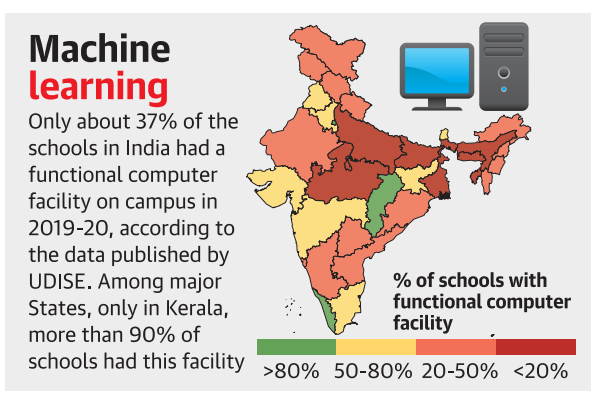
## In last academic year, only 22% schools had Internet

Less than 30% govt. schools had computers: report

In the academic year that ended with school closures due to COVID-19, only 22% of schools in India had Internet facilities, according to Education Ministry data released on Thursday.

Among government schools, less than 12% had Internet in 2019-20, while less than 30% had functional computer facilities. This affected the kind of digital education options available to schools during the pandemic, as well as plans for



hybrid learning in the days ahead. The Unified District Information System for Education Plus (UDISE+) report collates data from more than 15 lakh schools across the country.

## 9 European nations clear SII job

EU starts 'Green Pass' travel facility for those who have taken authorised vaccines

Nine European countries have given recognition to the Covishield vaccine produced by the Serum Institute of India (SII), informed sources said. The confirmation came on Thursday when the European Union (EU) started the "Green Pass" facility, which will allow people vaccinated with an authorised set of vaccines to travel within its zone, covering 27 countries.

The nine countries' move is a "national" move by them and not by the EU, headquartered in Brussels.

The EU member-states that have recognised Covishield include Austria, Germany, Slovenia, Greece, Iceland, Ireland and Spain.

Estonia has confirmed that it would recognise all the vaccines authorised by the Government of India for travel of Indians, said an informed source. As a Schengen state, Switzerland, though not a EU member, al-

lows Covishield. German Ambassador Walter J. Lindner said, "Confirming that a double shot of Covishield is fully recognised by Germany as valid proof of anti-COVID vaccination." Germany, however, has a tra-

vel ban in place for Indians as India has been recognised as a "virus variant country."

"This [confirmation] does nevertheless not modify existing travel or visa restrictions for travellers from areas of concern/virus variant areas," said Mr. Lindner.

The nine European countries' clearance, however, is unlikely to translate into an automatic clearance of Covishield as an equivalent to the "Green Pass" that recognises Pfizer/BioNTech's Comirnaty, Moderna's Spikevax, Oxford-AstraZeneca's Vaxzevria and Johnson & Johnson's Janssen.

## Akhil Gogoi freed in CAA violence case

'Court said govt. charges were bogus'

Assam MLA and Rajiv Dal president Akhil Gogoi walked out of jail on Thursday after a special court of the National Investigation Agency (NIA) acquitted him of all charges in the second of the two cases related to the anti-Citizenship (Amendment) Act violence in the State in December 2019.

The activist-turned-politician, who represents the Sib-

sagar Assembly constituency, was discharged in the first case on June 25. He was in jail since December 2019.

"The court has proven that the government's charges against me were bogus. This is a historic day for the Indian judiciary," Mr. Gogoi said. The cases against Mr. Gogoi were registered on the basis of two FIRs lodged with the Chabua police station in Dibrugarh district and the Chandmari police station in Guwahati. The Chandmari case had the additional charge that he had links with a Maoist organisation.

The NIA had pursued the cases filed under relevant sections of the Indian Penal Code and the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Amend-

ment Act (UAPA) for alleged criminal conspiracy, sedition, promoting enmity between groups on grounds such as religion, race and language, assertions against national integrity, and support to a "terrorist organisation".

"A case was filed against me for my links with CPI [Maoist]. In another case, I was charged with inciting violence during the anti-CAA agitation. The court proved these were fake charges," Mr. Gogoi said.

## Won't allow any foreign force to bully China, says Xi

Strong warning comes on party anniversary

China's ruling Communist Party on Thursday marked its centenary with a massive parade in Beijing and a warning from leader Xi Jinping to "any foreign forces" that China would not be "bullied".

In an hour-long speech to

a crowd of thousands at Tiananmen Square, Mr. Xi hailed China's "national rejuvenation" — a theme he has emphasised since taking

over in 2012 and found mention 24 times in his speech — and the leadership of the party, upon which, he said, China's "success hinges". He also delivered a strong warning. "We have never bullied, oppressed, or subjugated the people of any country, and we never will. By the same token, we will never allow any foreign force to bully or subjugate us."

## HC gives a pat on the back for stray dogs

'They have a right to food and water'

The Delhi High Court has directed that every Resident Welfare Association (RWA) should form "Guard and Dog partnerships" in consultation with the Delhi Police Dog Squad, so that dogs can be trained to work as guard dogs and yet be friendly to residents of a colony.

Justice J.R. Midha issued a slew of directions on the contentious issue of feeding stray dogs. The High Court said stray or street dogs have the right to food and citizens have the right to feed them, but in exercising this right, care and caution should be taken to ensure that it does not impinge upon the rights of others.

### 'Duty to feed'

The High Court also ruled that it should be "the duty and obligation of every RWA or municipal corporation (in case RWA is not available) to ensure that every community dog in every area has access to food and water in the absence of caregivers or community dog feeders".

Feeding of community dogs has to be done in areas designated by the Animal Welfare Board of India (AWBI) in consultation with RWA or municipal corporation.

While determining the "designated area", it has to

be kept in mind that "every dog is a territorial being, and therefore, the street dogs have to be fed and tended to at places within their territory which are not frequented, or less frequented, and sparingly used by the general public and residents", it said.

Stray dogs are protected under the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act, 1960, and rules enacted under Section 38 of the Act, particularly the Animal Birth Control (Dogs) Rules, 2001, which makes it illegal for an individual, RWA or estate management to remove or relocate dogs.

A 2006 Office Memorandum of the Central government carried specific rules against government servants who indulge in acts of cruelty to animals. The rules make the government servant liable for action under the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act.

"Such acts of defiance be noted down in the ACR (annual confidential report) files of government employees. If any such complaint is received by AWBI, the same be sent to the office concerned for being placed in the ACR file of the government employee for necessary action as per CCS rules," the High Court ordered.

## Focus on planning vaccine drives, not creating panic: Harsh Vardhan

11.5 crore vaccine doses given in June, says Health Minister

Health Minister Harsh Vardhan on Thursday said "State leaders" should focus on planning COVID-19 vaccination drives, rather than "creating panic".

In a series of tweets, he said he had seen "irresponsible statements from various leaders regarding the largest vaccine drive". He said after the Centre started providing

75% of vaccines for free, vaccination picked up pace and 11.5 crore doses were given in June.

States had been informed in advance about the supplies for July, said the Minister. He said 12 crore doses would be supplied in July, not including private hospitals' supply.

"If there are issues in States, it shows that they need to better plan their vac-

cination drives. Intra-State planning & logistics are the responsibility of the States. I request these leaders to desist from their shameless urge to play politics even in the midst of a pandemic."

In another tweet, he said: "If these leaders are aware of these facts and are still giving such statements, I consider it most unfortunate. If they don't know, they need to focus on governance..."

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## 'Army working to deal with drone threat'

Army Chief Gen. Manoj Naravane on Thursday said that with easy availability of drones, they would be increasingly used in all sorts of combat, both by state and

non-state actors, and capabilities were being developed to deal with them.

rent levels that had helped build trust between the two sides.

His comments came after explosions last Sunday at the Jammu Air Force station.

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# Teen shoots brother for slapping him during tiff

Victim disliked him talking to sister-in-law

A 19-year-old boy has been apprehended for allegedly killing his elder brother for slapping him in north-east Delhi's Shiv Vihar.

A senior police officer said that the accused has been identified as Prashant, who works at a shop, and the victim is his 22-year-old brother Prem Shankar, who was studying in Delhi University's School of Open Learning.

The police said that Prem got married a little over a month ago. Prashant used to talk to Prem's wife's sister, which he objected to. "Prem never liked his brother talking to his sister-in-law and he had told Prashant about it. However, the latter never agreed. On June 26 night,

Prem found Prashant talking to her again to which he objected. It led to an argument," said the officer.

Prem allegedly slapped Prashant and in a fit of rage, the latter brought a gun and shot Prem. The victim died on the spot, the police said.

### Kin try to cover up

The family decided not to report the matter to the police. They went to cremate the body but the priest saw the bullet wound and told them to first get a no-objection certificate from the police. It was then that Prashant's father called the police. The body was taken for post-mortem and the accused was apprehended.

The police said that a case has been registered under various IPC Sections.

# 'HC ruling will ensure dog lovers are not harassed'

It comes at a time when crimes against animals are rising, say animal lovers, adding that it will ensure they are not ill-treated

Animal rights activists and dog lovers on Thursday welcomed the Delhi High Court ruling that stray or street dogs have the right to food and citizens have the right to feed them. Feeding stray dogs has been an issue that has polarised opinions in the city for a long time and has led to fights in neighbourhoods.

Many of them are relieved after the ruling. Avinash Singh, a resident of Sector 20 in Noida, says he was attacked by his neighbour a year ago for feeding street dogs outside his house. He registered an FIR against his neighbour and is still pursuing the case. "Dogs are not a nuisance but they are man's best friend. I was attacked by my neighbour a year ago for feeding street dog outside my house. No one has right to hurt dogs, they also have a place in the planet like other creatures," Mr. Singh said. Similarly, Nazia Shakeel, a

resident of Mayur Vihar, said that she once filed a complaint against her neighbour for killing two puppies of a street dog. "Even police tried to hush the case. I feed dogs in my society from my personal money every day and I get satisfaction. If people are not feeding dogs then they should not stop those who are feeding and loving them," said Ms. Shakeel.

Animal rights groups feel communities need to accept that it is their responsibility to take care of stray dogs. "Dogs and cats have been domesticated by humans from their wild ancestors and are on the streets because of us. We have made them dependent on humans for food, water and care. We commend the Delhi HC for acknowledging it," said Manilal Valliyate, CEO of PETA India.

### Encourage adoption

He added that without human help, community dogs and cats face starvation, dehydration, untreated wounds

and injuries, and people should be encouraged to opt to adopt a dog or cat in need from an animal shelter or the street.

Animal activist and lawyer Gauri Puri said that despite laws and guidelines protecting rights of community dogs in India, the implementation and enforcement is weak and often, efforts of animal activists to seek enforcement of

such laws have been rendered insignificant.

"The judgment sets a much-needed precedent that strikes a defined balance between the constitutional obligation of the statutory authorities to protect community animals vis-à-vis the fundamental duties, moral and social responsibilities of RWAs to ensure that statutory protection is provided to communi-

ty animals," Ms. Puri said, adding that, crimes against animals have substantially increased and most of these are against community dogs who do not have a permanent caretaker or owner.

### Social responsibility

She feels that the judgment sensitises the issues pertaining to animals and gives much hope to animal lovers. "By directing the police to ensure no animal feeder is harassed or prohibited by the RWA, this judgment would go a long way in aiding the animal feeders to ensure action by the police in case of any

harassment. It would be interesting to see how RWAs deal with this moral and social responsibility towards animal welfare," Ms. Puri said

Divya Puri, founder of Karan Puri Foundation that runs a community kitchen feeding 450 animals a day and works with municipal corporations for sterilisation and vaccination of animals, said that with the recent spike in cases of harassment and cruelty towards animals, the court order will make it easier to fight for the rights of our animals.

"Justice R. Midha gave an 86-page long judgment where he emphasised and reiterated on various guidelines issued by Animal Welfare Board of India for stray animals. Right to food, water and treatment, protection of caretakers and involvement of RWA/municipal body as a community to look after strays is a welcome step towards peaceful coexistence," she said.

# Chinese 'manjha' seized during inspection in Central Delhi

Six kg of Chinese 'manjha', which is banned in the city, was seized from a man during an inspection by government officials at shops selling kites in Central Delhi.

On Wednesday, when a team of officials was carrying out inspection at shops selling kites in Hauz Qazi, they noticed a suspicious looking man with a jute bag, said an official.

"On seeing the officials, he ran away from the spot and could not be arrested. But he left the bag behind," said District Magistrate (Central) Akriti Sagar.

"Last year, a boy's throat got slit in west Delhi due to Chinese 'manjha'. We are carrying out inspections now as the kite flying season is about to begin and a lot of people fly kites on August 15 too. We will continue the inspections at least till August 15," Ms. Sagar said.

# Stray dog found dead in Defence Colony

Preliminary probe suggests it died after falling from a height; case registered

Delhi Police has registered a case after a stray dog was found dead under suspicious circumstances in South Delhi's Defence Colony on Thursday.

Preliminary investigation suggested that the dog died after falling from a height.

However, probe is under way to ascertain the exact cause of death, the police said.

### Woman complained

The matter came to light after a complaint was received from a resident of Lajpat Nagar IV at Defence Colony police station against the Residents' Welfare Association of the

area alleging that the stray dog was thrown from the third floor of a building in the colony, the police said.

According to police, the complainant who runs a pet clinic in her area, regularly visits Sadiq Nagar to feed stray dogs and during her visit on June 29, she spotted the dog in a pool of blood. In her complaint, the woman stated that she has been feeding dogs in Sadiq Nagar since the last one year and one of the dogs was found dead on June 29 around 2 a.m.

"It was allegedly thrown from the third floor by a resident living in Block-4A. Many cases like this have been observed. Earlier, a puppy was also thrown, which was rescued by

me and treated at my hospital," she alleged in her complaint.

Following the incident, there was ruckus in the area at night as the complainant and others raised objections and demanded strict action against the culprits.

DCP (South) Atul Kumar Thakur said, "We have registered a case under Section 429 (mischief by killing or maiming cattle, etc. of any value or any animal of the value of ₹50) of the India Penal Code. The matter is being investigated and all aspects are being looked into."

The CCTV cameras installed in and around the vicinity is being scanned to ascertain the sequence of events that unfolded resulting in the death of the dog, the police said.

# Youth stabbed in front of father over minor accident; 6 arrested

Argument broke out after victim's father hit a vehicle

A 20-year-old youth was stabbed to death in front of his father during a scuffle followed by a minor road accident in north-west Delhi's Azadpur, the police said on Thursday.

The deceased has been identified as Dev Priya, a resident of Burari. The police said they have arrested six people in connection with the incident.

A senior officer at Adarsh Nagar police station said they received information about the incident near Kewal Park, Azadpur at 12.20 a.m. "It was found that the victim

was allegedly stabbed during a quarrel with the accused persons. He was rushed to Babu Jagjivan Ram Memorial Hospital and later shifted to Fortis Hospital where he succumbed to injuries," DCP (North-West) Usha Rangani said. A case has been registered, she said.

Jaipal (45), father of the victim, was coming home on his bike when it brushed past another vehicle following which an argument ensued between him and the other person.

Jaipal who was under the influence of alcohol, called his son to the spot

following which the scuffle was pacified.

### Drunk men

There were a few other people sitting nearby who were drunk too. They came to the spot and an argument broke out between them and Jaipal. The accused persons stabbed his son and fled the spot, the police said.

Dev's brother said, "My father's bike hit a mini tempo and an argument broke out. He called us and we reached the spot. The accused started beating us and stabbed my brother."

# Dhansa metro station to get first-ever underground integrated parking facility

Najafgarh-Dhansa Bus Stand section on Grey Line to open by July-end

The Delhi Metro Rail Corporation (DMRC) on Thursday said that the Dhansa Bus Stand metro station on the Dwarka-Najafgarh-Dhansa Bus Stand corridor will be the first ever underground metro station of the Delhi Metro network to have an entire underground floor dedicated for parking vehicles.

In a statement, it said that the work on the 1.8 km-long Najafgarh-Dhansa Bus Stand section on the Grey Line is now almost complete, and with the completion of this section, this corridor will become 6.1-km-long with four stations. "This extension will immensely benefit the residents of the interior areas around Najafgarh. All efforts are being made to open the Najafgarh-Dhansa Bus Stand section sometime later this month after complying with all statutory requirements," the DMRC said.

The station, designed as a four-level underground structure will have a platform at the bottom (at an ap-

proximate depth of 18 metres) followed by the concourse and then an entire floor for parking above it with the roof level at the top (ground level). The DMRC said that the parking facility will be integrated with the main station area where vehicle users will be able to park their cars and two-wheelers and then proceed to the concourse of the station directly using lifts and escalators.

