Parties stand firm on demand to debate Pegasus snooping issue first

The Opposition parties on Wednesday sent out their message in one voice - a debate in Parliament on the alleged Pegasus cyberattack first, rejecting a peace deal offered by Rajya Sabha Chairman Venkaiah Naidu. Five Bills – three in the Rajya Sabha and two in the Lok Sabha – were passed amidst shrill protests from Opposition members holding placards and shouting slogans against the government.

"The opposition parties stand firm and united on their demand for a discussion on Pegasus issue in both the Houses, replied to by the Home Minister, as this has national security dimensions," said a joint statement issued by the Congress, Trinamool Congress, DMK, Samajwadi Party, RJD, NCP, Shiv Sena, National Conference, IUML, CPI(M), CPI, Aam Aadmi Party, Revolutionary Socialist Party and Loktantrik Janata Dal.

It stated, "The opposition has also unequivocally conveved that the discussion on the farmers' issues and agitations arising from the three anti-farmer and black agrilaws should follow the discussion on Pegasus.'



Dahiya storms into final, India assured of another medal

Boxer Lovlina settles for bronze in women's welterweight

It was a gripping Wednesday for India at the Tokyo Olympics, and Ravi Kumar Dahiya led the charge. The wrestler registered a sensational triumph against Kazakhstan's Nurislam Sanayev in the freestyle 57 kg semifinal bout and grappled his way into Thursday's final against Russia's Zaur Uguev. India is assured of a silver medal.

Trailing 2-9, Dahiya reduced the deficit to 7-9 before pinning his opponent down; he was eventually de-

clared 'winner by fall'. The 23-year-old from Haryana became the second Indian wrestler to qualify for an Olympic final, his predecessor being Sushil Kumar at


the London Games in 2012. Dahiya's effort capped a remarkable day for the Indian contingent in which its medal hopes never waned. Lovlina Borgohain lost the women's welterweight (64-69 kg) semifinal to Turkey's Busenaz Surmeneli, but the boxer from Assam already had the bronze in her kitty by virtue of having qualified for the last-four stage. Bronze would be the tar-

get for the women's hockey team too after its 1-2 defeat to Argentina in the semifinal. In Friday's third place play-off, India will play Great Britain. India's medal hopes

gained a fillip through Neerai Chopra's maiden throw of 86.65 m in javelin. It ensured his instant qualification for the final. The autoqualification was pegged at 83.5 m.

Efforts to track emerging COVID-19 variants shrink

Only 184 genomes sequenced in July

While the second wave is vet to trough and there are signs that a third wave may be round the corner, India's efforts to sequence genomes to track for emerging variants plummeted after April.

Data from the National SARS-CoV-2 Genome Consortium (INSACOG), a network of 28 labs across the country equipped to sequence genomes of the coronavirus for emerging variants, shows that in July, only 184 genomes were sequenced. In June, 4,381 samples were sequenced, which is itself a stark decline from May (13,142 samples) and April (15,546 samples). The latter two months were when India bore the brunt of the second wave that saw daily cases grow to as many as 4,00,000.

As of July 30, INSACOG had sequenced 58,240 genomes, of which 46,124

On the slow track APRIL 15,546

samples had been analysed and their lineages (variant history) ascertained and submitted to the National Centre for Disease Control (NCDC), according to the response to a question in the Lok Sabha.

Andhra-Telangana case Denied its share of water, claims A.P.

CJI recuses himself from +

Chief Justice of India (CJI) N.V. Ramana on Wednesday recused himself from hearing a petition filed by Andhra Pradesh accusing Telangana of depriving its people of their legitimate share of water for drinking and irrigation.

The Chief Justice, who said he hailed from both Andhra Pradesh and Telangana, withdrew after A.P. rejected the court's suggestion to send the case for mediation. "The matter requires adjudication," advocate G. Umapathy, for Andhra Pradesh, informed the Bench, also comprising Justice Surya Kant. "In that case, if you do not want mediation, I cannot hear this case. Let it be listed before another Bench," the CJI said.

Solicitor General Tushar Mehta, for the Centre, said that he personally and the government had "full faith"



in the Chief Iustice in the case and urged him to not recuse. "Thank you, but I cannot hear this case," Chief

Justice Ramana said. In the previous hearing, he asked the Andhra Pradesh counsel to get instructions on whether they wanted the case to be sent for mediation or continue with the adjudication. Senior advocate Dushyant Dave, who represented the State, had asked for some time to get instructions.

