents and the terrorising state apparatus. The onslaught is on the people, jobless and homeless, with no choices in their own land. They leave their homes seeking a better way of life as well as serve the host country supplying it the labour that it so desperately needs to uphold its economy. Migration occurs owing to the unbearable suffering in war-torn homelands lacking social security, or the construction of mega-dams that drive out the native farmers from their land, the only means of their subsistence. As the author Naomi Klein says, they "are increasingly treated like cargo, with no rights at all". Rich nations who believe in free trade do not realise that the migrants who have come to their shores in the face of death are not their "clients but sellers" of their labour, their blood, sweat and tears. How long will they remain silent?

If you listen carefully, you can hear the whispering of the voices from below, the voices the rich and the powerful refrain from hearing. How long will they ignore the farmers, the artisans, the builders? How long will they turn a deaf ear to the demands of those who want to break out of the confines of chauvinism or racial fanaticism? How long will their voices go unheard from across the fences, voices fortified with the words of resistance not for rewards but for the vision of peace and freedom, of human rights and dignity that await people of all races, of all colours of all ethnicities, of all genders?

These voices cannot submit to the powerful and the rich. They cannot because they are on the other side of the fence opposing the rich nations which meet annually in sickeningly opulent venues, discussing and adjudicating on the poor and the deprived on whose land they now exercise their will and their right. Armed policemen keep the hungry and the deprived out, and if ever they dare to cross over, the unfortunate wither away in detention centres behind the impenetrable walls of the hawk-eyed state. The fence keeps them at bay from vast stretches of land preventing thousands from cultivating on the land that rightly belongs to them. Surely, clean air, drinking water, health care, land and shelter and food are their birthright.

The power of peace

The only option left is to peacefully send across the fences their messages and songs of resistance that reverberate across the world with the ideas of revolution and hope, of emancipation and freedom from the tyranny of the handful who rule the world. The rebel voices, sooner or later, will remember their poets and the songs of their past that will penetrate the fences, tear them down in globally interconnected social movements when the extremes of wealth and poverty will no longer be endured. The language of diversity and dignity would soon engulf the unilateral predatory game plans of the rich and the mighty.

The rope of federalism and an unwanted tug-of-war

The controversy in West Bengal, over political and administrative issues, is an aberration in the federal polity

The Centre-West Bengal controversy on the conduct of Bengal's former Chief Secretary, Alapan Bandyopadhyay in the final days of his tenure, in May has thrown up several political and administrative issues that deserve our attention for the future health of our federal polity.

In the overall context, there are two elements which need to be kept in mind while discussing this subject. First, India is a 'union of states' and in this union, the State governments are not subordinate agencies of the central government. There are, no doubt, matters enunciated in our Constitution, where the Centre's decisions have primacy over those of the State governments, but this does not extend to holding of meetings, even if these are called by the Prime Minister. A State's functionaries - both political and administrative - are requested or advised to attend such meetings and this necessitates courtesy and consideration on the part of both sides. It is possible that due to the noholds-barred electoral campaigns in the recently held Assembly elections, which included West Bengal, these considerations were given a go-by; the result is an unseemly controversy which is best avoided for healthy Centre-State relations.

Relief and the third tier

Second, the meeting that became a flashpoint was the one called by the Prime Minister on May 28 to review cyclone relief work – in connection with cyclone Yaas - in West Bengal. The allegation is that Mr. Bandyopadhyay reached the meeting late and then left abruptly along with West Bengal Chief Minister, Mamata Banerjee, to visit the cyclone-affected areas in her State. In real life, most relief and rehabilitation work in the event of a natural calamity or management of a disaster is of a local nature and is carried out by the district, subdivisional and village level officials working under the State governments. Over time, the States have conceded space to the Centre for disaster management for getting financial, technical and logistical support. Even then, the comprehensive framework under the Disaster Management Act, 2005 (https://bit.ly/3ivdlAd) operates mainly at the State, district and local levels.

The conduct of Mr. Bandyopadhyay, an Indian Administrative Service (IAS) officer, must be seen in this overall context along with the central government's reactions which together raise issues regarding the norms of civil service conduct, political and administrative arrogance and revenge-

ful behaviour. New Delhi has sent showcause notices and a charge sheet for Mr. Bandyopadhyay's failure in fully and properly participating in the meeting called by the Prime Minister in West Bengal for cyclone relief review. He has since replied to the Centre.

The services and fine balance

The All-India Services, that includes the IAS, were conceived by the makers of our Constitution to provide uniformity and high standards of public service in both the Centre and the States, and to provide a measure of administrative unity in our diverse and plural society. The architecture has been exquisitely designed. To ensure quality and as a measure of convenience, IAS officers are recruited by the Union Public Service Commission and formally appointed by the President of India. But they are ultimately borne in State cadres which makes them subject to the control of the respective State governments as well, especially when they are in the employ-

ment of their States. To that extent their position is somewhat different from that of the central services who go through similar recruitment procedures but are under the Centre's total control.

The IAS officers work for the central government on "deputation" from their respective State cadres and during their central deputation, their loyalty is of course to the central government. IAS officers will face acute trustdeficit, if while working for a State government, they show preferential allegiance or loyalty to central government functionaries by reason of the fact that they were initially appointed by the President of India.

High-handed approach

As a measure of the vindictive assertion of its rights and power, Mr. Bandyopadhyay was initially called to the Centre on 'deputation' and asked to report in New Delhi on the day he was to superannuate. It is a different matter that he chose to retire on that day instead of availing himself of the three-month extension given to him earlier. Several commentators have pointed out that the "concurrence" of the relevant State government is required before an officer of its cadre is deputed to the Centre. Also, there must be prior consultation between the Centre and the State for the latter's viewpoint to be overruled. The Central government did not exactly cover itself with glory by violating these requirements.

Further, action has been initiated against Mr. Bandyopadhyay under Section 51(b) of the Disaster + Management Act for failing to comply with the Centre's direction to attend the review meeting taken by the Prime Minister.

This is an absurd interpretation of the provision that is meant to deal with cases of defiance of the lawful orders or action of the competent authorities (handling disaster management) under the Act. Besides, Mr. Bandyopadhyay was with the Chief Minister, his administrative boss. It is obvious that in the performance of his official duties, an All-India service officer, or any officer for that matter, will have to act under the direction of his official superior. Obviously, Mr. Bandyopadhyay listened to his boss; this is what it should be when IAS officers work for a State government or any other government; otherwise, there will be chaos and indiscipline in administration.