"The facility will have a parking

space for about 110 cars and 185 two wheelers. There would be provision for property development activities at the ground level in the future. The parking facility can be considered a major design-based improvement since no other underground metro station in Delhi Metro's network has any such facility," the DMRC said.

### Long queues

The DMRC also said that metro trains are running almost empty due to COVID-19 restrictions, trains are only 10%-15% of passenger capacity. It said that lockdown guidelines have been further eased by the authorities, enabling most of the economic activities to take place due to which, there has been continuous build up of the passenger crowd outside stations due to regulated entry resulting in inconvenience to them.

"The DMRC regrets the inconvenience caused to its passengers due to these restrictions. It hopes that the situation shall improve once the restrictions are relaxed by the authorities," a spokesperson said.

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# Capital to soon get colour-coded response system to fight COVID

Govt. to take action based on TPR; yellow signifies lowest alert level while red highest

Delhi will soon get a colour-coded response system to control and fight COVID-19 with each colour representing a pre-defined degree of action that needs to be taken, including lockdowns, a Delhi government source said.

The response system has been divided into four types of alerts – yellow, amber, orange, and red – each of which is based on test positivity rate, new cases, and bed occupancy. The government will take actions, including lockdowns of different intensity and ramping up of medical infrastructure, based on the alert level.

"Yellow is the lowest level of alert and red is the highest. So, if the alert is yellow, the measures are taken by the government, including restrictions or lockdowns, will be less severe compared to red, which will see more stringent

measures," the source said.

## Plan awaits L-G nod

The plan is yet to be approved by the Lieutenant Governor (L-G) but it is expected to get his nod in a week's time, said officials. "As per the current plan, the yellow alert will kick in if the TPR [test positivity rate] is over 0.5% for two days in a row or average oxygen beds occupied is over 500 in a week or the cumulative new cases are

1,500 or more in a week," the source said.

Similarly, the red category will kick in if the TPR is more than 5% for two days in a row or if there are over 16,000 new cases in a week or if the oxygen beds occupied are over a particular level.

The plan was prepared by an expert committee formed by the Delhi government on May 27 to prepare for a possible third wave. During the second wave,

there was a shortage of beds and medical oxygen in the city. On many days, less than 20 ICU beds were available in the whole city and many people admitted to hospitals died as the hospitals ran out of medical oxygen.

Even as the second wave hit the city, Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal and Health Minister Satyendar Jain were not in favour of imposing lockdowns.

On March 27, even as cases were rising, Mr. Jain said there is "no possibility of another lockdown". "For me, lockdown is no solution to COVID-19," Mr. Jain had said.

But the government had to impose a lockdown from the end of April to control the situation. The order issued on May 27 on the formation of the expert committee, specifically asked it to prepare "clear guidelines on when to announce lockdown and to what degree".

# Any private person can arrest proclaimed offender, says HC

'Names and pictures of offenders should be made public'

Any private person can arrest a "proclaimed offender" and hand him over without unnecessary delay to a police officer or nearest police station, the Delhi High Court has ruled.

Justice J.R. Midha laid down the guidelines to be followed by the courts before declaring a person as a "proclaimed offender" and the follow-up action needed to be taken by the law enforcement agencies.

The High Court also directed the Delhi Police and Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) to create a Special Cell for tracing out the "proclaimed offenders" for attaching their movable or immovable properties and for their prosecution. This Special Cell be created within a period of four weeks, the court ordered.

While the law with respect to the declaration of a person

as a "proclaimed offender" is well settled, the court noted: "There appears to be the tendency of the Court as well as the Police to close the matter after the person is declared as a Proclaimed Person/Offender and the file is consigned to Record Room".

"This is a serious lapse considering that the criminal law, which sets into motion with the filing of an FIR, comes to an abrupt end which is against the most basic tenets of justice and causes an irreparable injury to the entire society including victims," it said.

As per latest status report submitted by the Delhi Police, there are 26,532 'proclaimed offenders' as on September 31, 2019, of which 3,826 have been arrested, the prosecution has been launched against 1,601 and properties of 28 have been attached.

The High Court said all the courts are directed not to

close the matter after declaring a person as a "proclaimed offender". "Rather, the courts shall direct the police to file the status report with respect to the efforts made to trace the Proclaimed Persons/Offenders; efforts made to trace or attach their movable/ immovable assets/properties and their prosecution in accordance with law," it said. The High Court added that the courts concerned have to monitor the action taken by the police. "Whoever knowingly harbours a Proclaimed Offender to prevent his apprehension is liable to be punished under Section 216 IPC with imprisonment up to 7 years in certain cases," the HC cautioned.

Justice Midha said the names, addresses and pictures of the "proclaimed offenders" be made public on different government websites such as Delhi Police, NCRB, CBI and other States Police.

# Lakha Sidhana joins R-Day violence probe

Gangster-turned-activist Lakha Sidhana, who was wanted in Republic Day violence at Red Fort, has joined investigation on Thursday.

On Tuesday, a Delhi court granted interim protection from arrest till July 19 to Sidhana. A senior officer said Sidhana reached the office of Crime Branch at Prashant Vihar on Thursday afternoon. "He reached Delhi on Tuesday morning and was interrogated for more than four hours," said the officer.

The police had declared a reward of ₹1 lakh for information about Sidhana's whereabouts.

# City reports 93 fresh COVID cases

Spot registration for Sputnik V restricted at Indraprastha Apollo

The city reported 93 new COVID-19 cases in 24 hours, taking the total cases to 14,34,281, according to a health bulletin released by the Delhi government on Thursday.

Also, four deaths were reported in 24 hours and the total number of deaths stood at 24,981. A total of 76,468 tests were done in a day and the test positivity rate (TPR) was 0.12%. Of the total cases, 14,07,943 people have recovered and there are 1,357 active cases.

## Vaccination update

A total of 1,46,225 doses of vaccines were administered in the city on Wednesday

and the city's vaccine stock will last for four days, as per a vaccination bulletin by the Delhi government.

Also, Indraprastha Apollo Hospital has started administering Sputnik V vaccine on Wednesday and about 1,000 people were administered with the vac-

cine on the first day, the hospital said. "Spot registration and walk-in facility for Sputnik V is currently restricted and we are encouraging beneficiaries to register and take appointments through the COWIN app," the hospital said in a statement.

# 'Need to adopt novel approaches in teaching'

Sisodia lays foundation stone for construction of new school in Nasirpur Village

Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia on Thursday said there was a need to urgently adopt novel approaches in teaching and learning to reduce the gap created by COVID.

Mr. Sisodia, also the Education Minister, was speaking at an event to inaugurate the construction of a new placement centre, open theater and auditorium at Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University.

"The education sector has incurred maximum loss due to the pandemic. Reducing the learning gap is a very difficult mission to undertake, but an important one. We have to come to-

gether and take the responsibility of adopting newer and better approaches to teaching and learning in order to reduce this learning gap," Mr. Sisodia said.

Speaking on approaches to use in our online or semi-online modules, he said it would be incredibly unfair

to students if we insist on teaching in traditional ways.

"We need to adopt a massive change in our teaching methods so that we can do justice to our present and future generation of children. I appeal to the teachers to adopt new and innovative methods of teaching and share them with other colleagues so that we can collectively reduce the learning gap of the students caused due to COVID19," the Minister said.

Mr. Sisodia also laid the foundation stone for the construction of a new school in Nasirpur Village in south-west Delhi. The Minister said the land was given to DDA by Gram Sabha and then DDA handed over the

land to Education Department to construct a school, but it was unlawfully captured by the land mafia. But, the Delhi government had recently reclaimed the land.

"The Delhi government will complete the construction of this school within nine months and establish a state-of-the-art schooling facility. Along with providing excellent education, the school will also set up outstanding sports-related facilities including a swimming pool," Mr. Sisodia said.

He added that at present, the nearest school in the area hosts 6,000 students and with the construction of this school, the pressure on the other school will also decrease.

# IGIA sees over 3 times jump in domestic fliers

With fewer COVID cases and relaxation in lockdown restrictions in several States, the Delhi Airport saw a growth in domestic passengers from around 18,000/day in mid of May to over 62,000/day at the end of June in 2021.

A Delhi International Airport Limited (DIAL) spokesperson said according to a survey conducted by the Delhi Airport, 48% of those who flew in June were doing so to visit family and friends while the second most popular category was those going on a vacation, which was 25%. Those traveling on business accounted for 19%. This trend was different in June 2020 when the number of travellers going on vacation was only 2%. The spokesperson added that in June 2019, before the pandemic, around 44% of fliers were vacationers, while 41% were visiting family and friends.

Mumbai, Patna, Bangalore, Pune, Hyderabad, Leh, Chennai, Ahmedabad, Kolkata and Jammu and Kashmir have emerged as the top 10 destinations from Delhi in the May and June, 2021, said DIAL.

It added that to ensure the safety of passengers, several measures have been introduced in the terminals since the outbreak of the pandemic, including frequent cleaning of high-touch areas, using disinfectants and UV light towers among others.

# Govt. enforces HC order on 15% fee deduction in city private schools

'School cannot strike off child's name if parents cannot pay fee'

The Delhi government on Thursday enforced a High Court order that would lead to a 15% deduction in overall fees charged by private schools in the city for the academic year 2021-22. The deduction is in lieu of unutilised facilities.

"In order to clear the confusion and give much-needed relief to parents, Delhi government has issued an order to private schools to charge fees on monthly basis, under approved heads only but with a 15% deduction in the fees for the academic year 2020-21," the Delhi government said. It added that the school management shall not prevent the child from any ongoing activities or strike off the name of the student if the parents are unable to pay the fee due to the current hardship arising due to COVID-19.

"The order to deduct the fees by 15% as directed by the Delhi High Court has been carried out to prevent profiteering and commercialisation in times of COVID. This order directed by the Delhi government is applicable to all the 460 schools that petitioned the HC. The reduction of fees will be a respite for all the students and parents during the time of COVID," the government said.

The government said if the monthly fee of the school in

FY 2020-21 is ₹3,000, the schools are entitled to collect the fee at ₹2,550/month after a deduction of 15%.

If the school has collected the fee in excess of the direction referred above, the same shall be refunded to the parents or adjusted in the subsequent month of a fee to the parents, the govt. said.

An order by the Directorate of Education reiterated that no earmarked levies such as transportation charges will be charged during the period when the school remains closes. It added that in no case shall the school demand and collect fees from the parent/students on a quarterly basis.

Schools have also been directed to not stop the payment of monthly salary nor reduce the existing total emolument to the teaching and non-teaching staff in the name of non-availability of funds.

# Industry body writes to PM, seeks de-sealing of Tikri border

Bahadurgarh Chamber of Commerce and Industry cites losses due to lockdown, farmers' agitation

In Bahadurgarh, an industry body representing around 9,000 industrial units has sought the intervention of Prime Minister Narendra Modi to de-seal the Delhi-Haryana border at Tikri – the protest site of the ongoing farmers' agitation. It cited huge financial losses to businesses and inconvenience to employees.

In a two-page letter, Narinder Chhikara, vice-president of Bahadurgarh Chamber of

Commerce and Industry, has urged the Prime Minister to direct the Delhi Police to open

at least one carriage of the road connecting Delhi and Bahadurgarh for traffic to provide respite to the industry.

"This border sealing is done by Delhi Police and they have not opened the Tikri border yet. For the benefit of the industry, which is stressed and adversely affected first by Covid-19 and then by the protest, we humbly request you to kindly intervene in this matter," reads the letter.

Bahadurgarh, a major industrial town of Haryana, has

around 9,000 MSMEs, including footwear, automobile, spare parts, and industrial manufacturing units employing around 7.5 lakh people directly and indirectly. Mr. Chhikara, in the letter, said around 2,000 units falling in Part-B of Modern Industrial Estate in Bahadurgarh was either closed or on the verge of closure with the transportation of the raw material and finished products to and from Delhi hit due to farmers' agitation for the past 7 months.

He claimed that the sealing

of the border due to the agitation had caused a turnover loss of around ₹20,000 crores to the industry, besides causing difficulty to the factory owners and their employees in commuting between their homes and workplace. He said that most of the employees and factory owners stayed in Delhi and had to take roads through nearby villages to reach Bahadurgarh. He said de-sealing would also bring cheers to lakhs of people of the town and make their life convenient.

Ahead of the Assembly election in Punjab, which are due early next year, insiders maintain that there could be significant changes in the Pradesh Congress Committee (PCC) as well as the Punjab Cabinet.  
The AICC panel, including Leader of the Opposition in the Rajya Sabha Mallikarjun Kharge, AICC general secretary (Punjab) Harish Rawat and J.P. Aggarwal, had a few days ago submitted its

report to Congress president Sonia Gandhi with suggestions to resolve infighting in the party's State unit. The panel is learnt to have suggested that Mr. Sidhu needs to be suitably accommodated. The Chief Minister, however, it was learnt to have made it clear to the panel that PCC should not be headed by another Jat Sikh as the State government is already being headed by one.

**Govt. doctors in Punjab observe a day's strike**

Doctors in Punjab government hospitals observed a day-long strike on Thursday against the delinking of Non-Practising Allowance (NPA) from the basic pay and reduction in the NPA among other demands.  
The call for the strike was given by the Joint Government Doctors Coordination Committee comprising different associations.  
"Across all the hospitals in the State, the PCMS doctors suspended all services on the occasion of Doctor's Day, except emergency, COVID-19, cases related to rape victims and postmortems. Similarly, the veterinarians of the State also boycotted the outpatient department in hospitals for one day except for emergency cases.  
Gate rallies were also held by the doctors at district and tehsil level to register their protest," said Punjab Civil Medical Services Association senior vice-president Dr. Gagandeep Shergil.  
The doctors have been protesting against State's Sixth Pay Commission recommendations surrounding delinking of NPA from the basic pay and reduction in the NPA from 25% to 20%.  
**Threat to intensify**  
Over the past one week, doctors in Punjab's government hospitals have thrice observed day-long strike, including one on Thursday, in support of their demands and have threatened to intensify their agitation if their demands are not fulfilled.

**Three Assam officials arrested by police over killing of egret chicks**

The police in Udalguri district of northern Assam arrested three officials of a municipal board in connection with the killing of more than 250 hatchlings and fledglings of egrets and cormorants on June 24.  
The trio was sent to 14-day judicial custody on Thursday on the basis of a case filed by the Forest Department under relevant sections of the Wildlife (Protection) Act of 1972.  
"The three arrested includes Santanu Das, executive officer of Tangla Municipal Board who issued the order to cut the bamboo groves where the birds were nesting," Forester Mrinmoy Hazarika told *The Hindu*.  
The other two are junior engineer Sadamanda Saharia, who carried out the order, and Milan Sangma, a fourth-grade employee.  
On June 8, Mr. Das had issued a notice to five residents of Tangla's Ward Number 1 saying their neighbours were worried that COVID-19 spread from the droppings of the birds nesting on the bamboo groves on their plots. "You are thereby asked to cut down the bamboo groves for a cleaner, healthier surrounding," the notice read.  
The Board sent some workers to chop a few groves, killing more than 250 chicks of cattle egrets, little egrets and cormorants, before wildlife activists could intervene.

# Telugu States spar over water sharing

A.P. objects to power generation by Telangana; both States deploy police

Simmering tension over power generation by Telangana at Nagarjunasagar continued on the third day on Thursday, even as senior officials from Andhra Pradesh who crossed the border with a letter of protest returned 'unacknowledged' and disappointed. In addition to the Nagarjunasagar project, Telangana is generating power at the upstream Srisailem project and the downstream K.L. Rao Sagar Pulichintala project, joint multi-purpose projects between the Telugu States, amid maximum protection by police forces.

In response to Telangana's firm stand, the Andhra Pradesh government marked its visible protest on Thursday by fortifying its side of the

projects with police, also expressing readiness for any future action.

An official attempt, however, to protest Telangana's stand on water usage to generate power was made by A.P. irrigation and revenue officials late on Thursday. According to Superintending Engineer of NSP (Right Canal) Purushottama Ganga Raju, who entered Nagarjunasagar to register the protest with the NSP Chief Engineer, Telangana was setting aside irrigation responsibilities for power production and letting water go waste.

"The dams are not even filled to capacities, and setting aside irrigation duty for power generation is not proper. We will be answerable to farmers," he said.