Rajbhar denies alliance prospects with BJP but keeps option open

He lays down 5 demands, including OBC Chief Minister in U.P.

Two years after Suheldev Bhartiya Samaj Party president Om Prakash Rajbhar was sacked from the Uttar Pradesh government led by the BJP following his rebellion before the 2019 Lok Sabha election, the OBC leader seems to be inching towards his old ally again.

The speculation was triggered after Mr. Rajbhar called upon BJP's Uttar Pradesh president Swatantra Dev Singh on Tuesday. The SBSP chief described the one-hour meeting as a courtesy visit but admitted that politics was on the table.



"I come from the 'pichdi iati (backward caste)'. He also comes from the 'pichdi jati'. So we often have these courtesy meetings," he said.

Though Mr. Rajbhar dismissed that he would join hands with the BJP for the 2022 Assembly poll, he laced it with a caveat. He told a news channel that he would consider an alliance with the BJP if it fulfilled his five demands, including having an OBC Chief Minister. "Let the BJP implement these. After that I will think about it. But not before it because I have tasted betrayal," he said. SBSP general secretary

and Mr. Rajbhar's son, Arvind Rajbhar, issued a statement on Wednesday ruling out an alliance with the BJP. "The SBSP will not have any alliance with the Bharatiya 'Jhooth' Party [BJP]. The meeting was personal. Yes, political discussion was held. BJP [U.P.] president said 2022 will be difficult without you,"

Mr. Arvind Rajbhar said.

The Delhi government and Raj Niwas found themselves at loggerheads yet again on Wednesday after Lieutenant-Governor Anil Baijal chaired a meeting to review the CO-VID-19 situation in the national capital.

Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal accused Mr. Baijal of holding a "parallel meeting behind the back" of the elected government and asked the L-G to "respect democracy".

Two women officers played a critical role in Delhi Police's biggest arrest of the year

Preeti Sangwan tailed gangster Kala Jathedi for days before he was nabbed while Neetu Sindhu spent 72 hours non-stop in office assisting the ground team

It was around 2.30 p.m. and the Delhi Police team was following gangster Kala Jathedi and his partner Anuradha Chaudhary for nearly 24 hours. As the couple stopped at a dhaba in Saharanpur- Yamuna Nagar highway, the team waited a few seconds.

"Target in sight and not moving," said one. The direction to arrest him dead or alive was followed.

The plan was to park one of the three cars at the rear part of the dhaba but the last minute call was to drive all cars right in front of the eatery. The officers immediately swung into action, got out of the vehicles and placed Kala Jathedi under arrest.

In a black turban at the time, the turban was removed to ensure it was him.

But it was Sub Inpector Preeti Sangwan, 27, who quickly moved towards Anuradha and held her tight from behind. "You are under arrest," she told her.

In the team of 40-odd officials working on arguably the biggest arrest of the year for Delhi Police so far - Kala Jathedi - two were female officers: Sub Inspectors Preeti and Neetu Sindhu, 30.

The two officers from the Special Cell's Counter Intelligence Unit exclusively spoke to The Hindu about the operation and what it means to be a part of a unit particularly dominated by men.

Going against the grain Ms. Sangwan hails from Ha-

ryana's Charkhi Dadri where her father is a farmer and mother, a housewife.

Being born and brought up in a town where girls were not encouraged to step out, the officer started breaking barriers right from her school days by completing her higher studies.

She then attended college by travelling a long distance

"with a male friend" – much against the societal norms.

But she had resolved to pursue higher education and went on to complete her bachelors in Commerce, and Masters in Computer Applications.

She joined Delhi Police in 2018, and became part o the Special Cell (CIU) in 2020.

"It's been a great experience here because the learning is impeccable. I have learnt different types of technologies and how to use them in digital investigation. It's the kind of work that

gives me an adrenaline rush. The seniors and colleagues both are extremely supportive," she added.

An unforgettable case

Recalling the operation to arrest Kala Jathedi, which was named 'D-24' - an operation which she claims to never forget in her career, she said she was on the field the last 10 days till the arrest was finally affected on July 30.