It is very unfortunate that for some inexplicable reasons, a mountain has been made of a molehill, as the cliché goes. In these circumstances one misses the sagacity, wisdom and sophistication of some of our tall political leaders who steered the destiny of our nation in the past.

And for young civil servants, my word of

Should retired officials be barred from disclosing information?

The restrictions in place must be based on operational calculations

Last week, the Government of India prohibited retired officials of security and intelligence organisations from publishing anything about their work or organisation without prior clearance from the head of the organisation. Serving civil servants are barred from expressing their personal opinion on policy matters and criticising the government. But once they retire, many of them take part in public debates and enrich our conversations. In a conversation moderated by Varghese K. George, G.K. Pillai and Syed Akbaruddin discuss whether there should be any restrictions on the freedom of expression of a specific category of retired government officials. And if yes, what the limits of such restrictions should be. Edited

Mr. Pillai, do you think the restrictions imposed on retired officials of intelligence and security organisations are justifiable?

G.K. Pillai: We have the Official Secrets Act [of 1923]. Officers of intelligence and security organisations and other departments are privy to a lot of sensitive information. So, all of us in the service take into account the fact that the government needs some control over that information leaking into the public.

The issue is whether it is all information on which there is not yet much clarity or whether it is sensitive information. Who decides what is sensitive and what is not? The government would like to have some control so that existing intelligence security operations are not affected by such leakage of information. But there is this fine balance which has to be struck and we have so far been managing that. Many retired officers who are in these sensitive organisations actually informally get their draft vetted by the current head of the security services, so that there is no information which is of operational nature and could get compromised. The government has now put it down in a formal manner and we have to see how it goes.

So, you are in favour of some kind of restrictions. The recent announcement makes this

restriction lifelong, and the word 'sensitive' is left open to subjective interpretations...

GKP: I would put a time limit – say, five years from the time you retire. It is the operational information which is actually more sensitive. In five years, it won't be of concern in most cases.

Unlike in the U.S., for instance, books by former intelligence officials are infrequent in India. Given that, how do you see the move. Ambassador?

Syed Akbaruddin: The tradition of understanding history through eyewitness accounts is not new. That tradition, unfortunately, in the past, as far as India is concerned, has been weakened. We gain and the public is better informed of activities, including those taken for the benefit of our own country's interests, when information is shared from different perspectives. And that should be the broad theme.

Increasingly, a large number of people at different levels have returned to the tradition. The former Leader of the Opposition, L.K. Advani, has written an excellent book about his own experiences, for instance. There is always tension between the government's desire to keep information secret on national security grounds and the public's right to information held by public authorities. But there is a near-universal consensus among decisionmakers, not only in India but elsewhere too, that some measure of secrecy is necessary to protect authorised national security activities such as intelligence gathering, military operations, sometimes confidentiality of deliberations and sometimes personal privacy.

So, in a democracy, the public has a right to know. Questions related to national security are considered holy. We have ongoing debates on how best we can ensure democratic accountability of security agencies. Is our problem one of too much of information being in the public domain or too little transparency in the functioning of our national



security apparatus?

GKP: One way in which information is actually given to the public is through the declassification of files. In the U.S., at the end of 30 years, after a rigorous examination, they declassify most files and make them available in the public domain. In India, we don't declassify information enough. For example, the Henderson Brooks report on the 1962 conflict with China. It's been more than 60 years and I really don't think there's anything in that report which we should be worried about now. Copies of it are on the Internet. So, why are we keeping it a secret? Similarly, as Home Secretary, I had suggested that we declassify the Justice Mukherjee report on Subhas Chandra Bose and send it to the National Archives.

In democracies like the U.S., there is a challenge that the public will have no way of verifying independently what security agencies put out as information. There is a strong case for increasing transparency, but the direction that democracies in general are taking is the opposite – they want to be in control of more and more information.

SA: Reconciling these divergent interests of national security and the right of the public to know is an ongoing challenge. A stable security policy is always hard to achieve since the boundaries of official secrecy cannot be clearly articulated. And national security issues keep evolving, sometimes dramatically. So, you will always have an unsatisfactory situation regarding this.

That said, I will go back to where Mr. Pillai mentioned declassifica-

tion. Now, declassification is an important tool in raising public aware ness after a specified period. In our case, there are two issues. One is that we are sometimes less than forthright about declassification. We also over-classify things which perhaps need not have been classified at all. For example, five years ago or maybe less than that, we contested many elections in the UN and one was a very tough election. At that time, we sent some messages, cables, etc. All of that was classified then. But today, everybody knows what happened, the success was ours. Do we still need to keep that classified?

Coming to the issue of democracies. Now, we need to understand that we don't want an explosion of deep throats. If you block all avenues of information, or gradually reduce them, you will have to resort to deep throat-kind of activities, which is not good for any society. So, the U.S. itself moved long beyond deep throat. But I think after 9/11, there have been concerns about national security. That's why a lot of issues relating to national security are being tightened up. So, the phenomenon of non-disclosure of information can be traced back to almost two decades ago. Once you are in that space, it is difficult to roll back because that's the nature of the beast – that once there is a status quo, you find it difficult to pull back. So, until those are addressed, I would say that this individually will not be addressed so easily.

I think both of you broadly agree that the restrictions that you are favouring must be based on operational calculations. Both of you seem to be okay with the sharing of more information...

GKP: Yeah, I think so. During the 1971 War, every time Pakistan said India was interfering in Bangladesh, we denied it. Once the war was over, a number of books were written on the topic by top Army Commanders, Border Security Force [personnel] and others on how they operated inside Bangladesh. I don't think the Official Secrets Act has been invoked against anybody who has written about that.

So, we can afford to be much more liberal in terms of declassifying information?

GKP: Declassification is an area where everybody plays safe. I think at least 50% of the top-secret files in the Government of India can be declassified straightaway. Thousands of files were declassified when I was in the Home Ministry, but we still have thousands more which can be declassified. This is not a priority for the department. And that is why I'm also in favour of a time limit.

Do you think compared to other democracies, India is stricter when it comes to sharing official secrets?