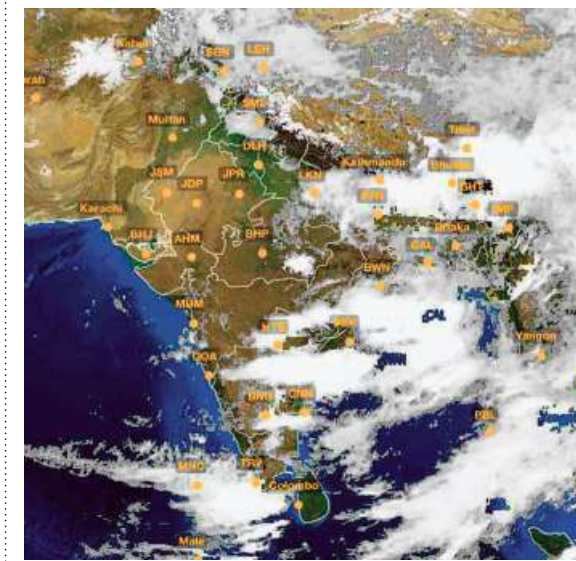

## HC stays stamp duty hike in Lakshadweep

The Kerala High Court on Thursday stayed for three weeks the order of the Lakshadweep administration revising the stamp duty for transfer and registration of land on the islands.

Justice Raja Vijayaraghavan passed the interim order on a petition filed by P.M. Mohammed Salih, a resident of Amini island.

According to him, the stamp duty for the transfer of an interest of the landed property had been drastically increased from 1% to 6% for females, 7% for a jointly owned property by male and female and 8% for others of the total valuation

of the landed property.

Earlier the stamp duty rate was 1% and there was no division based on caste or gender.

The fixation at a varying range was not based on an intelligible differentia.

The petitioner contended that the administration was depriving the islanders of their ability to either purchase or transfer their property amongst the same community.

The rate was revised with an ulterior motive of depriving the inhabitants of their land. The revision of stamp duty by the District Collector of Lakshadweep was unconstitutional, he contended.

# Maharashtra will safeguard farmers' interests, says CM

chief Sharad Pawar demanding to pass a resolution opposing the three farm laws in the monsoon session of the state legislature.

"If the agricultural growth and progress is evident, the situation of economy will automatically improve. Demand from consumers boosts an economy. With more than half of the population being part of agriculture in India, ensuring that their situation is improved would eventually boost demand and subsequently lead to improvement of economy," he said, while virtually inaugurating the D Y Patil Agriculture and Technical University at Talasande in Kolhapur district.

Of the 1,16,667 active COVID-19 patients across the State, the highest 17,086 are in Pune district, followed by Thane and Mumbai with 16,105 and 12,605 patients, respectively.

In Mumbai division, which includes Mumbai and satellite towns, 2,004 new cases were found, taking the region's tally to 15,97,355, while 25 fresh fatalities took the death toll in the region to 32,103.

# Ghazipur clash: FIR filed against 200 BKU workers

Video footage being scrutinised: police

A day after the clash between farmers and BJP workers at the Ghazipur border, the Ghaziabad police registered an FIR against 200 unidentified workers of the Bhartiya Kisan Union.

Police sources said those who damaged the vehicles and created ruckus were being identified through video footage.

The FIR was registered under Sections 147, 148, 223, 352, 427 and 506 of IPC on the complaint of Amit Valmiki, newly appointed general secretary of the State BJP. Mr. Valmiki said the protesters not only damaged the party vehicles but also used casteist slurs against him.

It was during his welcome at the Ghazipur border that the clash broke out

on Wednesday.

Dharmendra Malik, media in-charge of the BKU, said it was unfortunate no action was taken against those who attacked the farmers at the spot which has been their home for the last seven months.

Mr. Malik said the BJP was trying to make it a caste issue but the Valmiki community had shown solidarity with farmers by reaching Sisauli in large numbers.

He reiterated that farmers responded only after the BJP workers tried to seize control of the stage built on the Delhi-Meerut Expressway on Wednesday.

Late in the evening, a counter FIR was registered against identified persons under Sections 147, 303, 504 and 506 of the IPC on the complaint of Bijendera Singh, president of the Ghaziabad unit of the BKU.

# Maharashtra reports 9,195 new COVID-19 cases, 252 deaths

8,634 patients discharged from hospitals

Maharashtra reported 9,195 new COVID-19 cases on Thursday which took its infection tally to 60,70,599, the Health Department said. With 252 fatalities, the death toll due to the pandemic rose to 1,22,197.

The State recorded about 600 fewer new cases but over 100 more fatalities compared to Wednesday, when it had added 9,771 new infections and 141 deaths.

Of the 252 deaths reported on Thursday, 206 occurred in the last 48 hours

and 46 were from the last week, the release said.

As many as 8,634 patients were discharged from hospitals, taking the number of recovered patients to 58,28,535.

Maharashtra's recovery rate of COVID-19 cases is 96.01%, while the fatality rate is 2.01%. The positivity rate is 14.5%.

There are 1,16,667 active patients in the State. Mumbai recorded 656 new COVID-19 cases, taking its tally to 7,22,878, while the death toll increased to 15,472 with 21 fresh fatalities.

As many as 536 new cases were found in Pune city, taking its tally to 4,94,647, while the death toll rose to 8,270 as 105 fatalities were report-

# Navi Mumbai gets first PSA plant at civic-run hospital

To combat the third wave of COVID-19, health facilities at hospitals run by the Navi Mumbai Municipal Corporation (NMCC) are being upgraded.

Thane Guardian Minister Eknath Shinde on Thursday inaugurated the city's first pressure swing adsorption (PSA) plant at Vashi General Hospital, and a HRCT scanning facility at CIDCO exhibition centre. Officials say the civic body is the first to have got a HRCT facility installed at a COVID-19 centre.

Municipal Commissioner Abhijit Bangar said during the second wave of the pandemic, around 1,100 patients were treated at the CIDCO centre and every time they needed a scan, they had to be taken to private hospitals. "Hence, the corporation decided to have its own HRCT machine by collecting ₹1.85 crore through CSR activities of corporates," he said.

The PSA plant, which is first of the five planned by the civic body, has a capacity to generate 1.84 metric tonnes of oxygen per day.

## Relief and recompense

The judiciary did well to assert the rights of pandemic-hit workers and families

It is a matter of relief and satisfaction that the Supreme Court has prodded the Union government to perform its statutory duty of fixing a compensation for the families of those who lost their kin to the COVID-19 pandemic. The order comes close on the heels of a slew of directions on registering the country's vast unorganised workforce and its army of inter-State labourers on a national database and ensuring that none of them went hungry. On the issue of making an ex gratia payment to those affected by the pandemic, a notified disaster under the Disaster Management Act, the Centre initially took the untenable stand that it lacked the financial resources to compensate for every COVID-19 death. However, it later admitted that it was not the adequacy of resources that made it avoid any compensation, but rather its decision to prioritise expenditure in response to the pandemic. It is indeed true that unlike more frequent disasters such as cyclones, earthquakes and floods, a pandemic that has hit every country is not a one-time calamity, but an ongoing and prolonged phenomenon. However, the Court has rightly found that this was not reason enough for the Government to evade its duty to include ex gratia assistance on account of loss of life in its guidelines for "minimum standards of relief" to those hit by the disaster. The Court correctly did not fix a compensation amount for each death, leaving it to a policy decision by the National Disaster Management Authority and the Centre.

In an earlier order, the Court dealt with the need for comprehensive registration of all inter-State and unorganised workers in the country. It is unfortunate that it needed a pandemic, and the resulting humanitarian, social and economic crisis for millions of workers, to give an impetus to the process. The Supreme Court, while disposing of *suo motu* proceedings on the miseries of migrant labourers, has now fixed a deadline of December 31 this year for all States and Union Territories to complete the process. The Centre has been given a deadline of July 31 to make available a portal for its National Database for Unorganised Workers (NDUW) project so that it may be used for registering unorganised workers across the country. However, the Union government, which was directed to make such a common module available to the States as far back as in August 2018, claimed the work on developing the portal was affected due to the fallout of the pandemic. The Court has pulled up the Union Labour Ministry for its "apathy and lackadaisical attitude" and directed that the process of registration should begin by July 31. The verdicts open up the possibility that the inter-State and unorganised workers will at last be able to reap the benefits of welfare laws enacted for them. These interventions signify the rejuvenation and assertion of a court seen as somewhat reticent until recently.

## Later than ever

Puducherry needs an efficient administration that is not immersed in political wrangles

The Union Territory of Puducherry has finally got a Council of Ministers. It has taken almost two months after the Assembly election results, and 50 days since the assumption of office by N. Rangasamy as Chief Minister, for the National Democratic Alliance (NDA) to get five nominees sworn in as Ministers, three from his party, the All India N.R. Congress (AINRC), and two from the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP). What makes Puducherry's first NDA Ministry stand out from the earlier coalition ministries is the inordinate delay in its formation despite there being a pre-poll alliance. The impact of the deadly second wave of the pandemic did not add any sense of urgency to the parties to thrash out their differences. But there could be more trouble to come. Portfolios have not been allocated to the five Ministers who were sworn in on Sunday. The Chief Minister's illness was not the only obvious reason for the delay in cabinet formation; there were also differences between the partners and within the BJP local unit. The central government too appeared to have supported the Chief Minister's not-so-enthusiastic response to the local BJP unit's demand for the post of Deputy Chief Minister as it did not create any such post. However, the BJP, which has nine MLAs in the Assembly, including three nominated legislators, is tasting power for the first time in the Union Territory; the party has also got the post of Assembly Speaker. For all the delay, those involved in the Cabinet formation, including Mr. Rangasamy, deserve credit for the social balance in the Council of Ministers, which has three former Ministers, two representatives of Scheduled Castes and a woman.

There is a strong possibility that the two parties would continue to have differences over the implementation of their manifestos, the key one being the AINRC's emphasis on Statehood which the national party is silent on. The territorial administration is not in the pink of health as far as its finances are concerned. According to the Budget for 2020-21, debt servicing accounts for about 18% of the revenue expenditure of the administration annually, in addition to salaries and pensions constituting around 35% and power purchase, 17%. Under such circumstances, it is not hard to guess how many of the goodies promised by the two parties would translate into reality. Instead of committing itself to many new measures, the Council of Ministers should ensure that existing welfare schemes, including social security pension to age group-wise beneficiaries, are well implemented. The Centre should also be empathetic and provide a package by waiving "legacy loans", those taken about 15 years ago. Mr. Rangasamy and Ministers should ensure corruption-free and quality administration, instead of engaging in political bickering.

# Envisioning the post-pandemic smart city

It is clear that the pathway for 'smart cities', and also other towns not on the map, needs to change

Six years ago, the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP)-led government started a journey of urban development based on the belief that a select set of cities across the country could be 'transformed' and made smart, after they were chosen through a competition among the States. The Centre would support the chosen projects and others would learn from them.

The idea of a transformation is indicated in BJP's manifesto for the 2014 election (<https://bit.ly/3waHAQO> and <https://bit.ly/3h80mll>), where, in a reference to the squalor that has traditionally marked cities and towns, the party declared that they should "no longer remain a reflection of poverty and bottlenecks. Rather they should become symbols of efficiency, speed and scale". This racy vision laid the foundation for a programme to create 100 smart cities.

### The general concept

Globally, there is no uniform definition of smart cities, and the most common features of such urban spaces are derived from concepts in the global north. They generally have a technocentric vision, with sensors everywhere, smart homes, high levels of connectivity, massive and ubiquitous data collection by various agencies, and a continuous flow of useful information to citizens. All this, the reasoning goes, can help governments allocate resources optimally and take timely decisions to raise efficiency and improve standards of living.

India's cities have well-known infrastructure deficits, inadequate water supply, waste management, sewerage and transport arrangements, high levels of pollution

and, with climate change, frequent extremes of floods and drought. The answer to these, the Smart Cities Mission (<https://smartcities.gov.in/>), has been fashioned as an amalgam of upgraded civic services and expensive show-piece projects in the chosen cities, with the investments heavily influenced by the Centre.

### Now, a health focus

Before a complete critique of the expensive programme could emerge, COVID-19 interrupted the lives of cities, confining people indoors for long periods, disrupting economic processes and paralysing vibrant urban life. As the pandemic peaked, thousands had to desperately look for emergency medical care in scarce health facilities, while the flashy smart developments built for leisure and shopping remained shuttered.

Unsurprisingly, when the Smart City Awards 2020 were declared recently, the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs gave one component of the scheme, the Integrated Command and Control Centres (ICCCs), a health focus. These centres, of which 70 are operational, functioned as "war rooms" for COVID-19, and, combined with "other smart infrastructure developed under the mission, helped cities in fighting the pandemic through information dissemination, improving communication, predictive analysis and supporting effective management" (<https://bit.ly/3hmZZEO>), it said.

This is a remarkable image of efficiency, but it would seem incongruous with the lived reality in several States and the national capital during the second wave of the pandemic, as people struggled for information and access to medical care. Yet, one of the States that suffered severely, Uttar Pradesh, shot to the top for implementation metrics of the smart cities projects (<https://bit.ly/3yaBbFX>), apparently because it achieved more than what was envisaged in the centrally-supported schemes. It

added its own set of 'State smart cities'. The fact that U.P., a crucial BJP-ruled State scarred by the pandemic, is bound for elections next year must, of course, be treated as a coincidence. Indore and Surat jointly won top city-level awards, while Madhya Pradesh and Tamil Nadu also won State awards.

### Infrastructural convergence

Over the years, Smart Cities Mission projects converged with other infrastructure programmes such as AMRUT, the Atal Mission for Rejuvenation and Urban Transformation, the PMAY (Urban), the Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana, for housing. Some also get support from international agencies to adopt best practices on mobility and transport, energy and reducing carbon emissions. The latest official count shows that 5,924 Mission projects worth ₹1,78,500 crore have been tendered, indicating the scale of investments. This is in tune with some estimates that globally, 90% of urban development by mid-century will take place in developing countries.

A focus on basic urban infrastructure prioritised by elected representatives was part of national policy since the Third Plan period (1961-66), although the focus shifted to smaller towns away from Bombay and Calcutta in the Fourth Plan (1969-74). After decades of slow experiments, the post-COVID-19 era will sharpen the question of how cities must evolve.

The Danish urban design expert, Jan Gehl, who is averse to the idea of smart cities and "silly gimmicks", speaks of the universal va-

lues of a city as one that is a meeting place of people, inviting them to spend time, walk, bike, and roam around public, semi-public or private gardens. Pedestrianisation over motorisation is also a marker of a good city.

Although they try to accommodate some of these elements, India's smart city plans cannot really aspire for a structural shift, in which the movement of people gets priority over vehicles. In fact, extending the green logic would imply a freeze on all diversion of wetlands and commons for any other development, creating new urban gardens and water bodies, and doing a climate change audit for every piece of infrastructure planned. A green and blue city would mean less destructive flooding, more water to harvest and lower peak temperatures – all of it at very little expense.

### Use for the commons

Cities could be elegant, healthy and smart after the pandemic if they apportion the available road space for bicycles, which exemplify safe travel and can complement expanded public transport when commuters return in big numbers to bus and urban rail. This is consistent with the pan-city goals of the Smart City Mission, but requires State governments to take resolute action. Bicycles represent the ideal urban travel bubble and must be moved from the margins to the centre of policy.

Pedestrianisation, biking and harmonious opportunities for street vending created by allocating more of the commons would also be fully democratic and address the criticism that smart city planning ignores the informality that marks India's urban spaces. This is valid for both cities being retrofitted with facilities and those being developed as greenfield sites. Can more of the commons be turned into farmers' markets, vending grounds and craft centres?

None of this detracts from essential modernisation, such as de-

ployment of multiple sensors to gauge air, noise and water pollution, provision of electronic delivery of citizen services, whether online or in a government office, intelligent public transport, expansion of renewable energy. Recovery of valuable materials from waste remains a lost opportunity even in the biggest cities. It would, however, mean a shift away from flyovers, underpasses and cheap parking lots that serve far fewer citizens.

For citizens, real time control rooms can be meaningful only if they can have a good public dashboard of information. In COVID-19 times, this means access to health alerts, vaccinations, hospital beds and topical advice, rounded off with data on pollution, rainfall, congestion and so on.

Democratising smart cities planning has to ensure every section of society has a voice in the process, and not merely those who have digital access. Pressure to frame projects, however, often cuts out many, and even elected representatives get short shrift.

The Housing Ministry said last year that it had no plan to issue a report card for the 100 smart cities, but was using the Ease of Living Index measured through a public perception survey. Such measurements can be heavily biased if they are not broad based. Quite tellingly, out of 32.2 lakh citizens in 111 cities who participated in a survey, the online channel which could be accessed through a QR code or website attracted 31,05,481 items of feedback (<https://bit.ly/3xmSIQE> and <https://bit.ly/3h1VKSr>).

The pandemic has come as a remarkable opportunity to review the paradigm of smart cities, and to steer the course of hundreds of other towns that are not on the map. They should be helped to frame their plans around people and nature, to learn from mistakes and to avoid expensive technological solutionism.