After analysing data, the team - which had been working on the case for over

in which Jathedi could be present on July 20. SI Preeti picked up and followed that vehicle on Mathura-Gwalior Road. The shadowing continued till 1.30 a.m. the next day when they reached Faridabad only to ascertain that the 'target' was not in the vehicle. The next day, the team found that they had to find and spot two vehicles in Uttarakhand where the target could be. SI Preeti, along with a team, immediately left for the next assignment.

"We had divided the area 40 km each, road by road, street by street and colony by colony, we looked for the cars left to right. In car, on foot and through jungles also, we kept looking for the two cars," she recalled.

She had to cover parts of Dehradun and Haridwar.

After struggling for three days, an apartment complex in a district in Uttarakhand was the new search destination. The next challenge was to spot the car in the apartment complex without getting noticed

SI Preeti was asked to get a scooty, act like a local, and go inside the apartment complex to find whether the white coloured car is there.

And the moment they had all been waiting for arrived.

After walking and scanning for over 4 hours, a suspect car was found. "I wish I could explain the feeling. It was finally done". The next three hours, she spent walking in the rain waiting for the

and to ascertain whether the car they had spotted was in fact Jathedi's.

They finally came. A man in a turban and a woman.

The team was almost sure it was him. "Even inside the apartment complex, they would drive at a very high speed. That night, they came back in one hour".

The next day, SI Preeti managed to ascertain the tower in which the target could be residing and the floor using the analysis on time taken by the woman to walk up and shut the door, which the officer could hear.

On July 29, the couple left the apartment at an unexpected time and didn't come back till the night. With over 20 teams of two-three personnel scattered in an area covering 20 square km, the chase began, with SI Preeti in the lead. Midway, the target managed to exchange cars with a dummy couple and all efforts at camouflage were to end in vein by the afternoon of July 30.

Technical support

SI Neetu, a 2014-batch officer, posted with CIU since 2020 and trained by C-DAC and pursuing Post Graduate Diploma in Electronics & IT, spent the last 72 continuous hours of the operation in the CIU office providing technical assistance - critical for last-mile operation – leaving behind her three-year-old daughter at home.

"I would video call with my daughter only during the day because she knows that I'll be in office at that time but in the evening, she would want to come to office if I would call her," she recalled.

"My posting at Special Cell has been a revelation of my inner strengths", she said.

She returned home triumphant and exhausted after Jathedi was finally in her col-

Crime Branch to take over investigation

Four days after a nine-yearold girl was found dead inside a cremation ground in south-west Delhi, the case has been transferred to the Delhi Police Crime Branch.

Four people, including a priest, have already been arrested in connection with the case. "The case has been transferred to the Crime Branch for further expeditious and scientific investigation in order to ensure speedy trial in the interest of justice," said the Delhi police spokesperson.

On Sunday evening, a nine-year-old girl was found dead inside the cremation ground where she had gone to get cold water. The priest allegedly told the family that she got electrocuted. The body was cremated allegedly without the parents' consent. The family believes that the girl's body was cremated quickly as she had been raped and then killed.

Four persons identified as the crematorium priest Radhey Shyam (55), and employees Kuldeep (63), Laxmi Narain (48) and Saleem (49) were arrested in connection with the case.

Forensic Science Laboratory officials said they are trying to ascertain whether there are any exhibits to prove scientifically whether the girl had been raped, however, sources said the exhibits collected from the spot and her mortal remains are insufficient to find such evidence.

Meanwhile, the Army establishment of Delhi Cantonment has served a notice to protesters on Old Nangal Road to remove tents and obstacles so that Army services can resume normally in view of upcoming Independence Day.

'Delhi govt. will give ex gratia of ₹10 lakh, hire best lawyers'

Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal on Wednesday met with the family of the nine-yearold girl who was allegedly sexually assaulted and murdered before her body was forcibly cremated in the Delhi Cantonment area.

In addition to assuring the family of all possible support, Mr. Kejriwal announced that the Delhi government will provide the family an ex gratia of ₹10 lakh, order a magisterial enquiry into the case, and appoint top lawyers so that the culprits get the strictest punishment. The CM was accompanied by Social Welfare Minister Rajendra Pal Gautam and Delhi Commission for Women Chairperson Swati Maliwal along with Aam Aadmi Party MLAs.