SA: If you look at the tradition of these transparency efforts, the first such effort actually goes back to Europe, and by centuries, when parliaments wanted access to the executive authority. However, it was only towards the end of the 20th century and the beginning of the 21st century that this proliferation of what we call the right to information in the Indian context took place globally. There are, I think, 95 to 200 countries today which have these disclosure arrangements in place. They still haven't covered the entire expanse, because there are, of course, caveats to this. But if you see it in the historical context, the availability of information is certainly much more now than it was, say, 25-30 years ago. Whether it is adequate, my answer would be no. Whether it should be expanded - yes. Whether it should be absolute – again, my answer would be no, because no

rights to freedom of expression can be absolute; they will always be restricted in certain contexts. It will be best for all of us if these are clarified from time to time, because these circumstances keep evolving and clarification and enunciation of this is a part of the growth of transparency, whether in India or elsewhere.

Both of you are custodians of quite a few official and national secrets which you have accumulated through your careers. I assume that both of you will write books soon. How much will you be willing to reveal and what will be your consideration when it comes to how much to tell? How will you balance public interest and the existing regulations and your own intellectual honesty?

SA: Your assumption is not wrong; I am working on something. As a citizen of a free and democratic country, which is based on the free flow of information and the right of the public to be aware about situations, I would start from the premise that as much as is feasible can be revealed without, of course, revealing national secrets or difficult situations. In policy debates, you may have differences of opinion. Those differences can be reflected without indicating where individuals are involved. I would come from the proposition that greater transparency, greater public awareness, and the tradition of eyewitnesses providing factual perspectives of their own should be my pathway.

P.V. Narasimha Rao once told an interviewer that a lot of secrets will perish with him. How much of the secrets that you know can be shared, Mr. Pillai? More than 50%?

GKP: I think about 80% can be shared. Some 20% can't be shared partly because the people involved are living contemporaries. And especially if they are in the political sphere, you don't want either their opponents or them to take advantage of what you have written. So, those are some of the reservations we have. Insofar as general administration, governance issues, policy, etc. are concerned, I don't think there is much of a problem in trying to put some of those things down.

Making peace with nature

A decade of protecting and reviving the ecosystem will help India in various ways

There has never been a more urgent need to restore damaged ecosystems. The COVID-19 pandemic is a direct result of the degradation of natural areas, species loss, and exploitation. Zoonotic pathogens are more frequently jumping from wildlife to humans, creating public health emergencies. Healthier ecosystems and a healthier respect for the wild spaces of our world will give us a healthier planet and healthier people.

It is time to change how we cultivate our land, use our soils, exploit coastal and marine ecosystems, and manage our forests. The damage has been done over decades and the destruction cannot be reversed overnight. But we need to start somewhere. That's why this World Environment Day, the UN Environment Programme and the UN Food and Agriculture Organization launched the UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration to prevent, halt and reverse the degradation of ecosystems on every continent and in every ocean.

India must participate actively in this decade of restoration. Ten years of sustained action to protect and revive the country's ecosystems will help India to end poverty by enhancing livelihoods, combat climate change by reviving natural carbon stores, and halt the collapse of biodiversity by rebuilding homes for wildlife. Ecosystem restoration benefits people and nature.

Path towards restoration Prime Minister Narendra Modi has al-

ready set India on this path. In 2019, he announced that India would raise its ambition for restoration, promising an increase in restored degraded land from 21 to 26 million hectares by 2030. There are several steps we can take to build on this commitment. First, there must be a concerted effort to reduce carbon dioxide emissions. Climate change is dangerous to humans, but also to the fragile ecosystems that sustain all life on earth. Globally, we must reduce net carbon dioxide emissions by 45% by 2030 compared to 2010. And we must reach net-zero emissions by 2050 to

have a hope of achieving the 1.5°C Paris Agreement target. India needs to work towards this by transforming energy systems, land use, agriculture, forest protection, urban development, infrastructure, and lifestyles. Crucially, this has to be aligned with conserving and restoring biodiversity and minimising air and water pollution and waste. Given the interconnectedness of nature, all problems have to be dealt with simultaneously. We already have the goals, targets, commitments, and mechanisms under international environmental conventions that can direct this ambition. Let us use them.

Second, we need to transform our economic, financial and production systems towards sustainability. Including natural capital in decisionmaking, eliminating environmentally harmful subsidies, and investing in low-carbon and nature-friendly technologies are key elements of this. By making investments in sustainable development financially attractive, we can shift the financial flows and investment patterns towards sustainability. We already have the knowledge base, the scientific expertise, and the policymaking know-how through national and international scientific bodies that can guide this process. Let us use it.

Finally, the power to revive our environment lies with us as individuals. For a better future, India must work towards creating food systems that work with nature, reduce waste, and are adaptive to change and resilient to shocks. Empowering small-scale farmers and women farmers, changing patterns of consumption and challenging social norms and business practices are key. This can be achieved through capacity building and education. We already have the power to effect change through cooperation and collaboration, and through changing how we consume, travel and use energy. Let us not shirk this responsibility. As UN Secretary-General António Guterres has stated, making peace with nature is the defining task of the 21st century.

Learning to take questions

Schools reach out to the media for publicity but are averse to scrutiny of any kind

As a reporter covering school education for *The Hindu*'s Chennai city bureau, my work entailed speaking to teachers and school heads – of both public and private institutions – regularly. Some of them have given me crucial tipoffs about policy changes, and shared valuable insights on trends that only they, as practitioners, would understand.

Many of these schools, especially those privately run, consider themselves 'top brands' in education. They believe every event held on their premises – be it the annual day, sports day, science project, literary club inauguration, or some Rotaract club activity – is worthy of publicity. In their view, some coverage, any coverage, is justified for their effort and "innovativeness". "Even a few lines would be an encouragement for our children," the charismatic school principals would say.

All the same, these schools proved thinskinned when their institutions were in the news for the wrong reasons. Some of the reactions following the recent, troubling allegations of sexual harassment in city schools reminded me of that aversion to any scrutiny or criticism. Responses from the school managements and many alumni reflected a staunch belief that their school could not err. Past pupils' loyalty to their alma mater seemed to trump reason.

It took me back to two important stories from a decade ago, whose coverage invoked similar reactions at the time. One was a swimming pool accident in 2012 at a famous city school, in which a nine-year-old boy tragically drowned. A subsequent police case meant the issue, while taking its legal course, received wide cov-

erage, and rightly put the spotlight on children's safety in schools - a concern

that is never redundant. Another story I covered was in 2011, two years after the historic Right to Education Act was passed. One of its clauses mandated that private schools reserve 25% of their seats to children from weaker sections and disadvantaged groups in the neighbourhood, and provide them free and compulsory elementary education, for which the government would bear the cost.