# A bubble burst is no figment of the imagination

Economic parameters appear confused and investors should not be tempted to ignore macroeconomic factors

Your investment would have doubled by now, had you invested in the stock market in March 2020. An assertion like this triggers an urgent rush to invest in the market and is akin to being under the influence of a "feel-good" hormone. This makes the expectation of 'winning big' feel better than 'just winning' leading to impulsive, even detrimental decisions, attributable to behaviour biases, to use the terminology of behavioural economists.

### Perception versus reality

Investors may not necessarily be always sensible or even capable of perceiving the larger picture. Nobel laureate Daniel Kahneman argues that humans usually use the "first system" of "fast thinking" to hurriedly act and perceive their environment. Consequently, they are susceptible to the 'priming effect', 'framing bias', 'anchoring effect', 'overconfidence bias' and 'availability heuristic'.

These phenomena, thus, play their part in pervading optimistic market conditions. As a result, investors often end up ignoring or overlooking uncertainties and risks involved in their decision.

They get so enamoured with the idea of making a killing that they forget that in the month of March last year itself, the market had tanked a fourth of its capitalisation causing mayhem.

At the same time, investors' decision choices could be significantly influenced by 'nudging', a deliberate tactics and method of behaviour modification by which it is the 'choice architect' that decides who does what and who does so, as argued by the Nobel laureate, Richard H. Thaler. The present surge in the Indian stock market is indeed nudging individual investors to trade more. But who is playing the role of the choice architect and what their intentions are, remain the moot questions.

### Focus on individual investor

National Stock Exchange data indicate that the share of the non-institutional individual investors in equity trading volume has risen to one half of the total turnover in 2021 as compared to around a third in 2016. In contrast, the share of Foreign Institutional Investors (FIIs) in the total trading volume has shrunk to just about a tenth making it half of what it used to be in 2016. Trading in the stock market, the sudden rise, the intraday moves, etc., are, thus, attributable largely to individual traders now.

Their large trading volumes notwithstanding, individual investors have actually contracted their holding of the market capitalisa-

tion. Going by the floating stocks of the market collectively, the FIIs currently own around half of the free float of all Indian companies. Apparently, the retail investors have constantly sold their stake to end up holding less than 20% shares now. Trading, thus, seems to be the mainstay of retail investing and this is what makes them more vulnerable to the vagaries of the market.

### The market today

During the period under discussion, the fundamental, economic and environmental parameters look confused. GDP has shrunk by at least 7.5%, unemployment rate has been on the rise, and an overwhelming number of people are said to be sliding back into poverty or becoming poorer than a year before. At the same time, Centre for Monitoring Indian Economy Pvt. Ltd. data of the listed companies reveal a rise in their profit, due to rationalisation and cost-cutting.

Investors might be tempted to ignore macroeconomic factors and invest in such stock believing that it is the profit that impels the

stock prices. In reality, however, share price is expected to ascend if a company declares to cut its wage bill. This probably explains why stock markets around the world have been on the rise amidst the novel coronavirus pandemic; demand may have declined but profits have been least impacted. At the larger economic level, however, real wages have plunged. Clearly, the market has not entirely decoupled itself from the economic indicators.

Stimulus or profit or euphoria caused by happy hormones, whatever the reason apart, the stock market has been drawing available excess liquidity. Simultaneously, frequent trading has been propelling the stock market further up. But how long can this last? Established wisdom suggests that corporates cannot sustain contraction in the economy for long. Sustained decline in demand caused by waning disposable household income would catch them soon.

### A grey cloud

Consequently, corporates would be saddled with unsold goods or services, leading to a drop in their prices, with a consequential effect on their revenue which would exert downward pressure on their stock prices. This is, however, not to deny that stock markets are always futuristic and stock prices imitate investors expectations. But how long can expectation drive the market if the economy does not revive soon?

Robert J. Shiller, another Nobel laureate, attributes this phenomenon of creating a possible bubble to irrational exuberance. And bubbles are seldom long lasting and burst sooner rather than later. When bubbles burst, they cause a kind of financial earthquake, in turn destabilising public trust in the integrity of the financial system. Critically, as the past portrays, individual investors, with all their vulnerabilities, suffer the most devastating consequences.

Retail investors are as well susceptible to overreaction when negative news hits the market. For example, a week of turbulence eroded market capitalisation of over ₹1-lakh crore in the case of just six listed companies of the Adani group (<https://bit.ly/2UW0jBM>). For an individual investor, who had purchased these shares during the last month, this means that he lost his entire investment. These companies are closely held, with promoters holding around 75% stake, but imagine the mayhem if this happens to a widely held company. A bubble burst is in the realm of recurrent reality and cannot be ignored as a figment of the imagination.

Right now, the immediate repercussion is the plight of the top civil servant. The second meeting was preceded with a lot of hype. An octogenarian leader of acclaimed eminence made his premises and hospitality available to another octogenarian, who has apparently a grouse that his eminence has not

received due recognition, for the latter's *Manch* to hold a get together of like-minded persons drawn from different walks of life, though the political veneer was barely concealed. The outcome of the meeting was a 'damp squib'. The participants in the meeting were dubbed second-rank leaders. So, another outcome was rank consciousness. Herein lies the rub. The gerontocracy is wary of vacating its position to the next generation. The sooner the transition takes place, the better will the nation's interest be served.

The meeting between the Union Government and the Jammu and Kashmir leadership stands out for the meet's cordial atmosphere. Leaders with diverse backgrounds, and of different generations, sat for a few hours discussing contentious issues without acrimony, the sole focus being only the welfare of people of J&K and the integrity of the country. There is a message for the country. Those in public life who trade charges against each other, in language most foul, should learn from the J&K leadership that courtesy

begets courtesy.

# What lies ahead for IBC and stressed assets resolution?

PARLEY

The size of the haircut should not be the gauge of the success of the IBC process

*The Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code (IBC), notified in 2016, has been the key mechanism for addressing corporate distress and the accumulation of bad loans in the financial sector since its implementation. Recent National Company Law Tribunal (NCLT) rulings have also put the spotlight on the IBC. In a conversation moderated by Suresh Seshadri, Aparna Ravi and R.K. Bansal discuss questions about the effectiveness of the process and the road ahead. Edited excerpts:*

**It has been five years since the IBC came into force. How has it fared and what are its biggest challenges?**

**R.K. Bansal:** One basic difference between us and other countries is that our companies are mainly promoter-owned and owners run the companies. In most of the developed countries, companies are run by professionals and the ownership is widely spread. Here, because it is owned and controlled as well as managed by mostly the same people, that creates a problem in taking over the asset.

I think, overall, over the last five years, it has done quite well. And Section 29A [of the IBC], which was introduced by the government later, also helped in resolving some of these problems.

I would say the recoveries and resolutions have been quite good, quite fast, compared to other measures available to the lenders. Today, on average, one can see maybe about three years [for recoveries and resolutions] as compared to an earlier timeline of five years, six years or more. But there are infrastructure issues. We need more NCLTs and we need more members. There are a lot of vacancies, a lot of delays in appointments, NCLAT [National Company Law Appellate Tribunal] benches are few. So, that is one area perhaps that we need to strengthen. The second issue is that a lot of these are very old cases – what we call stock of NPAs [Non-Performing Assets]. So, once this round is over, in future, perhaps, there will be fewer cases and we should be

able to take care. The Act will do better actually, if not many cases go to the NCLT. Because the fear of losing the company under Section 49A will push the promoters to find a resolution.

**Aparna Ravi:** The initial version of the IBC that came into effect in December 2016 is quite different from what we have today. But around this whole issue about the NCLT's functioning itself – I think there have been a lot of delays in implementation, whether it's in terms of approvals, having an application admitted itself. In some situations, an application is filed for admission and it takes almost a year to actually be admitted. And even things like the approval of a resolution plan... The resolution plan that was approved for Jet Airways recently was actually approved by the Creditors' Committee in October 2020. The NCLT has a very limited role: it just needs to approve the resolution plan based on whether the plan complies with applicable law. But it [resolution plan for Jet Airways] was only approved in June 2021. These kinds of delays are a significant issue with the implementation of the code, coupled with the fact that even though the Supreme Court has clarified a number of legal positions in the last few years around the IBC, it doesn't seem like in some situations the tribunals have laid to rest these positions. They still allow these same issues to be litigated again. This seems to me the biggest implementation challenge with the code itself.

**There are concerns about the extent of haircuts that banks and financial creditors are having to take in order to achieve resolution. Are these concerns valid or misplaced?**

**RKB:** I would not say they are misplaced, but I would say we need to understand the context. The haircut figure looks large in some cases because of many reasons. I remember the first case approved by the NCLT was Synergies-Dooray, where the haircut was 94%. But at that time this was not prominent as this was a

smaller case. Now, why does it happen? The claims filed are of three types: secured lenders, operational creditors, unsecured lenders, and then you have a lot of guarantee obligations of that company. Now, that guarantee obligation sometimes makes the dues multiple times that of a normal case. I have seen some cases where the total dues may be ₹500 crore, but because of the guarantee, the total dues claimed are from ₹6,000 crore to ₹7,000 crore. So, when the ₹500 crore company goes for resolution and you get a plan for ₹200 crore, it is 40%, so the haircut is 60%. But then if you compare this ₹200 crore figure with ₹7,000 crore-₹8,000 crore including guarantees, the haircut will look very large. And this happens typically in holding companies, which are the main companies and which have given the guarantees – whether it was OMLL, Lanco Infra, or even recently Videocon, I mean those type of cases where there are a lot of assets, a lot of companies in the group, and guarantee has been given for many of these companies by this company. So, now, the question is haircut is relevant in the context of what is the asset, what are the debts, what are the guarantees, what are the other group assets. Now, out of the first 12 cases filed by the banks in 2017, even today, five got the resolution, which were steel cases because steel is a commodity sector and the assets are good. So, you got very good value in those. Out of five also their percentages are different, of course: Essar Steel or Bhushan Steel got quite a good value, then Bhushan Power and Steel somewhat lower, and Monnet was the least in those five cases. Then, you had a company called Binani Cement which was not out of the 12 but you got almost

more than 100% because the asset was good. Then you had two, three cases which are going into liquidation, so banks may not get much – the haircut could be as high as 99% or 95%. Like Lanco Infra, which was a holding company again, or an EPC [engineering procurement and construction] company like Era Infra or Jyothi Structures.

Finally, it depends on the company and its asset. You will get value if the asset is good. Some businesses would have failed, like many of the EPC companies, where haircuts are very high. Because basically in an EPC company there are hardly any assets, except some equipment. And some of them have diverted funds. Some of them lost money in contracts, government dues are there, government departments or entities actually withheld dues, levied a lot of penalties because of the delays. I think you need to understand that.

**AR:** I don't think the size of the haircut itself is really a measure of the success of IBC. If the process itself is to improve, what we need to think about is how to attract more buyers or a more diverse range of strategic buyers to be willing to bid for assets, and submit resolution plans under the code. And I think a big part of that is improving the process in

terms of minimising the delays, increasing the predictability. Those are issues that do need to be ironed out.

**Is there something, especially from the legal side, that can be done to improve the process?**

**AR:** One thing is, of course, adherence to the timelines by all the stakeholders. The other area, from a legal point of view, is around who can submit a resolution plan itself. And I think on that Mr. Bansal too had a number of views on Section 29A that prevents promoters, in a lot of cases, from submitting resolution plans. I understand the rationale behind this, and there are some restrictions under Section 29A that make a lot of sense – for example, a willful defaulter probably should not be allowed to submit a resolution plan under the IBC. But some of the other restrictions such as one on [a promoter] who has had NPAs for over a year, or who's had a personal guarantee that has been invoked... in those cases I think that would result in a lot of the promoters of most companies not being able to submit resolution plans. There has been a relaxation which allows MSMEs to have greater flexibility in terms of promoters being able to submit resolution plans for these companies. This is something that can be considered just to lay the floor open to a larger number of resolution plans. Of course, nobody is required to accept a resolution plan. There needs to be a fair process where many of the processes are open to a number of people. Allowing certain relaxations to Section 29A could be helpful.

**Do you see a larger role for the proposed national ARC in stressed assets resolution?**

**RKB:** The national ARC (Asset Reconstruction Company), or so called 'bad bank', should help. It's a good thing because it's a one-time exercise, a good clean-up exercise. Because a lot of these cases don't have a great resolution plan or they don't have great value left. So, many of these cases perhaps need to be warehoused for some time. If I try to sell a power plant today in thermal power, we may get a value of only ₹2

crore per megawatt, while the country will still need power and a power plant requires ₹5 crore-₹6 crore per megawatt just to build up because there is excess capacity, because there is a problem in the thermal power sector. The other point is that there are not many strategic investors. An asset will have interest or value only if there are more people who are ready to buy, like say the steel cases, where there were a number of suitors. But today in power, there's hardly one or two people in India who will be interested in buying power assets, and typically foreign players don't buy thermal power because of the coal issue and social issues. So, what happens is, today you need to wait for some time for some of these assets. You have to work along, then your recovery will be far, far better. A national ARC will give the time to the banks to resolve these cases over a period of time.

**Besides strengthening the IBC infrastructure, how else could resolution be expedited?**

**AR:** What we do see is that sometimes there isn't an appointment made for these benches for some time... there's one judicial member who is in charge of two benches. Some of those NCLT benches only function on certain days of the week because that's when the judicial member or the technical member are both available, so definitely there needs to be capacity building in terms of NCLT. It's also worth considering that the IBC cases are not the only mandate of the NCLT. They also consider various cases under the Companies Act such as mergers or oppression and mismanagement cases. A different point is also to remember that the IBC is not the only solution for resolving stress. It's important to look at a range of different options both within and outside the IBC for resolving distress, and especially through these pre-IBC mechanisms, one-time settlements, restructuring packages. It's important to look at them all as part of the spectrum. Especially in cases where there is some consensus with the debtor and the debtor and the creditors, these pre-IBC resolutions may work very well as well.

## Delhi's lame duck Assembly

The GNCTD (Amendment) Act prohibits the exercise of free speech in the Assembly and its committees

The Government of National Capital Territory of Delhi (GNCTD) (Amendment) Act, 2021 has been extensively criticised as a retrograde law that turns the clock back on representative democracy. The bulk of criticism has been focused on the reduced autonomy of the elected government and the consequent vesting of several crucial powers in the unelected Lieutenant Governor, who is the representative of the Union government. This is largely attributable to public consciousness of the regular skirmishes between the elected government and the Lieutenant Governor. However, what deserves equal condemnation is the Act's assault on the functioning of Delhi's Legislative Assembly, which has been sought to be reduced to a lame duck.

**A delicate balance**

When the GNCTD Act was enacted in 1992, the Legislative Assembly was given the power to regulate its own procedure, as well as the conduct of its business. This was subject to very limited exceptions concerning financial matters and scrutiny over the Lieutenant Governor's discretionary role. This sought to realise a delicate balance reflecting Delhi's unique constitutional position: neither full state nor a centrally governed Union Territory. However, the Amendment Act drives a coach and horses through this scheme. Now, Delhi's Assembly has no more functional independence worth its name. Its standards of procedure and conduct of business have been firmly tethered to that of the Lok Sabha, depriving Delhi's elected MLAs of an effective say in how their Assembly should be run. Even more insidiously, the Amending Act prohibits the Assembly from making any rule enabling either itself or its committees to consider any issue concerned with "the day-to-day administration of the capital" or "conduct inquiries in relation to administrative decisions". This is rounded off by providing that any rule made before the Amendment Act came into effect that runs counter to this formulation shall be void.

The most insidious impact of this shall be to the exercise of free speech in the Assembly and its committees. A situation where an elected Assemb-

ly is prohibited by law from discussing matters concerning the day-to-day administration of its own territory is one where it is dead on arrival. How can the Assembly be expected to perform its most basic legislative function – that of holding the executive to account – if it cannot guarantee itself the ability to freely discuss the goings on in the capital? What is the use of electing MLAs and endowing them with legislative privilege if they are unable to discuss the governance of the very constituents who elected them?

**Impact on committees**

A note of alarm must also be sounded for the effect on the functioning of the Assembly's committees. These committees are usually inured from the sound and fury of political theatre that pervade sittings of the whole Assembly. Away from the glare of cameras, cooler heads usually prevail and important work gets done. Inquiries are conducted, witnesses and documents are examined, and reports on relevant issues are written. The deliberations and inputs of committees often pave the way for intelligent legislative action. In a way, they act as the eyes and ears for the whole House, which has neither the time nor the expertise to scrutinise issues in depth. It would be impossible for committees to perform this function without the power to conduct inquiries. It is true that many of these inquiries are bound to be broad-based and roving in nature, and may even lead to legislative dead ends. But to pre-emptively injunct a committee from conducting an inquiry "in relation to the administrative decisions" (an extremely broad exception) completely negates the ability of committees to function effectively as the Assembly's advisors and agents. The quality of legislative work emanating from the Assembly is thus ultimately bound to suffer.