"A nine-year-old girl had to unfortunately suffer a heinous crime and was then murdered. I met her grieving parents. The injustice that has happened with the

family is very distressing," Mr. Kejriwal said.

He also stressed upon the "detrimental" law and order situation in Delhi and appealed to the Central government to take concrete measures in this regard. Mr. Kejriwal assured the Centre that the Delhi government will "fully cooperate" with it in order to fix the law and order situation. Such incidents in the national capital send out the wrong message inter-

nationally, he added. "Delhi is the national capital. If such incidents take place in the city, it does not send out a good message about the city. It makes the people feel unsafe, and internationally sends a message that India's Capital is witnessing such heinous incidents," Mr. Kejriwal said.

Stating that the case is "very serious" and merits "urgent attention", the DCW has summoned the Deputy Commissioner of South West district to be present before it on August 5 and produce the complete case file of the matter along with a copy of the FIR.

Will stand by victim's family till they get justice: Rahul Gandhi

Delhi Congress leaders demand trial in fast-track court

Congress leader Rahul Gandhi on Wednesday met the family of the nine-year-old Dalit girl who was allegedly raped and murdered in the Capital. Mr. Gandhi said he will stand with the family till they get justice and will not back down even an inch.

Twitter row

Reacting to a picture that Mr. Gandhi posted on Twitter with the girl's parents, the National Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCPCR) wrote to the social media platform asking for action against Mr. Gandhi's account for revealing the identity of the victim.

'Tweeting a photo of a victim's parents and thereby revealing her identity is a violation of the POCSO Act, 2012. NCPCR has taken cognisance of the matter and issued a notice to Twitter seekaction against Rahul Gandhi's Twitter handle as well as removal of the post," NCPCR Chairperson Priyank

Kanoongo tweeted.

Meanwhile, the Delhi Congress organised several protests across the city and demanded trial of the case by a fast-track court.

Delhi Congress chief Ch. Anil Kumar, who accompanied Mr. Gandhi to meet the victim's family, said the parents of the girl said that "she was also a desh ki beti (daughter of the country). and deserved justice".

Mr. Kumar said it was surprising that Chief Minister

Arvind Kejriwal, who was busy increasing the salary of his MLAs, could not spare time to meet the family immediately after the incident.

"Instead of addressing the problems being faced by Delhiites now, including the safety and security of women, broken roads, waterlogging, and spike in cases of vectorborne diseases, Mr. Kejriwal was fooling people by painting a rosy future of making Delhi like Singapore by 2047," Mr. Kumar said.

BJP demands death penalty for culprits

The Delhi BJP on Wednesday demanded the death penalty for those behind the alleged sexual assault, subsequent murder and forced cremation of a nine-year-old girl in the Delhi Cantonment area.

Delhi BJP president Adesh Gupta met the family of the victim and assured them that justice would be done and that the accused would not be spared at any cost.

He also asked the police for an impartial investigation into the matter and urged the Delhi government to provide adequate compensation to the victim's family.

Amended POCSO Act

Rohini BJP MLA Vijender Gupta said the culprits must be hanged at the earliest and speedy justice must be ensured for the family. He added that the amended POCSO Act has provisions for death penalty to perpetrators of sexual crimes against children.

Students, activists compare incident to Hathras case, seek swift justice

The National Commission for Scheduled Castes (NCSC) on Wednesday took suo motu congnisance of the alleged rape and murder of a nineyear-old Dalit girl in the Capital. The commission said that after meeting the family of the victim, NCSC chairman Vijay Sampla met district officials to recommend releasing compensation as per provisions of the SC/ST (Prevention of Atrocities) Act, 2016.

CPI(M) Polit Bureau member Brinda Karat also met the family of the victim and wrote to Home Minister Amit Shah requesting urgent action. She said that a "lie" is being spread that the girl's mother agreed to the hasty cremation, adding that it was reminiscent of what happened in the Hathras rape case – in which a 20-year-old woman was allegedly gangraped and killed by four men in Uttar Pradesh's Boolgarhi village last September.

ter the U.P. Police and the district administration cremated the woman without the consent of her family.