Some schools reacted in telling ways – from terming the rules "very damaging to the class and the entire school", to asking parents to protest against the Act through letters that said: "Your child's quality of education will suffer seriously as the teachers will have a very difficult time managing and educating a few children who are not

qualified for the particular

class or who are very difficult to manage."

The institutions barely hid their class bias. Their pride and brand consciousness outweighed everything else, including any sensitivity to the Act's thrust on fairness or social justice. A few school heads even casually threw in the "I'll speak to your editor" line when we sought a reaction. Clearly, they did not appreciate the media asking them questions.

As far as our reporting requirement goes, we need to establish the facts, give the context, with the perspective of those affected, as well as the reaction of the said schools to the concerns raised. But invariably, these private schools suggested that they were beyond public scrutiny. If critical thinking and a spirit of inquiry is at the heart of education, it is ironic that schools are so averse to questions, let alone the slightest introspection.

Crisis in Japan over Constitution

Tokyo, June 10: A political crisis is developing in Japan over Article 9 of the Constitution, under which the nation renounces war forever. While the Japanese Government slowly and cautiously reviews the country's Constitution - in contrast to the current constitutional convention fever in the Philippines – a strong rightist bloc, headed by the former Prime Minister, Mr. Nobusuke Kishi, is seeking to legalise a five-year plan to expand Japan's "self-defence" forces by doing away with Article 9 completely. Japan's forces now total 1,80,000 men. Despite the large support which Mr. Kishi has in the ruling Liberal Democratic Party (L.D.P.), the government is reluctant to provoke parliamentary opposition and Japan's largely pacifist public opinion into a repetition of the antiwar frenzy which overwhelmed the country in 1950 when the Japan-U.S. mutual security treaty was signed. A Constitutional Review Council, under Mr. Osamu Inaba, is quietly working out a consensus between the Kishi partisans - numbering 264 out of the 540 L.D.P. – and the anti-revisionists within the party who are reluctant to rock the ship of state at this particular time.

Failure of European Civilisation From an Editorial

It may seem somewhat paradoxical to the ordinary mind to speak of European civilisation as a failure at the present day. To all obvious appearances and material purposes it is the European races that now hold sway over the major part of the world. And judging from the pride and enthusiasm with which European institutions, ideals and habits of life are being adopted as the high water mark of refinement and progress by non-European peoples all the world over, one would rather be expected to pronounce a verdict of unqualified success upon the civilisation which is embodied in them. But such an estimate can never be sound so long as we do not mistake aggressive power and splendour for real greatness and success. A civlisation is to be judged not merely by its vigour and extension in a particular period of human history. The phenomenon of its growth and volume, however stupendous and surprising, may be the result of circumstances peculiar to that epoch of history and may change with the change of these favourable conditions.

Promote second-rung leadership in Punjab: AICC

Sources said the report of three-member panel, comprising Leader of the Opposition in the Rajya Sabha Mallikarjun Kharge, AICC general secretary (Punjab) Harish Rawat and Congress leader J.P Aggarwal, also suggested a complete revamp of the Pradesh Congress Committee (PCC) along with the various committees, including the election-related committees.

On the issue of Mr. Sidhu being a contender for the Deputy Chief Minister, the Chief Minister is learnt to have argued there should be more than one, and at least one should be from the Dalit community.

"It is pertinent to note that since the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, the islands of Lakshadweep had

been able to keep the virus out in 2020. However, post the appointment of the current administration certain quarantining guidelines were relaxed as a result of which the UT has seen over 4,000 cases, with over 20 deaths already," Mr. Viswam said in his letter.

No starvation in island, Collector tells Kerala HC

'Sufficient food stock to last up to Oct.'

The Lakshadweep administration on Thursday assured a Division Bench of the Kerala High Court that necessary steps would be taken to ensure that there was no shortfall in the supply of food kits and other necessary provisions to islanders the lockdown during period.

The undertaking was given by counsel for the Lakshadweep Collector when a public interest litigation petition alleging starvation on the islands came up for hearing before a Bench comprising Justices Anil K. Narendran and Ziyad Rahman A.A.

The court also directed the Collector to file a statement regarding the measures already taken and proposed additional measures, if any, to ensure adequate

and sufficient supply of rice and other provisions to the islanders either free of cost or on a payment basis.

Central schemes

S. Manu, counsel for the Lakhadweep Administrator, submitted that there had been no starvation in the islands as sufficient quantities of food were being distributed to islanders under Central schemes. He submitted that ration

articles were being distributed to the islanders through 39 ration shops. Every 1.5 km on the islands had a ration shop. In fact, free rice of 5 kg per person was being distributed under the Pradhan Mantri Garib Kalyan Anna Yojana through the public distribution system.

He said there was sufficient stock of food on all the islands to last up to October.

Karnataka eases curbs in districts with fewer cases

Kerala test positivity steady at over 13%; A.P. records 8.29%

Karnataka on Thursday extended lockdown restrictions in 11 districts with high positivity rates, but modified curbs in other districts, including Bengaluru Urban, from June 14 to 21.

The COVID-19 night curfew would be in place from 7 p.m. to 5 a.m. in all districts. The weekend curfew will also come into effect from 7 p.m. on Friday to 5 a.m. on Monday in all districts.

Current restrictions will continue till 6 a.m. on June 21 in 11 districts - Chikmaga-

lur, Shivamogga, Davanagere, Mysuru, Chamarajanagar, Hassan, Dakshina Kannada, Bengaluru Rural, Mandya, Belagavi, and Kodagu - Chief Minister B.S. Yediyurappa announced after a high-level meeting with Mi nisters and officials.

Based on the Technical Advisory Committee's suggestions, lockdown restrictions were relaxed in 20 districts. Shops delivering essentials such as food, medicine, milk, fruits and vegetables could open from 6 a.m. to 2 p.m. All street vendors will be allowed from 6 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Kerala on Thursday reported 14,424 new cases of COVID-19 from 1,07,250 tests. The test positivity rate

(TPR) was steady at around 14-15% with no significant reduction in two weeks. On Thursday, the TPR was 13.45%. Active cases declined to 1,35,298. Cumulative fatalities were 10,631, with the State adding 194 deaths from the past few

The cumulative case burden was 26,88,590.