This clinical purge of its critical legislative functions has rendered the Delhi Assembly a 'legislature' in name only, unable both to articulate the concerns of the electorate and hold the political executive to account. Surely, Delhi's voters deserve better than that.

## Tracking down meetings behind the scenes

Reporting on back-channel talks is a large part of covering diplomacy

News is a chase, I remember thinking, as we sped down that long, dimly lit road in Sharm El Sheikh, trying to keep up with the Pakistani Foreign Secretary's car. We had spied him leaving the hotel where the Indian delegation was staying and went in pursuit of the car, hoping to doorstep him into telling us where India-Pakistan negotiations, on the sidelines of the Non-Aligned Movement meet being held at the Egyptian resort town in 2009, were headed. Much of diplomatic coverage means tracking down such meetings behind the scenes and back-channel contacts between governments of countries that aren't otherwise willing to speak about their bilateral dialogue. Eventually, the Pakistani diplomat rewarded our persistence with an interview, but that was a rare moment of luck. Journalists trying to cover such awkward tête-à-têtes normally find themselves dealing with aggressive security guards, hostile offi-

cials, and official denials for their stories.

In 2002, I was accosted by an irate posse of Indian officials in Kathmandu for reporting that a meeting had been planned between then Foreign Ministers Jaswant Singh and Sartaj Aziz, on the sidelines of the SAARC summit in progress. Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee had just exchanged an unexpected but frosty handshake with Pakistan President General Pervez Musharraf who had walked up to him on stage and practically forced him into the gesture. The event came a month after the Parliament attack, and Indian and Pakistani troops had begun their massive buildup (Op Parakram) at the Line of Control. The officials who met me angrily denied our story and wanted us to retract it. Fortunately we were saved from the dire consequences they threatened us with, when an intrepid Nepali photographer released a photo of the two Foreign Ministers engaged in talks inside the conference hall and even exchanging what appeared

to be handwritten notes.

The truth is that such contacts are discovered or reported only a fraction of the time they occur: given security restrictions and shrinking access to official events, journalists have to be very lucky or well sourced to even know that these meetings are taking place. A few years ago, some of the most senior Indian and Pakistani journalists were at a conference in Bangkok, and had no idea that just a few hotels away, National Security Adviser (NSA) Ajit Doval and senior Indian officials were meeting with Pakistani NSA Nasir Janjua and their counterparts. At other times, the chase has been made impossible by logistics: at the SAARC summit in the Maldives, the organisers ensured total privacy by housing all official delegations on a completely different island from the journalists. No boats were made available for us to travel across. Travel restrictions that have followed the COVID-19 pandemic are making the situation more difficult, as reporters cover-

ing the recent back-channel contacts between India and Pakistan and India and the Taliban have found out, as despite various officials confirming the meetings, there are no eyewitness accounts of them.

Perhaps the most legendary dodge by interlocutors came about 50 years ago, when U.S. presidential adviser Henry Kissinger went on his secret visit to Beijing to negotiate the opening of U.S.-China diplomatic relations. He went first to Islamabad, just so that he could shake all journalists off his trail, with help from the Pakistani government. During a dinner hosted by President Yahya Khan, Kissinger feigned an illness "due to the heat" and was "invited" to spend a few days in the hill station at Nathia Gali outside Islamabad. Once he was away from the prying eyes of the media, and even his own State Department officials, Kissinger was driven to the tarmac where a Pakistani plane was waiting to fly him to his secret meeting. Operation Marco Polo had just begun.

FIFTY YEARS AGO JULY 2, 1971

### Nixon aide to visit India, Islamabad

Washington, July 1: President Nixon's foreign policy advisor, Mr. Henry Kissinger, who will be visiting Delhi and Islamabad shortly, in the course of a much broader and separate assignment dealing with Vietnam, is understood to have undertaken this side-trip to gauge the reaction of the two countries to the stance the U.S. has taken on East Bengal so far. The visit was arranged on the U.S.'s initiative and sources here said that Mr. Kissinger rather than Secretary of State Rogers was chosen for the purpose because President Nixon wanted to give the mission a White House rather than a State Department stamp. Sources here cautioned against reading too much into Mr. Kissinger's trip to India – they suggested that his mission was primarily connected with the Vietnam war and discussions in that regard in Saigon. The sources added that while in Delhi, Mr. Kissinger will in all probability try to cool the tempers there – tempers which have been frayed considerably by the continued supply of American war material to the Pakistan army. Mr. Kissinger would in this connection urge India to continue to follow a policy of "restraint". In Islamabad, Mr. Kissinger, the sources said, would once again try to nudge Yahya Khan to move a "little more rapidly" towards a restoration of normalcy in East Bengal.

### The disappearance of colds

The Medical Correspondent of the "Times" writes in its Trade Supplement: - Few more astonishing examples of the inter-relationship of health and work have ever been afforded than the gradual clearing away of smoke which has taken place in the atmospheres of all our great cities during the present crisis. It is a tragic spectacle enough; but if the lessons which it teaches are learned, we may yet be able to reap some advantage from it. The first of these lessons is evidently purely commercial. It is the sheer, the absurd, waste represented by all this unburnt and half-burnt fuel which ten thousand chimneys belch into our air. This lesson does not concern health except in so far as it indicates in what way man may cheat himself of the fruit of his labour and so remain a poorer individual than he need – and hence a less healthy one. The second lesson concerns us all. For this coal dust, so freely driven into our air, is an irritant. It is more over a screen shutting out that portion of the sunlight which acts as a cleanser and a killer of bacteria.

## Nine European nations clear SII job

The European Medicines Agency (EMA), which created the authorised list, is yet to include Covishield, which is based on AstraZeneca's formula, as an acceptable vaccine. The nine countries' move showed that some EU member-states are making individual policies that are suitable to their health and international requirements.

Air France has declared that Indian passengers who have taken doses cleared by the EMA are required to undergo seven days of "mandatory quarantine".

"These passengers must present a COVID-19 vaccina-

tion certificate demonstrating that at least four weeks have elapsed since the first dose of Johnson & Johnson vaccine, or two weeks have elapsed since the second dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech, AstraZeneca or Moderna vaccine, or since the first dose of these vaccines if the passenger holds proof that they previously have been infected with COVID-19," said Air France, laying down the domestic requirement, which places additional conditions on even those Indian passengers who have taken doses of the vaccines meant for the "Green Pass".

## In last academic year, 22% schools had Internet

The vast majority of the country's 26 crore school-children have not set foot in a school since then, depending instead on various forms of distance education.

The availability of digital education — whether via live, synchronous teaching on apps like Zoom, or through recorded lectures, emails, WhatsApp or educational apps — was largely dependent on whether schools, teachers and parents had access to the necessary infrastructure. In many States, teachers came to school and taught in their own empty classrooms, using their blackboards and lab facilities, while facing a computer screen that communicated the lessons to their students at home.

However, the UDISE+ data makes clear the digital divide, which made this a viable option only in some States.

In many Union Territories, as well as in the State of Kerala, more than 90% of schools, both government and private, had access to working computers.

In States such as Chhattisgarh (83%) and Jharkhand (73%), installation of computer facilities in most government schools paid off, while in others such as Tamil Nadu (77%), Gujarat (74%) and Maharashtra (71%), private schools had higher levels of computer availability than government schools.

However, in States such as Assam (13%), Madhya Pradesh (13%), Bihar (14%), West Bengal (14%), Tripura

(15%) and Uttar Pradesh (18%), less than one in five schools had working computers. The situation is worse in government schools, with less than 5% of Uttar Pradesh's government schools having the facility.

The connectivity divide is even starker. Only three States — Kerala (88%), Delhi (86%) and Gujarat (71%) — have Internet facilities in more than half their schools. This will make it hard for most schools to implement the options for hybrid learning as schools try to re-open with staggered attendance post the pandemic.

More encouragingly, 90% of schools across the country have facilities for handwashing, which will gain added importance as they implement COVID-19 safety protocols while reopening. More than 80% of schools conducted medical check-ups during the year before the pandemic. Temperature testing and monitoring of symptoms need to become a daily activity, according to the Centre's health protocol for schools wishing to reopen.

The Gross Enrolment Ratio (GER) improved in 2019-20, with 98% of students in Classes 1-8 attending school, though the GER for secondary and senior secondary students stood at 78% and 51% respectively.

The dropout rate at secondary level was 17% in 2019-20, with experts warning that dropouts are likely to surge due to the pandemic.

## Akhil Gogoi freed in CAA violence case

He had spent the last few months in the Gauhati Medical College and Hospital due to ailments. He slammed the BJP-led State government for "misusing" the UAPA and the NIA. The court's judgment would influence future cases, he stated.

Soon after his release, Mr. Gogoi visited the house of Sam Stafford, a school student who was among the five persons killed in the anti-CAA violence in Guwahati. He expressed solidarity with the parents of the boy who died in police firing.

Mr. Gogoi's advocate Shantanu Borthakur said three others — Dharjya Konwar, Manas Konwar and Bitu Sonowal — who were arrested with him were also discharged on Thursday. The three, members of va-

rious wings of the Krishak Mukti Sangram Samiti that Mr. Gogoi had founded, had been out on bail.

"The court's ruling has exposed the State government's attempts to target our party president," Bhaskar Saikia, Rajjor Dal working president, said.

The NIA court last week granted two days' parole to Mr. Gogoi to meet members of his family in Guwahati and eastern Assam's Jorhat. His 84-year-old mother Priyada Gogoi is ailing. She had campaigned for her son in the May 27 Assembly elections.

"My focus will be on working for the development of my constituency besides opposing any anti-people policy the government tries to impose," Mr. Gogoi said.

## Normal rainfall likely in July

But IMD says the monsoon will recover only after the second week of the month

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) has said the monsoon is unlikely to recover significantly until the second week of July.

Currently, it is stalled and has not progressed into much of northwest India in spite of a very strong start in June.

This hiatus could affect sowing in northwest India.

In a monthly update, the IMD on Thursday forecast rainfall for July over the country as a whole to "most likely be normal" (defined as being 96 to 104% of the historical average). July and August are the rainiest monsoon months, contributing over two-thirds of the rainfall and, therefore, critical to kharif crop sowing in most of the country.

Until June 19, monsoon rainfall was exceptionally high, with the average rainfall exceeding 40% of what is

normal, and since then, rainfall has been declining.

**6% more than normal**  
In June, India normally gets 17.5 cm of rainfall, but this year, it has been 18.7 cm, or 6% more than normal.

The IMD said the monsoon had covered most of the country except parts of Rajasthan, Delhi, Punjab and Haryana, and this was unlikely to happen until July se-

cond week. The key reasons for that were neutral El Niño-Southern Oscillation (ENSO) conditions that were likely to continue over the equatorial Pacific Ocean and that there was an enhanced possibility of development of negative Indian Ocean Dipole (IOD) conditions over the Indian Ocean during July-September. Both of these related to sea surface temperatures and currently seemed unfavourable to abetting the monsoon progress.

Last year, too, the monsoon had a strong start but faltered in July, leading to one of the driest in the last five years. However, this was followed by excessive rains in August and September.

In June, the IMD said monsoon rains would be 101% of the Long Period Average (LPA) of 88 cm.

### Note to agriculturists

IMD Director-General Mrunalini Mohapatra said, "Agriculturists carrying out rice transplanting in north-west India should be careful as no significant monsoon rain is expected this week. There are also no convective systems forming in the Bay of Bengal and this is unlikely until July second week".

Historically, the monsoon covered the entire country by July 8, and within that, there was a week's buffer, he added.

## New deputy chiefs for Army and Air Force

V.R. Chaudhari, S.K. Sharma take charge

Prior to the present appointment, he was Air Officer Commanding-in-Chief (AOC-in-C) of the Western Air Command. He succeeds Air Marshal H.S. Arora, who retired on Wednesday after over 39 years of service.

Air Marshal B.R. Krishna, who was the Director-General (DG), Air Operations,

Lt. Gen. Sharma was the Director General of Military Intelligence prior to the new appointment.

He was commissioned into the Rajputana Rifles in December 1983.

## No review of Maratha quota judgment

The Supreme Court has refused to review its judgment holding the Maratha reservation law unconstitutional.

The court had also held, in a majority view, that the Centre alone was empowered to identify Socially and Educationally Backward Classes (SEBC) to include them in the Central List for claiming reservation benefits.

"The various grounds taken in the review petition have already been dealt with in the main judgment. We do not find any sufficient ground to entertain this review petition," a five-judge Bench led by Justice Ashok Bhushan said on Thursday.

In May, the Bench had unanimously declared the Maharashtra State law, which provides reservation benefits to the Maratha community, taking the quota limit in the State in excess of 50%, as unconstitutional.

The court had also refused to revisit its 1992 Indra Sawhney verdict that fixed the ceiling limit for reservation at 50%. However, the majority view authored by Justice S. Ravindra Bhat had held a "different" opinion about the validity of the 102nd Constitutional Amendment.

Justice Bhat had held that the Centre alone was empowered to identify SEBC for the Central List.

## Defence service workers barred from strike

Ordinance notifies prison term and fines for inciting strikes declared as illegal

The Union Law Ministry late on Wednesday notified an Ordinance that prohibited employees engaged in essential defence services from taking part in any agitation or strike.

The Essential Defence Services Ordinance, 2021, comes in the backdrop of major federations affiliated with the 76,000 employees of the Ordnance Factory Board (OFB) making an announcement that they would go on indefinite strike from July 26 in protest against the government's decision to corporatise the OFB.

The notification stated that President Ram Nath Kovind "is satisfied that circumstance exists for the Ordinance as Parliament is not in session".

"Any person, who com-

#### Oil well blowout: SC stays order on panel

The Supreme Court on Thursday stayed a National Green Tribunal (NGT) verdict appointing the managing director of the company behind the blowout at Well No. 5 in the Baghjan Oilfield operated by Oil India Limited (OIL), as a member of its committee assigned to determine the responsibility and compensation for the restoration of the Dibru Saikhowa National Park in Assam, which was severely damaged in the event in May 2020. The court decided to list the case after three weeks.

#### Gulshan case: HC upholds life term for assailant

The Bombay High Court on Thursday upheld the life imprisonment of Abdul Rauf Dawood Merchant for the murder of Gulshan Kumar, founder of the T-Series music label, on August 12, 1997. It upheld the acquittal of film producer Ramesh Taurani in the case. A Division Bench of Justices Sadhana Jadhav and N.R. Borkar overturned the acquittal of Abdul Rashid Dawood Merchant in the case and convicted him. The Bench said, "The appellant [Abdul Rauf] has criminal antecedents and is not entitled for remission as he absconded right after his arrest. Hence, in the interest of justice at large, appellant does not deserve any leniency."

#### Deshmukh's staff admits he had role in postings

Maharashtra's former Home Minister and Nationalist Congress Party leader Anil Deshmukh's private secretary Sanjeev Palande has admitted that Mr. Deshmukh had a role in the transfer posting of police officers, especially in the posting of Indian Police Service (IPS) officers. The special Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) court on Thursday had extended the Enforcement Directorate (ED) custody given to Mr. Deshmukh's aides — his personal assistant Kundan Shinde, and Mr. Palande — till July 6. They were arrested on June 26.

#### 'Ensure free and fair zilla panchayat chief polls'

The Allahabad High Court on Thursday directed the Election Commission to ensure free and fair elections to the posts of zilla panchayat president in Uttar Pradesh amid allegations that pressure was being created on candidates so as to influence the polls in favour of the BJP candidates. A Division Bench of Justices Rajan Roy and Saurabh Lavanja on July 1 passed the order on a writ petition filed by an election candidate of the Samajwadi Party from Sitapur.

## Scribes must not dramatise incidents: HC

A journalist is not expected to dramatise a sensational and horrifying incident and make news by putting the subject in a pitiable condition and in danger of death, the Allahabad High Court has said.

The court made the observation while rejecting a bail plea of a journalist in Lucknow, who is co-accused of abetting a person's suicide and filming it outside the U.P. Vidhan Sabha last year. "The journalist keeps an eye on anticipated or sudden events happening in society and brings them to the information of all the people through various news media without any tampering, this is his business," the court said on June 21.

Journalists Shamim Ahmad and Naushad Ahmad allegedly contacted a man who was facing eviction from his house and induced him to set himself ablaze in front of the Assembly so that they may film the incident and telecast it. The journalists allegedly surmised that if the tenant died as they suggested, no one would be able to evict him from the house.