"It is indeed regrettable that you [Mr. Shah] have not intervened yet in this case even though Delhi police is under your ministry. My request is that you ensure that iustice is done. The parents cannot be ever compensated for the loss of their daughter. But the government is dutybound to ensure them financial support," Ms. Karat said in her letter.

Meanwhile, protests were held at Jantar Mantar by student groups demanding that the culprits in the case be punished without delay. The Students' Federation of India, along with Dalit Shoshan Mukti Manch and the All India Democratic Women's Association said sexual violence against women is a larger problem concerning a patriarchal society wherein women are rendered inferior and powerless.

Jawaharlal Nehru University Students' Union presi-

dent Aishe Ghosh said that dalit women are doubly oppressed. "We live in a political environment in which caste is being reinstated into our social order with its former vigour."

All India Students' Association Delhi vice-president Madhurima Kundu said: "India witnessed how the Hathras accused were shielded by the RSS-BJP. Delhi Police, which is under Amit Shah has failed to ensure the safety and security of women in the Capital."

Will fight for rights of Khori Basti residents'

Udit Raj says govts. shirking their duty

SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT NEW DELHI

Former Lok Sabha MP and Congress national spokesperson Udit Raj on Wednesday said the Harvana and Delhi governments as well as the Centre cannot abdicate their responsibility to rehathose rendered homeless due to demolition of Khori Basti in Faridabad, and reiterated that he will fight for their rights.

Mr. Raj said the Haryana government had come out with a rehabilitation policy for the residents of Khori Basti with the identity proofs of the State, but the Delhi government was mum on rehabilitating those belonging to the national capital. He said

efforts of the Haryana government for rehabilitation too were not enough, and the two State governments along with the Centre could not run away from their responsibility.

He demanded to know as to what was the hurry to knock down the houses of over one lakh poor people amid the pandemic when the Haryana government's amendments to Punjab Land Preservation Act, 1900, were in the pipeline. He alleged that the big hotels, farmhouses and educational institutes on the forest land belonging to the rich were spared, but the poor were targeted.

With the Lok Sabha passing a Bill to formalise the Commission for Air Quality Management for National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas on Wednesday, experts said the government has to now speed up implementation of alternatives to stubble burning.

The Centre, facing flak earlier this year from farmers protesting against the farm laws, had committed to removing a clause in the Air Commission Bill that would penalise farmers for burning stubble, an important contributor to noxious air quality. The current text of the Bill does away with this clause.

Anumita Rovchowdhury. head of Clean Air Programme at the Centre for Science and Environment, said it is unfair

to fine farmers without giving them viable alternatives.

Three solutions "If just by penalising farmers,

stubble burning could be stopped, we should have been able to end it by now. We have evidence that in areas where alternatives are implemented, fire incidents have come down," she said,

The government should in-

stead focus on alternative solutions to burning, she said.

"There are three main solutions to stubble burning: insitu treatment of stubble, exsitu treatment, and changing cropping pattern. The last one being the deeper and more fundamental solution. For in-situ management, the government is currently giving equipment to farmers to mix the stubble back into the soil, so that they do not have to burn it, but everyone is not getting these machines. The government should ensure their availability to everyone. Similarly, in ex-situ management, some companies have started collecting stubble for their use, but we need more

action on this front," she said. Ms. Roychowdhury said farmers, especially small and marginal farmers, need sup-

strategies, to mulch the straw into the soil and not burn it. "Penalty without access to so-Polash Mukerjee, Natural

lutions does not work." Resources Defense Council, an environmental advocacy group, said farmers burn stubble as other methods are expensive and they have less time before the next sowing season. "Imposing a fine is not going to work in our socio-economic conditions for curbing stubble burning. We need to focus on alternative solutions," he said.

But he said that the current development is bad in terms of deterrence to burn stubble. "Already there is economic distress and now there is no deterrence, so the farm fires could go up during this year's harvest season," he said.





Govt. caps RT-PCR price at pvt. labs

Maximum rate slashed to ₹500; for home collection of samples, it is ₹700

NEW DELHI

The Delhi government on Wednesday reduced the maximum rates private labs can charge for RT-PCR tests for COVID-19. The rates have been reduced to ₹500, when a person gives the sample at a centre and to ₹700 for home collection of samples, compared to earlier rates of ₹800 and ₹1,200 respectively.