Among districts, Thiruvananthapuram reported the highest new cases with 2,030, Kollam 1,605, Malappuram 1.597. Ernakulam 1,596, Thrissur 1,359, Palakkad 1,312, Kozhikode 1,008, Alappuzha 848, Kannur 750, Idukki 673, Kottayam 580, Kasaragod 443, Pathanamthitta 429 and Wayanad 194.

A.P. added 11,763 cases and the cumulative tally was 17,87,883. The number of active cases dropped to below one lakh for the first time in 44 days.

The daily TPR of 97,863 samples was 8.29%.

This 'secret love story' has a happy ending

Kerala man hid his partner in a tiny room at his small family house in Palakkad district for 11 years

STAFF REPORTER PALAKKAD

The Palakkad district police on Wednesday lifted the lid on a love story in which a man secretly lived with his partner, belonging to another community, in a tiny room at his family house at Ayiloor, near Nenmara, without letting anyone know about it for 11 years.

Rahman, 34, son of Mohammed Khani, feared a backlash when he ran away with a woman living a few blocks away from his house on February 2, 2010. He co-

vertly brought her to his house at Ayiloor and hid her in his room without giving any hint to his family.

They lived in a small room with few amenities for 11 vears. He would lock the room whenever he went out, and never let any of his family members enter it. By removing the grill, he converted his room's window into a secret exit that they used for her to get out at night to relieve herself.

Mr. Rahman would bring food and other essentials -

all in tight secrecy. He even set up a mechanism which would give electric shocks if the room's door handle was touched, to deter his family

from entering. He was able to keep his father, mother and sister, who lived with him in the small house, unaware of his actions for 11 years. The police ques-

tioned many people as part of an investigation following the woman's disappearance in 2010. Mr. Rahman, too, was among those questioned. As he continued to live in the same village, none suspected him for the woman's disappearance.

Man missing case

In March this year, Mr. Rahman left his house and the family filed a man missing

The secret relationship came to light when the police found Mr. Rahman at Nenmara town on Wednes-

He reportedly told the police that he had shifted to a rented house in the neighbouring Vithanassery village three months ago with his

Although the police refused to believe the story, they were convinced when they visited Mr. Rahman's house at Ayiloor. The police examined the room in which the couple lived for 11 years in secret.

The police produced the couple in a court, which permitted them to live together. The partners returned to their rented home at Vithanassery, glad to be free to live a normal life in the open.

The U.S. will open July-August student visa appointments in all consular offices in India from June 14, the Embassy said on Thursday. The announcement marks the beginning of academic exchanges in the backdrop of the pandemic.

The Embassy has also begun to hold online exchanges with students on the "current operating status and visa processing at the consular sections". U.S. universities are opening up following widespread vaccination drives conducted by the Biden-Harris administration. A large number of Indian students in U.S. campuses were forced to return home and resort to online academic experiences after COVID-19 broke out last year.

The announcement was in contrast with the Chinese decision to prevent the arrival of foreign students. The Ministry of External Affairs on Thursday said India was in touch with the Chinese side "to seek an early resumption of travel by Indian citizens to China, especially for those who work or study there". According to a new rule of the Indian government, students and professionals going abroad would have to get their CoWIN vaccination certificates linked to their passport.

messages hurting or insulting the feelings of a particular community. Moreover, with respect to the prayer for issuing directions to the Government of India to register criminal complaint against Twitter and its users, who are spreading hatred messages," the petition said.

It asked the court to direct the government to frame specific guidelines under the Information Technology Act, 2000, on "hate messages against any religious community, including Islamophobic posts on various social media platforms".

Mr. Aijazuddin had initiallv moved the Telangana High Court, which directed him to approach the Supreme Court.

'Focus on second dose for HCWs, FLWs'

Health Secretary flags low COVID-19 vaccination among priority groups

States have been advised to focus on the second dose of COVID-19 vaccination coverage among healthcare and frontline workers.

A release issued by the Union Health Ministry said Health Secretary Rajesh Bhushan chaired a high-level meeting on Thursday and informed States and Union Territories of the modifications in Co-WIN platform, aimed at making it more effective as a back-end management tool for the countrywide vaccination drive.

"Mr. Bhushan highlighted the low vaccination coverage among Healthcare Workers (HCW) and Frontline Workers (FLW), especially for the second dose for both the priority groups, terming it a cause of serious concern," said the release.

The Ministry said that while the national average for the first dose administration among HCWs was 82%, the national average for second dose among HCWs was only 56%. Punjab, Maharashtra, Haryana, Tamil Nadu, Delhi and Assam had a coverage below the national average in this aspect.

For FLWs, the national average of first dose coverage was 85% but that of second dose coverage for FLWs was only 47%, and 19 States and UTs had reported second dose coverage of FLWs less than the national average. Among them were Bihar, Haryana, Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Andhra Pradesh, Puducherry, Telangana, Karnataka, and Punjab.

"The Secretary highlighted less than adequate private sector participation in the COVID vaccination drive. As per the revised guidelines, 25% of the vaccine stock can be procured by the private hospitals. Limited presence of private hospitals and their unequal spread were highlighted for Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Jharkhand, Odisha, West Bengal, Assam, etc," said the release.

The Ministry also alerted the States to the new features in the Co-WIN portal. Revised features allow rectifications in personal information (Name, YOB, Gender and Photo ID number of the card used) by citizens requesting changes only in any of the two fields out of the four mentioned. These changes are allowed only

E-VIN data

Meanwhile, the Centre advised the States and UTs to obtain the Health Ministry's permission before sharing E-VIN data related to vaccine stocks and the temperature at which they are stored. This, it said, was to prevent any misuse of data by various agencies for commercial purposes. E-VIN is used by the Ministry for inventory management of vaccines and tracking storage temperature data of vaccines under the Universal Immunization Programme (UIP).

The Ministry on Thursday said crucial information on vaccine usage trends for multiple vaccines used in the UIP, and temperature-related data, could be used to manipulate the market as well as associated research with respect to various vaccines and cold-chain equipment.

Doctors welcome Ministry's treatment protocol for children

But they urge caution to prevent misinterpretation

Doctors, while welcoming the Union Health Ministry's latest treatment guidelines for COVID-19-management in children, underlined the need to "create awareness to prevent misinterpretation, which could counterproductive".