The person died in a hospital on October 24, 2020. Justice Vikas Kunwar Srivastav said that from the details and statements recorded in the case, it was prima facie established that accused Shamim Ahmad tempted the deceased that if he attempted to take his own life in front of the Assembly, the video-filmed act would prevent him from being evicted.

# 'Army working to deal with drone threat'

General Naravane says talks are on with China at various levels, which has helped build trust

Army chief Gen. Manoj Naravane on Thursday said that with the easy availability of drones, they would be increasingly used in all sorts of combat, both by state and non-state actors, and capabilities were being developed to deal with them.

On the Ladakh stand-off, he said the situation on the ground had been normal since February and talks were on with China at different levels that had helped build trust between the two sides.

His comments came after explosions last Sunday at the Jammu Air Force station, which were believed to have been carried out using drones, the first such attack in the country. "We are seized of this problem. We have put in place certain

measures. All our troops on the ground have been sensitised for this evolving threat and we are developing capabilities to deal with that, whether by state-sponsored or by states themselves. We are developing capabilities to deal with the drone threat both in the kinetic and non-kinetic realm," Gen. Naravane said at a webinar organised by Global Counter-Terrorism Council in association with the Department of Defence Production.

He stated that they were catering to both the offensive use of drones and defensive measures or the counter-drone systems to prevent attacks on any critical instal-

lations whether by state or non-state actors.

On the stand-off in Eastern Ladakh, he noted that the situation had been normal since the disengagement in February from the northern and southern banks of Pangong Tso (lake) as well as the Kailash ranges. "Since then, both sides have strictly adhered in letter and spirit to the disengagement that was agreed upon," he observed.

### LoC situation

The two sides were engaged at different levels – political, diplomatic and military. "This has helped build trust between the two sides and going ahead we are sure we will be able to resolve all the remaining issues," he said.

On the situation along the Line of Control (LoC), he said that since the ceasefire

understanding between the Directors-General of Military Operations of India and Pakistan in February, the situation in Jammu and Kashmir had seen improvement. There had been little to no infiltration, he said.

Stressing the need to incorporate Artificial Intelligence (AI)-related technologies, he stated that this would require simplified procedures. "Unfortunately, this has been one of our biggest stumbling blocks. The transition to the digital age is contrarian to Defence Procurement Procedure and Defence Procurement Manual mindsets." In order to harness technologies like AI, exploit the depth in IT and realise the vision of Atmanirbhar Bharat, we need to shed old mindsets and make our procedures more flexible and adaptive, he added.

## Won't link J&K polls with statehood: Lone

His party has come under fire for not raising Article 370 with the PM

People's Conference (PC) chairman Sajad Lone said that he would not link elections with the restoration of statehood, reflecting a willingness to follow the Centre's timeline of holding elections after the delimitation process in Jammu and Kashmir and restoring statehood later.

"I would say that the statehood should be restored now. Not as a matter of charity, but as a matter of right. I wouldn't link elections with statehood," Mr. Lone said.

Unlike National Conference's Omar Abdullah and Peoples Democratic Party's Mehbooba Mufti, who have decided not to contest elections in the Union Territory but only in the State of J&K, Mr. Lone said, "I will myself boycott the

elections and the party will contest. We all are equal."

On the all-party meeting with Prime Minister Narendra Modi on June 24, Mr. Lone said: "There are no winners and losers. It is a long process."

Mr. Lone's party has come under criticism from Gupkar Alliance leaders for failing to raise the issue of Article 370 with the PM and describing it as sub judice.

Mr. Lone, who quit the Gupkar Alliance earlier this year, said he was ready to be part of the delimitation process if invited.

### 'Increasing void'

At a separate meeting, Apni Party president Ataf Bukhari also demanded early elections without any rider of statehood.

"The void between the people and government institutions is increasing exponentially in the absence of an elected government... People are being pushed from pillar to post, while their pressing issues go unnoticed. The only panacea to end their sufferings at the grassroots level is to give them a representative form of government," he said.

## CJI condemns attacks on doctors

'They have stood like a rock between COVID-19 and thousands of patients'

Chief Justice of India N.V. Ramana on Thursday condemned the brutal attacks on doctors who have stood like a rock between the COVID-19 virus and thousands of emotionally and physically vulnerable patients confined to isolation in hospital wards during the pandemic.

"Why is it that the medical professionals are at the receiving end for someone else's failure? Issues such as insufficient number of medical professionals, infrastructure, medicines, outdated technologies, and government not giving priority to medical sector are issues of immediate concern"

medical sector are issues of immediate concern," Chief Justice Ramana said in his speech on Doctors' Day at the launch of Research Society for the Study of Diabetes in India's "Defeat Diabetes Campaign".

The CJI highlighted the Indian Medical Association's data that over 798 doctors died in the second wave.

"This decade is defined by the healing touch and the sacrifices made by our doctors... When thousands of physi-

cally and emotionally vulnerable patients stood isolated in their hospital wards, it was the doctors who kept hope alive even in times of despair," he said, adding that it was disheartening to find many qualified doctors struggling to earn a decent salary after years of hard work. Yet, doctors are blamed for the profiteering streak of corporates.

"The medical bodies and agencies concerned in the government have to put their heads together to address these concerns. Only then can we sincerely greet the doctors on the first of July every year," the CJI said.

## Punjab orders curbs amid power crisis

Amid a severe power crisis, the Punjab State Power Corporation Limited (PSPCL) on Thursday imposed power regulatory measures by imposing two-day weekly offs on general industries, rolling mills and on arc and induction furnaces with immediate effect till July 3. It also appealed to the government-public sector offices to use power judiciously and switch off air conditioners.

Chief Minister Amarinder Singh separately ordered curtailment in the timings of State government offices from July 2 and cutting down of supply to high-energy industries with immediate effect. The offices will function from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. till further orders, said an official statement.

The decision invited criticism from political parties and farmer outfits as power shortage could hit paddy sowing. Farm unions have issued an ultimatum to the State to ensure at least eight hours of supply to farms by July 5.

## Woman who converted to Islam granted protection

Delhi HC will hear the case on July 5

The Delhi High Court on Thursday directed the police to ensure the safety of a young Hindu woman from Shahjahanpur in Uttar Pradesh who had converted to Islam, till her case is heard by a regular Bench on July 5.

A Vacation Bench of Justice C. Hari Shankar said, "It is made clear that this Vacation Bench is not expressing any opinion one way or the other regarding the correctness of the averments [made in the petition by the woman]."

"However, given the fact that the petitioner is a young girl who has expressed her apprehension regarding her security, the limited directions to the Respondents 1 and 2 (Delhi Police) to take adequate steps to protect the life and safety of the petitioner, till the matter is taken up the regular Bench on July 5," Justice Shankar said.

In her petition, Renu Gangwar said on May 27 this year, she converted from Hinduism to Islam with her "own free will". Following this, the 29-year-old



changed her name to Ayesha Alvi, which was published in some newspapers. Ms. Alvi, a resident of Tilhar and working in Delhi, alleged that mediapersons came to her place and took photographs and videos without her permission. One mediaperson allegedly demanded money while threatening to publish the news about her conversion.

"On June 26, 2021, the petitioner has been informed that her father has been taken away by officials of the Uttar Pradesh police and they are coming to Delhi and would take her back to Uttar Pradesh where she would be forced to file false complaint/FIR," the plea said. The petition further stated that Ms. Alvi was "under immediate threat of being taken away by force or coercion to the State of Uttar Pradesh by the agencies of the State or any other person".

## PIL in HC challenges new IT rules

Journalist Nikhil Wagle filed a plea before the Bombay High Court challenging the new IT rules and stating that they violate the fundamental rights enshrined in the Constitution.

The PIL against the Information Technology (Intermediary Guidelines and Digital Media Ethics Code) Rules, 2021, says they are arbitrary, illegal, irrational and unreasonable and contrary to the provisions of law, including Article 14 (equality before the law), Articles 19 (1) (a) (right to freedom of speech and expression), 19 (1) (g) (right to practise any profession, or to carry on any occupation, trade or business).

The PIL said, "The inter-departmental committee that will be formed is not an independent agency and it consists of representatives from government of India. The Rules give power to the said committee to issue orders for warning/censoring/taking down/deleting content on the first instance."

## Left parties greet CPC; BJP, Congress silent

Sitaram Yechury writes to Xi Jinping

The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) and the Congress avoided sending any congratulatory message to the Communist Party of China (CPC) that marked its centennial foundation day on Thursday, but the Left parties sent their greetings.

Following last year's violent clashes between Indian and Chinese troops at Galwan Valley, political relations between the two national parties and the CPC have taken a hit.

While the BJP had sent its greetings to the Vietnamese Communist Party on its 13th party Congress this February, it did not do so for the centenary celebrations of the Communist Party of China.

Senior Congress leaders, too, maintained that the "current political atmosphere does not allow political pleasantries between the two parties".

However, CPI(M) general secretary Sitaram Yechury wrote to Xi Jinping, the Chinese Premier and general secretary of the CPC, in which he said that the history of the last century holds testimony to the manner in which China has evolved its policies, often identifying and correcting its mistakes. "The CPI(M) continues to underline that Marxism-Leninism is a creative science. It is supremely anti-dogmatic. It can never be reduced to a set of formulae," Mr. Yechury wrote.

He also applauded China for its handling of the COVID-19 pandemic. The pandemic, the CPI(M) leader

said, came at a time when the global economy was already slowing down and moving towards recession. "International finance capital-led imperialist neoliberal globalisation is showing its total bankruptcy in providing any solution," Mr. Yechury wrote.

CPI general secretary D. Raja also commended Chinese President Xi Jinping for leading China to become a major economic power, to intervene and cooperate on any international development.

He also applauded China for its handling of the pandemic and extending help to other countries.

While appreciating the all-round development of China, Mr. Raja, however, sounded a word of caution on the current strained Indo-China relationship.

The border dispute that had been going on since India's Independence needed to be solved, Mr. Raja said. "We do believe we have to solve this problem now through peaceful means so that our both countries can play a meaningful role to realise the peace and stability in the region and work together for the establishment of an equitable global order in international relations."

### HC stays order to hand over rape victim to accused's kin

The Gauhati High Court has stayed an order a lower court in Arunachal Pradesh had passed to hand over a minor rape victim to a relative of the accused.

In a letter to the Arunachal Pradesh Chief Secretary, the Director-General of Police and other officials concerned on June 30, the Additional Advocate General of the State said the High Court's Chief Justice Sudhanshu Dhulia had taken suo motu cognisance of the case related to the custody of the minor girl.

The High Court accordingly stayed the June 3 order of the sessions court at Tezu in Arunachal Pradesh's Lohit district asking the Child Care Institute (CCI) in Roing to hand over the girl to the sister-in-law of the accused person for safety.

Roing is the headquarters of Arunachal Pradesh's Lower Dibang Valley district. The girl was brought from Nepal and was working as a domestic help.

## DCGI nod sought for ZyCoV-D

It will be the world's first plasmid DNA vaccine for COVID-19, says Zydus Cadila

Zydus Cadila said it has applied to the Drug Controller General of India (DCGI) seeking Emergency Use Authorisation (EUA) for ZyCoV-D, its plasmid DNA vaccine to counter COVID-19.

It will be the world's first plasmid DNA vaccine for COVID-19, the company said.

The company had conducted clinical trials at over 50 centres in India, it said. Phase III clinical trials had been conducted on over 28,000 volunteers. This was the first time that any COVID-19 vaccine had been tested in the adolescent population in the age group of 12-18 years in India.

"Around 1,000 subjects were enrolled in this age group and the vaccine was found to be safe and very well tolerated. The tolerability profile was similar to that seen in the adult population," said Sharvil Patel, managing director, Cadila Healthcare Ltd, at a briefing.

"Our vaccine has attained primary efficacy of 66.6% for symptomatic RT-PCR positive cases in the interim ana-

lysis. No moderate case of COVID-19 disease was observed post administration of the third dose, which suggests 100% efficacy for moderate disease." He said no severe cases or deaths had been reported after administration of the second dose of the vaccine.

"ZyCoV-D had already exhibited a robust immunogenicity, tolerability and safety profile in the adaptive Phase I/II clinical trials carried out earlier. Both the Phase I/II and Phase III clinical trials have been monitored by an independent Data

Safety Monitoring Board (DSMB)," Mr. Patel said.

"The plug and play technology on which the plasmid DNA platform is based is ideally suited for dealing with COVID-19, as it can easily be adapted to deal with mutations in the virus, such as those already occurring," he said.

"This breakthrough marks a key milestone in scientific innovation and advancement in technology. As the first ever plasmid DNA vaccine for human use, ZyCoV-D has proven its safety and efficacy profile in our

fight against COVID-19. The vaccine, when approved, will help not only adults but also adolescents in the 12 to 18 years age group," he said.

The company said it had also evaluated a two-dose regimen for ZyCoV-D vaccine using a 3 mg dose per visit, and the immunogenicity results had been found to be equivalent to the current three-dose regimen.

#### Needle-free applicator

The vaccine will come with Pharmajet, a needle-free applicator that will ensure painless intradermal vaccine delivery. This would cost extra.

"The company has not revealed the price of the vaccine or the applicator.

Mr. Patel said the company had made an investment of ₹500 crore for this project, including the manufacturing unit, and it planned to make 10-12 crore doses annually.

By December, it targeted to produce 5 lakh doses, with a run rate of 1 crore doses per month from August. The gap between first and second dose is 28 days.

## All WHO-approved jabs must be recognised for travel: UN

Vaccine divide should not widen, says global health agency

The World Health Organization said Thursday that any COVID-19 vaccines it has authorised for emergency use should be recognised by countries as they open up their borders to inoculated travellers.

The move could challenge Western countries to broaden their acceptance of two apparently less effective Chinese vaccines, which the UN health agency has licensed but most European and North American countries have not.

In addition to vaccines by Pfizer-BioNTech, Moderna Inc., AstraZeneca and Johnson & Johnson, the WHO has also given the green light to the two Chinese jabs, made by Sinovac and Sinopharm.

In its aim to restore travel across Europe, the European Union said in May that it would only recognise people as vaccinated if they had received shots licensed by the European Medicines Agency – although it is up to



Sinopharm and Sinovac have not been accepted by some countries.

said on Thursday. "It would negatively impact the growth of economies that are already suffering the most."

#### Reduces risk

The WHO said such moves are "undermining confidence in life-saving vaccines that have already been shown to be safe and effective." In its reviews of the two Chinese vaccines, the UN health agency said both were found to significantly reduce the risk of hospitalisations and deaths.

The two Chinese shots are "inactivated" vaccines, made with killed coronavirus, whereas the Western-made shots are made with newer technologies that instead target the "spike" protein that coats the surface of the coronavirus. Though Western countries have largely relied on vaccines made in the U.S. and Europe, such as Pfizer-BioNTech and AstraZeneca, many developing countries have used the Chinese-made shots.

## Trial data sought for Sputnik Light vaccine

'No need for a separate study in India'

A Subject Expert Committee that advises the Drugs Controller General of India has asked Dr. Reddy's Laboratories to submit data from Phase III clinical trial of Sputnik Light being carried out in Russia for grant of Marketing Authorisation (MA) of the single dose vaccine against COVID-19.

The panel said there was no need for a separate Phase III trial of Sputnik Light in India since the safety and immunogenicity data has been generated during the two-dose Sputnik V trial in India. Sputnik Light is the first component of Sputnik V and its efficacy is said to be 79.4%.

"The firm should present the safety, immunogenicity and efficacy data of Phase III clinical trial of Sputnik Light that is being carried out in Russia for considering the proposal for grant of MA in the country," the SEC meeting on Wednesday recommended to Dr. Reddy's Laboratories. The pharma major had presented the Phase III clinical trial protocol as well as the interim safety and efficacy data generated from Phase I/II clinical trial in Russia while seeking the MA.

"Sputnik Light is same as component-I of Sputnik V. The firm has already generated safety and immunogenicity of component-I in the country," the SEC said.

## Delta variant to become dominant strain: WHO

96 countries have reported cases

The World Health Organization (WHO) said the Delta variant of COVID-19 is now present in nearly 100 countries as per conservative estimates, and warned that in the coming months, it will become the dominant variant globally.

In its COVID-19 weekly epidemiological update, the WHO said as of June 29, 2021, "96 countries have reported cases of the Delta variant, though this is likely an underestimate as sequencing capacities needed to identify variants are limited. A number of these countries are attributing surges in infections and hospitalisations to this variant."

Given the increase in transmissibility, the WHO warned that the Delta variant is "expected to rapidly outcompete other variants and become the dominant variant over the coming months."