The Directorate-General of Health Services (DGHS), in its guidelines for the man agement of COVID-19 among children, has said that Remdesivir is not recommended in this population and that it is an emergency-use-authorisation drug. "There is lack of sufficient safety and efficacy data with respect to Remdesivir in children below 18 years of age," the guidelines said. They also call for rational use of HRCT

imaging. "...We welcome DGHS for coming out with the all-important guidelines ... However, awareness should be created so that the guideline is not misinterpreted, which would be counterproductive," said Gauri Agarwal, senior gynaecologist at Yashoda Hospitals in Hyderabad.

"DGHS has said children below the age of 5 should not wear a mask. It does not mean that they are not at risk. Moreover, since they'll not be wearing a mask, it means that additional care and precautions need to be taken by their guardians,"

Rahul Nagpal, director,

Pediatrics and Neonatology at Fortis Hospital, Vasant Kuni, welcomed the DGHS guidelines and said they standardised treatment protocol for children. Since the first wave, doctors have been using the protocol by the Indian Academy of Pediatrics, which discouraged unnecessary use of steroids, anti-viral drugs and CT scan in children, he said.

Doctors also said while the guidelines will be useful if there is a rise in the number of children getting infected, hospitals will have to ensure that there is enough standardised infrastructure to cater to this population.

Assam Cong. MP slams evictions amid pandemic

State govt. has violated rights: Khaleque

A Congress MP has slammed the "two-faced" drive by the Bharatiya Janata Party-led government to make Assam encroachment-free. He also asked the Gauhati High Court to take note of the eviction drive that violates human rights amid the ongoing COVID-19 crisis.

Abdul Khaleque, who represents western Assam's Barpeta constituency in the Lok Sabha, said the State government's move to evict thousands of settlers from more than 77,000 bighas of State-owned land was "two-faced"

This was in reference to 2.28 lakh periodic pattas (land deeds) and allotment certificates distributed among landless people belonging to the indigenous communities on more than 2.09 lakh bighas of government land during the tenure of previous Chief Minister Sarbananda Sonowal.

Local authorities and police have over a week freed more than 400 bighas of government land of encroachers in Hojai, Karimganj and Darrang districts. More than 200 houses, mostly belonging to migrant Muslims, were uprooted.

Question of timing

"At a dire time of COVID-19 crisis, the government's eviction in Sonitpur and Hojai is a violation of Articles 21 and 39 of the Indian Constitution. Encroachers should be evicted but not at a time of crisis," Mr. Khaleque said, adding that the government should have served notices to the settlers and provided with dwellings

In an appeal to the Chief Justice of Gauhati High Court on June 7, the MP cited the court's May 10 pandemic-related order that said: "It is also made clear that any decree for eviction/ dispossession or demolition which was passed by any court, tribunal or authority during this period, shall remain in abeyance subject to any specific orders which may be passed in a given

AAMSU criticism

The All Assam Minority Students' Union (AAMSU) has also criticised the eviction drive.

"The State government has violated the High Court's order that clearly states there would be no eviction drive during the CO-VID-19 pandemic. The Assam government should stop harassing the minority people under communal agenda," the AAMSU said.

The Assam Cabinet under Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma had on June 8 formed a committee for properly utilising the 77,000 bighas of land freed from encroachers. The committee is headed by BIP legislator Padma Hazarika

11 killed, seven injured in + building collapse in Mumbai

HC no to stay on film based on Sushant's life

'Posthumous privacy not permissible'

The Delhi High Court on Thursday refused to stay the release of a film based on Bollywood actor Sushant Singh Rajput's life, noting that the information of events around the actor's death was already in the public domain and "posthumous privacy right is not permissible".

The High Court's direction came on a plea moved by the late actor's father, Krishna Kishore Singh, seeking to restrain anyone from using his son's name or likeness in movies. He had sought to restrain the release of a movie titled Nyay: The Justice, a self-proclaimed "tribute to Sushant Singh Rajput (SSR)", slated for release on June 11.

"We must note that the right to privacy has also

been invoked not just of the deceased but also in respect of the right of the family of SSR. The submissions on this aspect are unspecific and vague. No definite instance has been presented by the plaintiff (Mr. Singh) to show how this right is infringed and therefore, the plea is devoid of merit," Jus-Sanjeev remarked.

Award of damages

The High Court said that the actor's father can be compensated by award of damages if he is later able to prove in trial that "celebrity/ publicity rights were inheritable". The court directed the makers of the film to "render complete and true accounts of the revenue earned from the films by way of sale/licensing of all rights relating to the films".

WhatsApp chats, NCB tells HC Conversations in

Govt. agencies can analyse

drug case sent for forensic analysis

WhatsApp chats, which are end-to-end encrypted, can be analysed by government organisations, the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) recently told the Punjab and Haryana High Court.

Responding to a bail petition filed in the High Court by an 18-year-old under Section 439 of the Code of Criminal Procedure in a Narcotic Psychotropic Substances Act, 1985 (NDPS) case, the NCB stated that since the entire WhatsApp chat of the accused was end-to-end encrypted, it could not be opened by the agency, which was constrained to send it to forensic specialists for its "opening and analy-

sis". The NCB, Chandigarh, submitted that the petitioner and his father, a co-accused, were found in possession of 520 g of heroin without any permit or license while they were travelling in a car.

They were arrested on February 14, 2020. It added that the petitioner's involvement in trafficking was established from his conversation with a Nigerian handler-supplier of the contraband over phone and WhatsApp communications.

The petitioner's advocate submitted that recordings of the alleged WhatsApp conversations between the petitioner and the contraband supplier, a Nigerian national, had not been revealed or made available to show the petitioner's involvement.

The NCB counsel stated that the WhatsApp conversation was sent for analysis on April 4 this year, as it was not considered necessary earlier in view of the petitioner's confessional statement. The counsel added that the NCB was subsequently constrained to send the conversations for forensic analysis to submit its report at an appropriate stage during trial.

Justice Sudip Ahluwalia, who was hearing the matter on May 7, stated that the Court finds no justification to release the petitioner on bail at this stage. The petition is, therefore, dismissed.

U.S. to donate 500 mn doses to world

The Pfizer jabs would be distributed to 92 low-and middle-income countries and the African Union

The U.S. will purchase half a billion doses of the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine and donate them to 92 low and middle-income countries and the African Union. The vaccines will be shipped from August onwards, with 200 million doses distributed this year and 300 million by the middle of next year, according to a 'fact sheet' released by the White House. Rich countries have come under increasing pressure to not sit on orders of excess vaccines as many in middle and lower income countries remain unvaccinated.