For the first time in several weeks, the highest numbers of new COVID-19 cases were not reported from India. The update noted that at 5,21,298, the highest numbers of new cases were reported from Brazil during the June 21-27 week, followed by India (3,51,218 new cases, a 12% increase over the previous week), Colombia (2,04,132 new cases, 5% increase) and Russia (1,34,465 new cases, 24% increase).

## U.P. govt. told to reply on plea to free 13 prisoners

The Supreme Court on Thursday sought the Uttar Pradesh government's response on a plea to release 13 prisoners who have languished in Agra Jail over two decades despite proving their juvenility at the time of commission of the crime.

A Bench of Justices Indira Banerjee and V. Ramasubramanian issued notice and

asked the State to respond by July 8 on the petition filed through advocate Rishi Malhotra.

According to the petition, there were "clear and unchallenged rulings" from the Juvenile Justice Board declaring the 13 prisoners as juveniles at the time of commission of their crime.

A juvenile can be punished only for a maximum period of three years.

## Tidal wave washes away portion of Odisha village

Ramayapalli has been facing threat since last 14 years

Panic gripped the fisherfolk of Ramayapalli village in Odisha's Ganjam district after portions of houses were washed away by a tidal wave.

Ramayapalli has been facing the threat of tidal surge for the last 14 years, with the Bay of Bengal menacingly marching towards the

Mr. Dilish alleged that though the government had promised to come up with a guard wall to prevent erosion of Ramayapalli, it was yet to see the light of day.

# Xi hails 'national rejuvenation' on centenary

## 'A strong country must have a strong military, as only then can it guarantee the security of the nation'

China's leader Xi Jinping on Thursday said the country's rejuvenation was "a historical inevitability" and it could no longer be "bullied and abused by others", delivering a strong message on the ruling Communist Party's centenary.

Mr. Xi, who is the Communist Party of China's (CPC) general secretary, the country's President, and head of the military, delivered an hour-long speech to a crowd of thousands on Tiananmen Square, accompanied by the Politburo and past senior leaders, including former President Hu Jintao, on the rostrum from where former leader Mao Zedong would address mass rallies.

The Mao parallels did not stop there. The celebration began, as it often did in the Mao era, with a choir of some 3,000 students singing in praise of the party. Mr. Xi, who has since taken over in 2012 elevated his standing in the party on a par with Mao, was the only one among the suited leadership dressed in a dark green Mao-suit.

Thursday's ceremony began with helicopters flying over Tiananmen carrying the red Communist Party flag with hammer and sickle, followed by 15 J-20 stealth fighters, all tailored for a

show of strength.

Mr. Xi's speech focused on themes he has stressed since taking over in 2012 — the "national rejuvenation" of China as well as greater political centralisation, with his term seeing a move away from a collective leadership model with term limits to rule by one "core" leader.

"China's success hinges on the party," he said. "We must be deeply conscious of the need to maintain political integrity, think in big-picture terms, follow the leadership core, and keep in alignment with the central party leadership. We must uphold the core position of the General Secretary on the Party Central Committee and in the Party as a whole, and uphold the Central Committee's authority and its

centralised, unified leadership."

He praised the party's "socialism with Chinese characteristics" model for "enabling China to transform itself from a highly centralised planned economy to a socialist market economy brimming with vitality, and from a country that was largely isolated to one that is open to the outside world across the board" and is now the second-largest economy.

He said the party had, since its congress in 2012 when he came to power, "fulfilled the first centenary goal" which was eliminating absolute poverty, a landmark the government said was achieved this year. The second centenary goal, referring to the People's Republic of China's centenary in 2049,

would be to build China "into a great modern socialist country in all respects".

Mr. Xi also had a strong message for the world, reflecting on China's past history of "humiliation". "After the Opium War of 1840, China was gradually reduced to a semi-colonial, semi-feudal society and suffered greater ravages than ever before. The country endured intense humiliation, the people were subjected to great pain, and the Chinese civilisation was plunged into darkness," he said.

**Sense of pride**

Now, Chinese people "are not intimidated by threats of force" and had "a strong sense of pride and confidence". While China was "eager to learn what lessons we can from the achievements of other cultures and welcome(s) helpful suggestions and constructive criticism", it "will not accept sanctimonious preaching from those who feel they have the right to lecture us."

Mr. Xi called for "accelerating the modernisation of national defence and the armed forces" and said "a strong country must have a strong military, as only then can it guarantee the security of the nation". China would "elevate our people's armed forces to world-class stan-

dards so that we are equipped with greater capacity and more reliable means for safeguarding our national sovereignty, security, and development interests", he said, with the party earlier announcing a target to complete military modernisation by 2035. He said China would oppose "zero-sum games" as well as "hegemony and power politics".

On Hong Kong, which has since last year's controversial national security law come under the most direct control of Beijing so far since the 1997 handover, he said China would "ensure that the central government exercises overall jurisdiction".

He said "resolving the Taiwan question and realising China's complete reunification is a historic mission and an unshakable commitment" for the party. China would "advance peaceful national reunification" but would "take resolute action to utterly defeat any attempt toward 'Taiwan independence'", he said.

"No one," he added, "should underestimate the resolve, the will, and the ability of the Chinese people to defend their national sovereignty and territorial integrity", a statement that elicited the loudest cheers on Thursday from the crowd at Tiananmen.

# Former U.S. Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld passes away

## On his watch, the U.S. invaded Afghanistan and later Iraq

Donald Rumsfeld, former U.S. Defense Secretary and one of the architects of the U.S. invasion of Afghanistan and Iraq in 2003, has died at the age of 88 at his home in Taos, New Mexico, according to his family. Mr. Rumsfeld was Defense Secretary during 1975-1977, during the Gerald Ford administration, and then in the George W. Bush administration, during 2001-2006.

"It is with deep sadness that we share the news of the passing of Donald Rumsfeld, an American statesman and devoted husband, grandfather and great grandfath-

er," read a notice from the Rumsfeld family, posted on Twitter.

The New York Times reported that a family spokesperson had said that the cause of death was multiple myeloma.

In 2001, as Defense Secretary, Mr. Rumsfeld oversaw the U.S. strikes in Afghanistan, following the September 11 terror attacks on the World Trade Center in New York City. The U.S. sought to overthrow the Taliban regime which was providing safe haven to terror group al-Qaeda, which was responsible for the September 11 attacks.

In 2003, Mr. Rumsfeld was a key player in the Bush administration's decision to invade Iraq, ostensibly to prevent Saddam Hussein from developing and deploying weapons of mass destruction (these were never found).

# Macron worries about 'racialised' French society

## He blames imported ideas from U.S.

French society is becoming increasingly "racialised", French President Emmanuel Macron has warned in comments that blamed imported U.S. social science ideas that focus on race.

"I see that our society is becoming progressively racialised," Mr. Macron told Elle magazine in an interview. He took aim in particular at the idea of "intersectionality" — popular among left-leaning U.S. academics — that seeks to explain discrimination and poverty by examining the role played by race and gender in affecting an individual's life chances.

"The logic of intersectionality fractures everything," Mr. Macron said. "I stand for universalism. I don't agree with a fight that reduces everyone to their identity or their particularity," he continued.

"Social difficulties are not only explained by gender and the colour of your skin, but also by social inequalities."

He added that he could think of young white men in his hometown of Amiens or nearby Saint-Quentin in northern France "who also have immense difficulties, for different reasons, in finding a job".

Movements against ra-

cism over the last year such as Black Lives Matter, which resonated in France after arriving from the U.S., have led to fears among some critics that the country is importing American racial and identity politics sometimes labelled as "woke culture."

A new generation of younger French activists are increasingly vocal in denouncing the problem of racism in France and the legacy of the country's colonial past in Africa and the West Asia.

Their opponents see the focus on race and the past as opening up unnecessary divisions and encouraging a culture in which minorities and women see themselves as constantly oppressed and discriminated against.

Mr. Macron also promised to do more to combat domestic violence and women's health problems such as endometriosis.

# Deadly heat wave slams Canada, U.S.

Millions of people in western Canada and the northwestern U.S. were under heat alerts on Wednesday as the region baked in record-breaking temperatures.

The village of Lytton, 250 km northeast of Vancouver, was evacuated on Wednesday night because of a fire that spread quickly.

The heat wave has stretched emergency services, with at least 134 people dying suddenly since Friday in the Vancouver area and hundreds more across British Columbia, which recorded 49.6 degrees Celsius, according to Canadian police.

In the U.S., Washington recorded at least 16 deaths related to the heat wave, county health officials said.

Seattle, Portland and many other cities broke all-time heat records, with temperatures in some places reaching above 46 degrees Celsius.

# India seeks Maldivian govt. action on 'repeated attacks' in media

## It asks Male to 'ensure enhanced protection' of the Mission, staff

India has sought Maldivian government action on persons behind media reports and social media posts "attacking the dignity" of its resident diplomats, while seeking greater security for the officials.

In a letter that has raised eyebrows within the Maldives, the High Commission of India said the "repeated attacks" were "motivated, malicious and increasingly personal". Urging the Foreign Ministry to take steps to "ensure enhanced protection" of the Mission and its officials, the letter from the Indian High Commission, dated June 24, urged authorities to "ensure action, in accordance with International Law and Maldivian Law"

against the perpetrators for "these gross violations" of the Vienna Convention of Diplomatic Relations.

Official sources in Male confirmed the authenticity of the letter, which was leaked and has since been shared on social media. However, neither the Foreign Ministry nor the High Commission of India responded on the development, when The Hindu sought comment.

While India-Maldives ties came under considerable strain during former President Abdulla Yameen's term, President Ibrahim Mohamed Solih's government is seen to be a close ally of India, with enhanced development and defence cooperation since 2018. However, some government critics are wary of greater military ties

with India that they see as paving way for "boots on the ground". In May, an apparently premature announcement made in New Delhi, on the Cabinet clearing a proposal to set up a second mission in the Maldives, sparked concern among sections, prompting a renewed "#Indiaout" campaign on Maldivian social media.

In its recent letter, the High Commission of India said the "repeated attacks" were undertaken to "create enmity and hatred between the people and Government of Maldives, and the people and Government of India".

While Male is yet to comment, sources said the Parliament has asked the country's Media Council, a self-regulatory body, to look into the matter.

# Trump firm's CFO surrenders

AGENCE FRANCE-PRESSE NEW YORK

The long-serving chief financial officer of Donald Trump's company surrendered on Thursday to authorities planning to charge him, possibly with tax-related offences, in a major blow to the former President.

The indictment of Allen Weisselberg has been expected for days as part of an almost three-year investigation by the Manhattan District Attorney into business dealings at the Trump organisation. The Trump organisation is also likely to be charged.

Although Mr. Trump is not expected to be charged at this stage, the charges would deal a major blow to the ex-President, who has suggested he could run for the White House in 2024.

Mr. Mittal's remarks assume significance amid reports that cash-strapped Vodafone Idea, which posted a loss of about ₹7,000 crore in the March quarter, has sought a moratorium on the payment of its dues to the telecom department.

"To say the telecom industry is in a bit of trouble is actually an understatement," Mr. Mittal said. "It is in tremendous amount of stress. I hope the Government, the authorities and the telecom department, all focus on this

## 'GNPA ratio may rise up to 11.2% in FY22'

RBI sees banks' gross NPA ratio climbing to 9.8% under baseline scenario, from 7.48% in March 2021

The gross non-performing asset ratio (GNPA) of India's scheduled commercial banks (SCBs) may climb by the end of the current fiscal year to as much as 11.2% under a severe stress scenario, from 7.48% in March 2021, the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) said in its Financial Stability Report on Thursday.

"Macro stress tests indicate that the GNPA ratio of SCBs may increase... to 9.8% by March 2022 under the baseline scenario; and to 11.22% under a severe stress scenario, although SCBs have sufficient capital, both at the aggregate and individual level, even under stress," the RBI said.

"The capital to risk-weighted assets ratio of SCBs increased to 16.03% and the

provisioning coverage ratio stood at 68.86% in March 2021," the central bank said.

Going forward, as banks respond to credit demand in a recovering economy, "they will need to reinforce their capital and liquidity positions to fortify themselves

against potential balance sheet stress," it added.

Sustained policy support, benign financial conditions and the gathering momentum of vaccinations were nurturing an uneven global recovery, the RBI noted.

"Policy support has

helped in shoring up financial positions of banks, containing non-performing loans and maintaining solvency and liquidity globally," the central bank said.

"On the domestic front, the ferocity of the second wave of COVID-19 has dented economic activity, but monetary, regulatory and fiscal policy measures have helped curtail the solvency risk of financial entities, stabilise markets, and maintain financial stability," it added.

### Less-than-expected dent

"The dent on balance sheets and performance of financial institutions in India has been much less than what was projected earlier, although a clearer picture will emerge as the effects of regulatory reliefs fully work their way through," Governor Shakti-

kanta Das wrote in his foreword to the report.

"Yet, capital and liquidity buffers are reasonably resilient to withstand future shocks, as the stress tests presented in this report demonstrate," he added.

Mr. Das observed that even as the recovery was underway, new risks had emerged including "the still nascent and mending state of the upturn, vulnerable as it is to shocks and future waves of the pandemic; international commodity prices and inflationary pressures; global spillovers amid high uncertainty; and rising incidence of data breaches and cyberattacks".

Sustained policy support and simultaneous increased fortification of capital and liquidity buffers by financial entities was therefore vital.

## PMI survey shows manufacturing shrank in June

IHS Markit's index declined to 48.1

India's manufacturing output shrank in June with the survey-based IHS Markit Manufacturing Purchasing Managers' Index (PMI) sliding to 48.1, from 50.8 in May, marking the industry's first contraction since July 2020.

Companies were at their least optimistic for almost a year and jobs continued to be shed for the 15th month in a row, IHS Markit said in a statement. Buying levels fell at a pace that was among the fastest seen since PMI data collection started in March 2005, as weak demand and a reduction in production requirements led firms to restrict input purchases last month.

COVID-19 restrictions also curtailed international demand for Indian goods, and new export orders decreased for the first time in 10 months, albeit modestly, the firm said. The strict containment measures to cope with the second wave of COVID-19 negatively impacted demand and led to renewed contractions in factory orders, production, exports and quantities of purchases.

### Capital goods worst hit

"Companies became increasingly worried about when the pandemic will end, which resulted in downward revisions to output growth projections," said Polyanna De Lima, Economics Associate Director at IHS Markit. "As a result of subdued optimism, jobs were shed again in June."

"Out of the three broad areas of the manufacturing sector monitored by the survey, capital goods was the



worst-affected area in June. Output here declined at a steep rate due to a sharp fall in sales. The sector also saw the fastest contraction in buying levels," she added.

While pre-production as well as post-production inventories declined at manufacturing units, pre-production stocks contracted for the first time in 10 months.

"Falling new orders, business closures and the COVID-19 crisis triggered a reduction in output among Indian manufacturers. The decline was moderate relative to those seen in the first half of 2020, but ended a ten-month sequence of growth," IHS Markit said.

"The intensification of the COVID-19 crisis... had a detrimental impact on the manufacturing economy. Growth of new orders, production, exports and input purchasing was interrupted in June as containment measures aimed at bringing the pandemic under control restrained demand. In all cases, however, rates of contraction were softer than during the first lockdown," Ms. De Lima said.

ICRA chief economist Aditi Nayar said the June PMI, however, was at odds with available high frequency data including GST e-way bills and electricity demand.

## Auto dispatches jump on easing curbs

Maruti, Tata Motors PV wholesales double in June; July may see better volumes'

Auto manufacturers registered a significant increase in vehicle dispatches to dealers in June, following the gradual easing of COVID-19 related restrictions, and helped by last year's low base. Vehicle makers said they were seeing some early signs of positive consumer sentiment; however, issues such as the global semiconductor shortage and rising commodity prices continued to impact production.

India's largest carmaker Maruti Suzuki posted domestic passenger vehicle (PV) wholesales of more than 1.24 lakh units in June compared with 51,274 units a year earlier. "Sales in Quarter 1 of both FY21 and FY22 have



been far from normal owing to COVID-19 related lockdowns and disruptions and hence any comparison would not be very meaningful," the company said.

Rival Hyundai Motor India said domestic sales stood at 40,496 units (21, 320). Tata Motors' reported domestic sales of 43,704 units (19,387). The company clocked PV sales of 24,110 units (11,419)

and domestic commercial vehicle (CV) sales of 19,594 units (7,968).

### Semiconductor shortage

Mahindra and Mahindra too dispatched more than double the number of PVs in the domestic market at 16,913 units, while CV sales stood at 13,444 units (10,430). "With the opening up of the market in a phased manner, we are seeing a boost in demand in both urban and rural, and expect the upward trend to continue across all segments and markets," said Veejay Nakra, CEO, Automotive Division, M&M Ltd. He added that M&M's supply chain had stabilised except for the semiconductor issue, which continued to be a challenge.

Hero MotoCorp delivered

more than 4.38 lakh two-wheelers in the domestic market (4.3 lakh). "The expected surge in personal mobility, forecast of a normal monsoon in several parts of the country and the improving rural sentiment are expected to lead to a swift revival in sales," the firm said.

TVS Motor saw domestic two-wheeler wholesales exceed 1.45 lakh units in June.

Ashok Leyland said it dispatched 5,851 CVs in the domestic market (2,132).

"CV sales continue to face challenges due to slow economic recovery," said Mitul Shah, head of research, Reliance Securities. "We expect sales volume for July '21 to be much superior with healthy MoM and YoY improvement," he added.

## U.S. weekly jobless claims fall, layoffs dive

The number of Americans filing new claims for unemployment benefits fell more than expected last week, while layoffs plunged to a 21-year low in June, suggesting the labour market recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic was gaining traction.

While job cuts are easing, a shortage of willing workers is constraining hiring amid a surge in demand following a reopening of the economy made possible by coronavirus vaccinations.

Nevertheless, the reports augur well for the closely-watched employment report for June, due to be released on Friday.

## Need to formalise 'large underbelly' of economy: FM

'Revenue generation now will help should third wave arrive'

India needs to formalise 'a large underbelly' of businesses operating outside the system to widen the tax base and make its finances more resilient, Finance and Corporate Affairs Minister Nirmala Sitharaman said on Thursday.

Stating that she was not concerned about India's debt burden at this point, the Minister said a turnaround in the economy driven by public infrastructure investments will be able to bolster revenue collections. "In India, we have to be a lot smarter in the way in which (tax) evasion can be contained. Tax avoidance will also have to be carefully studied and action needs to be taken on that without obviously making it difficult for

honest taxpayers," she said, adding that technology would be a critical tool to plug loopholes as was being done under the Goods and Services Tax (GST) regime.

"There is still a large underbelly which is yet to be formalised into the mainstream of the economy. We have to get them on board and make compliance, tax

assessments all easy, otherwise small businesses will never be encouraged to join the system," she said in an interaction at the India Global Forum.

She exuded confidence about completing the privatisation of Air India and BPCL this year, indicating that earlier attempts were marred by poor timing.

Citing the eight consecutive months of GST collections of more than ₹1 lakh crore each, Ms. Sitharaman said she hoped it would be sustained as there was no national lockdown this year and economic activity was picking up pace. "Revenue generation will give us a bit more leeway... for taking up any challenge that arises," she said, to a query about India's preparedness for a possible third wave of COVID-19.

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# Clinical wins for Federer and Berrettini

Medvedev, Zverev ease through; Svitolina, Azarenka join the list of casualties; Barty advances

Roger Federer became the oldest man to reach the third round at Wimbledon in 46 years, following a 7-6 (1), 6-1, 6-4 victory over Frenchman Richard Gasquet at the Centre Court on Thursday.

Australia's Ken Rosewall was 40 when he made the third round at the All-England Club in 1975.

After a tight first set, it was one-way traffic as Federer, 39, beat Gasquet for the 19th time in 21 meetings.

"I'm happy with my performance," Federer said. "A tough first set, I was happy with the second and I was better in the third."

The Centre Court crowd may have split loyalties when he next faces 25-year-old Cameron Norrie of Britain. "Cam is a good guy and is having a wonderful year. He has done well here but it's time for him to go out!", Federer said with a laugh.

Seventh seed Matteo Berrettini was equally impressive in his 6-3, 6-4, 7-6(4) victory over Botic Van de Zandschulp.

The Italian, winner at Queen's Club last month, fired 20 aces and advanced in two hours and 17 minutes to extend his record on grass to 7-0 this year.

Russian second seed Daniil Medvedev reached the Wimbledon last 32 for the third time with a straight-sets win over Spanish wildcard Carlos Alcaraz.

Medvedev, fresh from his first grass-court title in Mallorca last weekend, eased to a 6-4, 6-1, 6-2 win over 18-year-old Alcaraz, the youngest player in the draw.

Fourth seed Alexander Zverev hit 13 aces, lost only 12 points on his serve and advanced to the third round by

Barty and Osaka to headline women's field in Tokyo

Serbia's Novak Djokovic, Switzerland's Roger Federer, Japan's Naomi Osaka and Australia's Ashleigh Barty are on the entry lists for the Tokyo Olympics that were announced on Thursday by the International Tennis Federation. Eligibility is based on the rankings of June 14, the day after the French Open ended. Seven of the Top 10

players in both the WTA and ATP rankings currently are on Thursday's lists.

For the women, that's No. 1 Barty, No. 2 Osaka, No. 4 Aryna Sabalenka (Belarus), No. 5 Elina Svitolina (Ukraine), No. 7 Bianca Andreescu (Canada), No. 9 Iga Swiatek (Poland) and No. 10 Petra Kvitova (Czech Republic). Stars missing are Romania's Simona Halep and Americans Serena Williams and Sofia Kenin.

For the men, apart from No. 1 Djokovic and No. 8 Federer, the others in the list

are No. 2 Daniil Medvedev (Russia), No. 4 Stefanos Tsitsipas (Greece), No. 6 Alexander Zverev (Germany), No. 7 Andrey Rublev (Russia) and No. 9 Matteo Berrettini (Italy). Spain's Rafael Nadal, Roberto Bautista Agut and Austria's Dominic Thiem do not figure in the list.

Defending singles champion Andy Murray has been granted a special exemption because he has the most Olympic and Grand Slam titles of the players whose ranking is not good enough to earn direct entry.

# Cavendish closes in on Merckx's mark

# Giant-killer Switzerland looks to spring a surprise on Spain

Lukaku will likely be the main attacking threat as Belgium takes on Italy in a mouth-watering quarterfinal

Switzerland will try to follow up its shock elimination of world champion France against Spain on Friday, after reaching the quarterfinals of a major tournament for the first time in 67 years.

Vladimir Petkovic's side recovered from two goals down to force extra time against much-fancied France and prevailed on penalties as 2018 World Cup hero Kylian Mbappe missed the decisive spot-kick.

Now the Swiss hope to spring another surprise against a Spain team that has scored 10 times in two games after a slow start to the group stage.

Alvaro Morata's redemptive strike helped secure a 5-3 extra-time win over Croatia, but Spain will

need to cut out the errors if it is to contend for a record fourth Euro title.

History is on Spain's side against Switzerland, having lost just once in 22 meetings, a 1-0 defeat in South Africa that sparked its run to the

2010 World Cup title.

Spain captain Sergio Busquets is the lone survivor from that team, while the Barcelona midfielder and Jordi Alba are the only two players in the squad left from its Euro 2012 triumph.

Switzerland celebrated what striker Haris Seferovic called "the most beautiful of nights" as it dumped out France to win its first European Championship knockout tie. The last time the Swiss reached a major quarterfinal it lost 7-5 to Austria as hosts of the 1954 World Cup.

Romelu Lukaku will likely be the main attacking threat when Belgium takes on Italy in Munich in the other quarterfinal. The Inter Milan forward has scored three goals

in his team's four victories so far. And with Kevin De Bruyne and Eden Hazard both doubtful for the game, Italy captain Giorgio Chiellini and teammate Leonardo Bonucci — both defenders at Juventus — will know just who to focus on.

The Italians haven't been beaten in a national team record 31 matches, though they were taken to extra time by Austria in the round of 16. Belgium has only beaten Italy once before in a competitive game — in the 1972 Euro quarterfinals.

# ICC to award same points for each WTC match won

The International Cricket Council (ICC) will award standardised 12 points for every match won during the second World Test Championships cycle which kicks off with the five-match series between India and England in August.

Teams will get six points in case of a tie and four points if the match ends in a draw.

"Instead of each series being worth the same number of points, 120, irrespective of whether the series is played over two Tests or five Tests, the next cycle will see each match being worth the same number of points — a maximum of 12 per match," an ICC board member said.

Javelin thrower Devendra Jhajharia rewrote his own world record as he punched his ticket for the Tokyo Paralympics during a national selection trial here.

The 40-year-old, who has won two gold medals in the men's F46 category at the Paralympics, sent the spear to a distance of 65.71m during the trials here on Wednesday.

"Today at the Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium in Delhi, I qualified for the Tokyo Para-

lympics by setting a new world record of 65.71, breaking my older record of 63.97 [set at Rion in 2016] in a qualifying event.

## Family support

"This was possible because of my family's support, and the efforts of my coach Sunil Tanwar and fitness trainer Lakshya Batra," Jhajharia tweeted in Hindi.

Jhajharia won at the 2004 Athens Paralympic Games, setting a new world record of 62.15m, and repeated the feat 12 years later at Rio edition bettering his own record with a throw of 63.97m to become the first Indian to

clinch two gold medals at the Paralympics.

Asian Para Games gold medalists Amit Kumar Saroha and Sandeep Chaudhary have also qualified for the Tokyo Games.

Two-time Paralympian Saroha will represent the country in the F51 category in discus and club throw, while Chaudhary will be competing in the F44 javelin throw event at the Games to be held from August 24 to September 5.

India has been granted 24 slots and the final team list will be announced by the Paralympic Committee of India on Friday

## Jabir qualifies for 400m hurdles

M.P. Jabir of the Indian Navy, who clocked 49.78s to win the 400m hurdles gold at the recent inter-State athletics championships, has qualified for Tokyo through the World ranking quota where there are 14 spots available, a defence spokesman said here on Thursday.

The 25-year-old is currently ranked 34th in the World Athletics' Road to Olympics rankings where 40 athletes qualify. Jabir said he would be the first Indian male to participate in that event at the Games.

## Japan still unsure about spectators

COVID-19 cases in the capital city have been steadily on the rise

Japan Prime Minister Yoshihide Suga is still uncertain whether fans can be allowed at the Tokyo Olympics because of growing concern about rising COVID-19 cases on Thursday, only three weeks before the Games.

Cases here have been steadily on the rise, triggering fears the Games would accelerate the spread of the virus.

## Resurgence

Experts warned that the highly contagious delta strain could trigger rapid resurgence of the infections that may require another state of emergency, even during the Games starting on July 23.

"I have made it clear that having no spectators is a possibility," Suga said as he noted Tokyo's rising caseloads. "We will take steps as we

prioritise safety and security of the people."

On Wednesday, the city confirmed 673 new cases, the 12th straight day of a week-on-week increase.

Dr. Mitsuo Kaku, a medical advisor for the Tokyo metropolitan government, told a weekly meeting on Thursday that the city was turning

into a "critical situation" as the upsurge was triggered by the delta variant.

A two-month-long state of emergency here and other metro areas was downgraded by Suga on June 21.

## Decision next week

He said he will decide what to do with the measures next

week, a decision that will affect Games spectators.

Organisers last week decided to allow up to 10,000 spectators or 50% of venue capacity if emergency measures are lifted before the Games. Following criticisms and concerns raised by experts and the public, government officials later said they were open to having no fans if the infections worsen.

Experts said lifting the measures was unthinkable given the virus situation, and daily cases could exceed 1,000 before the Olympics and quickly multiply during the Games if measures were delayed.

## Options

Natsuo Yamaguchi, head of Komeito, a smaller coalition partner of the governing Liberal Democratic Party, on Thursday called on the government "to consider a no-spectator option and promptly inform the public".

## Neymar, Sanchez back for knockouts

Brazil starts favourite against Chile in the quarterfinals

Defending champion Brazil and Chile will have their star players back in action when they meet in the Copa America quarterfinals on Friday.

Neymar will return for Brazil and Alexis Sanchez has recovered from a calf muscle injury ahead of the encounter at the Nilton Santos Stadium here.

The Selecao spared a group of regular starters in the I-1 draw with Ecuador on Sunday, resting Neymar, defender Thiago Silva and striker Gabriel Jesus. Others, including Casemiro, entered as substitutes in that game.

Brazil, with three wins in four matches, is the clear favourite to win.

## Chile lacks form

Chile's only win in the group stage was against Bolivia and it is lacking the kind of form that inspired its back-to-back championship wins in 2015 and '16. Sanchez missed

Chile's group-stage matches and his absence affected the team's production.

Coach Martin Lasarte will decide whether 32-year-old Sanchez will start against Brazil or come off the bench.

## Paul powers Suns to the summit clash

Chris Paul erupted for 41 points to lead Phoenix Suns into the NBA Finals on Wednesday with a series-clinching 130-103 victory over Los Angeles Clippers.

The Suns – who squandered the opportunity to wrap up the Western Conference Finals at home on Monday – rebounded with an emphatic away win, taking the best-of-seven series 4-2.

It is only the third NBA Finals appearance for the Suns, and the first since 1993. The Suns failed to even reach the playoffs for 10 consecutive seasons before the 2020-2021 campaign.

Paul, the 36-year-old, 11-time NBA All-Star, drew on all his experience to get the Suns over the line. Wednesday's win finally gives Paul the chance to shed his tag as one of the greatest players in NBA history to never win a championship.

Paul's 41-point effort was

backed by double-digit contributions from Devin Booker (22), Jae Crowder (19) and Deandre Ayton (16). Marcus Morris Sr. led the Clippers with 26 points while Paul George added 21.

## Barcelona's finances holding up new Messi contract

We are in the process of finding the best solution, says club chief Laporta

Barcelona's poor finances have become the stumbling block to getting Lionel Messi to sign another contract, according to club president Joan Laporta.

Messi was officially no longer a Barcelona player on Thursday, following the expiry of his contract. That came 16 years after the forward signed his first professional contract with the club that he joined at age 13.

## Cautiously optimistic

Laporta has continued to mark a cautiously optimistic tone when asked if he was close to convincing Messi to stay put. Laporta was club president when a teenage Messi had his breakout. He returned to run the club in March after winning an election with the promise he would use his good relationship with Messi to get him to stay.

Late on Wednesday, Laporta told a popular sports talk radio show that the deal was being held up only be-

cause of the Spanish league's strict financial fair play rules.

"We want him to stay and Leo wants to stay, it is all going well," Laporta told Onda Cero radio.

"We still have to deal with the issue of financial fair play. We are in the process of finding the best solution for both parties." Barcelona's all-time leading scorer is in Brazil leading Argentina at the Copa America, far from

the hubbub at Camp Nou.

## Huge blow

Barcelona's finances suffered a huge blow last season, when the questionable management by the prior club board was exacerbated by a drop in revenues provoked by the pandemic.

When Laporta returned to power, he inherited a club saddled with debt of 1.2 billion euros (USD 1.4 billion) and massive contracts that

former club president Josep Bartomeu gave players, including Messi.

Messi's previous contract, signed in 2017, earned him an eye-popping 138 million euros (USD 164 million) per season. Laporta has said that Messi is willing to take a significant pay cut, but even so, the club is apparently struggling to make the numbers work.

Laporta recently said Barcelona's finances "were worse than I had imagined." He said the payroll plus other payments tallied 650 million euros (USD 771 million).

The Spanish league slashed the salary cap for Barcelona down from a league-high 671 million euros (USD 796 million) for the 2019-20 season to just 383 million euros (USD 454 million) for last campaign.

A new salary cap is expected to be announced in the coming weeks, but with Barcelona's finances still a mess it is expected to be much more generous. The salary cap is proportional to 70% of a club's revenue.

## Veteran footballer Hakim recounts Rome Olympics

The Indian football team last participated in an Olympics in the 1960 edition in Rome. S.S. Hakim, son of coach Syed Rahim of Hyderabad, was a member of the squad which, however, failed to make it to the knockout phase.

## Missed chances

For Hakim, now 81, it stands out as one of the memorable experiences though he insists it was a story of missed chances for the Indian team.

"The team was led by the great P.K. (Banerjee) with my father as the coach. Tulsidas Balaram scored two goals – one each against Hungary and Peru. But unfortunately we lost both the

matches," Hakim told *The Hindu*.

"We had the satisfaction of holding France with P.K. equalising in the 71st minute. But we failed to make the knock-out phase.

"The atmosphere was unthinkable. Being just there and basking in the aura of an

Olympics is something which every athlete dreams of. I was fortunate to be part of that squad," said Hakim, who did not get a chance to figure in the starting line-up of the star-studded team.

## Golden era

"The fact that India failed to make it to the Olympics after the Rome Games can also put in perspective the quality of that team. That was the golden era of Indian football and Hyderabad produced 15 Olympians.

from the United Kingdom were so impressed with Rahim Saab's coaching that they invited him to be a visiting lecturer to enlighten them about the art of scoring. Unfortunately, I couldn't make the trip because of foreign exchange issues.