The news of Joe Biden's plan broke on Wednesday, as the President was en route to the U.K. to attend the G7 meetings. Mr. Biden is expected to formally announce the plan on Thursday evening from Cornwall, following his meeting with U.K. Prime

The U.S. will work on delivering the vaccines via CO-VAX, an international coalition that is involved with global vaccine access. Myanmar military charges Suu Kyi with corruption

She is accused of accepting bribes and misusing authority

The Myanmar junta has charged deposed civilian leader Aung San Suu Kyi with corruption over claims she accepted illegal payments of gold and more than half a million dollars in cash, media Thursday.

The country has been in turmoil since the generals ousted Ms. Suu Kyi on February 1, with more than 850 ci vilians killed in a brutal crackdown by security forces on near-daily protests against the coup.

The 75-year-old Nobel laureate, who has been in custody since the putsch, is facing a raft of wide-ranging criminal charges, including sedition and breaching a colonial-era secrecy law.

The latest charges relate to allegations by the former Yangon region Chief Minister that Ms. Suu Kyi illegally accepted \$6,00,000 in cash from him along with around 11 kg of gold.

Anti-Corruption The Commission found evidence that Ms. Suu Kvi had committed "corruption using her rank", according to the Global New Light of Myanmar, a state-run newspaper.

"So she was charged under Anti-Corruption Law section 55."

She is also accused of abusing her authority when renting two areas of land for her charitable foundation.

After weeks of legal wrangling, two of Ms. Suu Kyi's trials are due to start in earnest next week, hearing evidence from witnesses.

In Naypyidaw, the remote capital purpose-built by the previous military regime, her trial on charges of violat-



12 killed as military plane crashes near Mandalay

A military plane crashed on Thursday near Myanmar's second-biggest city of Mandalay, killing 12 people, the city's fire service said in a post on social media.

The plane was flying from the capital Naypyidaw to the town of Pyin Oo Lwin and was coming in to land when it crashed about 300 m from a steel plant, the military-owned Myawaddy television station reported.

The plane was carrying six military personnel and also monks who were due to attend a ceremony at a Buddhist monastery, other media reports said.

There were no reports of casualties on the ground.

The pilot and one passenger survived and were taken to a military hospital, according to a resident and posting by a community group.

It was not clear what had caused the crash.

3 Palestinians killed in West Bank

Clashes erupt during Israeli raid overnight; Abbas calls it 'dangerous escalation'

Israeli troops shot and killed three Palestinians, including two security officers, in a shootout that erupted in the occupied West Bank town of Jenin during what appeared to be an Israeli arrest raid overnight, Palestinian officials said on Thursday.

Israel and the Palestinian Authority (PA) coordinate security operations in the territory against Hamas and other militant groups seen as a threat to both of them. The coordination has contributed to mounting anger among Palestinians.

A spokesman for Palesti-

nian President Mahmoud Abbas condemned what he called a "dangerous Israeli escalation," saying the three were killed by Israeli special forces who disguise themselves as Arabs during arrest raids. The spokesman, Nabil Abu Rdeneh, called on the community international and the United States to intervene to halt such attacks. Israeli media reported

that special forces went into Jenin to arrest two operatives from the Islamic Jihad militant group when they came under fire. One of the Palestinian suspects was killed, in addition to the two security officers, the media reports said.

'Undercover' forces

There were no reports of any Israeli casualties. The PA said the two officers who were killed were members of its military intelligence force.

Online video appears to show Palestinian officers taking cover behind a vehicle as gunshots are heard in the background. One shouts that they are exchanging fire with Israeli "undercover" forces.

Under interim peace agreements signed in the 1990s, the PA has limited au tonomy in scattered enclaves that together make up around 40% of the occupied West Bank. Hamas drove its forces out of Gaza in 2007 when the Islamic militant group seized power. Israel has overarching security authority in the West Bank.

Navalny group vows to fight on + after court brands it 'extremist'

Iailed Kremlin critic Alexei Navalny's anti-corruption group vowed on Thursday to fight on after a court branded it an "extremist" organisation and ordered its closure.

Western countries and the European Union were quick to condemn Wednesday's late-night ruling, but senior Russian officials dou-

The court decision was the latest move against critics of President Vladimir Putin. Some of his loudest opponents have fled the country and several prominent activist groups and independent media have closed.

The ruling bans Mr. Navalny's Anti-Corruption Foundation (FBK) and a network of regional offices from operating and, under a recently passed law, prevents those previously associated with the groups from running in parliamentary elections.

The FBK was defiant, saying in a Twitter post: "We woke up, smiled with destructive intent and knowing that we are a 'danger to society' will continue to fight corruption!"



Auto retail sales more than halved in May from April: FADA

Dealers' body says PVs slid 59%, CVs by 66%; urges support from banks, OEMs

Automobile retail sales in the country declined by 55% in May as compared with April as lockdowns across various States amid the second wave of the COVID-19 pandemic hit vehicle registrations, automobile dealers' body FA-DA said on Thursday.

All segments were hit as showrooms across various States were forced to down shutters amid the restrictions. Total registrations across categories in May dropped to 5,35,855 units from 11,85,374 units in April.

According to the Federation of Automobile Dealers Associations, which collected vehicle registration data

from 1,294 out of the 1,497 regional transport offices, passenger vehicle sales slumped 59%. Two-wheeler sales also declined 53% to 4,10,757 units last month.

Similarly, commercial vehicle sales dropped by 66% to 17,534 units last month, from 51,436 in April. Three-wheeler sales saw a decline of 76% to 5,215 units,

while tractor sales witnessed a dip of 57% to 16,616 units. "The second wave of CO-VID has left the entire country devastated as there may not be a single household which did not get affected," FADA President Vinkesh Gulati noted. "Apart from urban markets, this time, even rural areas were badly hit."

He added auto retailers were in dire need of support.

"While a handful of OEMs... have announced financial help to their channel partners, others are yet to do so. Hence, FADA humbly requests all those OEMs which have still not announced any financial assistance to kindly do it urgently," he said.

He also appealed that instead of restructuring, banks should allow a moratorium of 90 days to all categories of dealers sans a turnover limit.

Centre to auction 'major' fields of ONGC, OIL

Aim is to boost output, says Pradhan

The Centre will auction unmonetised, large oil and gas fields of state-owned ONGC and OIL to boost hydrocarbon production, Petroleum Minister Dharmendra Pradhan said on Thursday.

Speaking at the start of the third round of auction of small discovered fields, he said companies cannot indefinitely sit on resources they may have discovered.

These resources belonged to the nation and would be monetised by auctioning them out to interested entities, he said. As many as 32 oil and gas blocks with 75 discoveries have been offered in the Discovered Small Field (DSF) round-III. Under DSF, liberal terms

including pricing and mar-



keting freedom are offered, making them viable. "There will be no DSF next time. Next time, it will be a 'major' round (auction of large fields)," Mr. Pradhan said.

He said the Directorate General of Hydrocarbons, has the "full mandate" to identify unmonetised major fields that could be offered for bidding.

GST Council to mull tax cut on June 12

The GST Council, chaired by Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman, will meet on June 12 to decide on GST rate cut for COVID essentials, according to officials.

In the previous meeting of the council on May 28, a Group of Ministers (GoM) was set up to recommend tax relief on COVID essentials including PPE kits, masks and vaccines, to the GST Council. The GoM submitted its report on June 7.

Officials said the GST Council would discuss the report as well as consider tax rate cuts for black fungus medicine.

Currently, 5% GST is levied on domestically made vaccines and 12% on CO-VID-19 drugs and oxygen concentrators.

Mr. Modi's successor in the Bihar government Tarkishore Prasad has also been included in the GoM, while former Haryana Minister Captain Abhimanyu has been replaced by the State's Deputy CM Dushyant Chautala. Mr. Pawar replaced former Maharashtra

FM Sudhir Mungantiwar, while Assam's Himanta Biswa Sarma has been replaced by the new FM Ajanta Neog.

The ministry notified the changes in the GoMs on Wednesday along with changes to two other groups set up in January 2019. Gujarat Deputy CM Nitin Patel has been made convenor of the GoM to analyse revenue under the GST regime, replacing Mr. Modi.

Mr. Patel stays convenor of the the real estate sectorfocussed GoM, which now includes Mr. Pawar and Kerala FM K.N. Balagopal.

Mr. Balagopal is the new convenor of the GoM overseeing implementation of eway bills for moving gold and precious stones.

Some IT roles command 50% wage premium: Balakrishnan

Information technology (IT), pharma and e-commerce have bucked the trend of job losses, emerging as top hirers between February and April, said a top HR official. The hiring surge comes in

the backdrop of an estimated 8.6 million salaried jobs, especially in tourism and hospitality, being lost in the same period, as data from the Centre for Monitoring Indian Economy showed. In the three months, the

IT industry saw a surge of more than 100% in demand growth for skilled technical job roles, said Sudhakar Balakrishnan, group CEO,



FirstMeridian, a human resources (HR) firm. "In IT, some specialised roles are commanding a wage premium of 30-50%," Mr. Balakrishnan said.

Since demand for medicines has risen, the pharma sector is also hiring, he said. In healthcare, the govern-

ment's decision to employ medical and nursing students who are yet to pass the qualifying examinations, to bridge the demand-supply gap, has enhanced employment, he said. "In healthcare, over three lakh jobs have been created." Home delivery of food

and grocery as well as closure of markets has led to increased pressure on e-commerce firms that have been hiring in thousands. The warehousing sector is also hiring to support e-commerce.

"Almost 75,000 temporary jobs are available, led by sectors such as e-commerce, retail, IT/ITeS and financial services," he added

'Real estate hit worse by second wave than first'

About 90% of real estate developers feel that the second wave of the COVID-19 has been more 'devastating' on their business than the first one, as new sales and collections have fallen drastically since April this year, as per a survey by realtors' body Credai.

Most developers (95%) fear project delays because of localised lockdowns across States. The association, which has about 13,000 members in various States, released a survey of its 4,813 members from 217 cities, conducted across the country between May 24 and June 3 to assess the impact of the second wave of



COVID-19 on the real estate sector. Labour shortage, financial constraints, approval delays, increased construction costs, weakening customer demand are key challenges highlighted by developers.

About 95% of builders said customers had postponed purchase decisions due to the second wave.

Boxing star Dingko Singh passes away

COVID survivor succumbs to cancer after long battle

Asian Games gold medallist Dingko Singh, who inspired a generation of Indian boxers with his feat in Bangkok in 1998, passed away at Imphal on Thursday after a prolonged battle with cancer. His death was confirmed by a close family friend.

Dingko was 42 and is survived by his wife, son and daughter. He had been battling cancer since 2017 and recovered from a bout of CO-VID-19 last year.

According to boxers close to Dingko, the iconic pugilist's health started deteriorating about three months back. The end came early on Thursday.

Rise from the depths

Dingko rose to prominence by winning the 1997 Kings Cup in Bangkok. He could not make it to the 1998 Asian

Games squad after his second-round exit in the Kuala Commonwealth Lumpur Games and took to alcohol out of frustration.

Dingko was included in the squad at the last minute and gave his best to bring India its first boxing gold medal in 16 years.

In an earlier interview.

Dingko said his semifinal bout against local favourite and World No. 2 Wong Prages Sontava was the toughest fight of his career. The Thai supporters threw beer cans

at him after the bout. Dingo beat World No. 3 Timur Tulyakov of Uzbekistan in the bantamweight final to corner glory.

On his return to Imphal, he was accorded a hero's welcome. The Manipur Government even named a road after him.

He was conferred the Arjuna Award in 1998 and Padma Shri in 2013.

All 21 amendments, including a few to set right some startling anomalies, were passed unanimously in the Annual General Meeting here on Thursday as part of the process to fall in line with the Sports Code of the Sports Ministry.

These include shifting of headquarters from Chennai to New Delhi, formation of the Ethics Commission, an

Appellate Authority and giving the competent courts in New Delhi "the exclusive jurisdiction to hear and decide any and all cases against the AICF."

The AGM also decided to disaffiliate an already-suspended Bengal Chess Association and gave affiliation to Sara Bangla Daba Sangsthan.

Show-cause notice

The AICF joint-secretary Atanu Lahiri has been issued a show-cause notice for anti-AICF activities. Further, an FIR will be filed against Lahiri's colleague from Bengal, Antarip Roy for maligning AICF on social media platforms

Y. Suman, erstwhile officebearer of the Andhra Pradesh, faces an FIR for having not paid the prize-money of ₹20 lakh following a tournament in the State. "These decisions are part