"All labs/hospitals will display the revised rates at a prominent place latest within 24 hours of this order. This order comes into effect immediately and is for strict compliance by all concerned," read the order issued by Bhupinder S. Bhalla, Additional Chief Secretary (Health & Family Welfare).

The maximum rate the government pays to private labs, when samples collected by government centres are sent to private labs for testing, has

also been reduced to ₹300 from ₹800.

"Delhi govt. drastically reduces corona test rates. This will help the common man [sic]," Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal said in a tweet.

Chetan Kohli, Chief Operating Officer of Genestrings Diagnostics, said that the price cap may affect the labs' ability to manage costs.

"Subsidised rates will ensure more people can afford RT-PCR tests but the price cap may affect the labs' ability to manage costs that entails kits and consumables, as well as manpower, logistics etc. The older price was fair and affordable with a decent incentive for smaller labs to continue investing further in enhancing their capacity. Hence, in hindsight this price reduction may hurt the overall need to enhance capacity," he said.

More vaccinations

The number of daily COVID-19 vaccine doses administered in the city has increased for the second consecutive day, as per government data.

A total of 95,063 doses of vaccine were administered in the city on Tuesday, compared to 91,100 doses on Monday, as per a bulletin released by the Delhi government on Tuesday. Lack of clarity on buffer stock of oxygen: HC

'Centre's status report does not indicate that buffer stock is actually for Delhi's use'

The carrier construction project was approved by the Cabinet Committee on Security in 2002 and the contract for the first phase of construction was signed with the CSL in 2007. While the basic design of the IAC-1 was done by the Directorate of Naval Design, the detailed engineering, construction and system integration were done by the CSL. The project cost nearly ₹20,000 crore.

Italian firm Fincantieri helped in designing and system integration and Russia in developing the aviation complex. But the project gave a boost to indigenisation, starting from the development of warship-grade steel for the ship's hull construction to the development of a system.

Room for 30 aircraft

The IAC is equipped with numerous high-end technologies, including networkcentric distributed data processing and control systems, and state-of-the-art weapons such as the Barak LR-SAM (long-range surface to air missile) and sensors. It can carry about 30 assorted aircraft, including fighter jets and helicopters, is capable of a top speed of 28 knots and a cruising speed of 18 knots with an endurance of 7,500 nautical miles.

The ship, which is 262 m long, has over 2,300 compartments and is designed to have a complement of about 1,700 people with specialised cabins to accommodate women officers.

Kerala HC expands rape definition

A Division Bench of the Kerala High Court on Wednesday held that the definition of rape contained in Section 375 of the Indian Penal Code will take in sexual assaults. including the sexual acts committed between thighs of the victim.

The Bench led by Justice K. Vinod Chandran, while dealing with an appeal in a Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) case, observed that "Section 375 takes in sexual assaults beyond penile penetration into vagina, urethra, anus, and mouth, the known orifices in the human body to which such penetration was imaginably possible".

Tea planters in Assam flag dipping prices

A ₹38 hike in the daily cash wage of labourers has been a major factor in price realisation of tea declining markedly below the cost of production, a tea planters'

body has said. The North Eastern Tea Association (NETA) on Wednesday said the tea industry was struggling for survival due to an 18% dip in the price realisation of tea compared to that in 2020.

"The price realisation of tea has gone down by ₹44.19 per kg in a year while the cost of production has gone up due to the hike in wages and increase in the cost of inputs such as fertilizers, pesticides, diesel, natural gas, coal and transportation," NETA adviser Bidyananda Borkakoty said. The cost of production of

processed tea had gone up by ₹25 a kg. The daily cash wage hike from ₹167 to ₹205 and a ₹7 increase in input costs led to a "negative impact" on the industry to the tune of ₹76 per kg of processed tea, he said. According to the Guwahati Tea Auction Centre, the average price realisation of CTC tea from April to July this year was ₹208.02 per kg, down by ₹44.19 from ₹252.21 per kg during the same period

'Only about 9% teas have fetched above ₹300 a kg and about 51% of teas have got sold below ₹200 per kg," NETA chairman Sunil Jallan said.

Over the borderline

A people-oriented approach facilitated by the Centre can help resolve Assam-Mizoram row

The drawing down of tensions between Assam and Mizoram, at least at the leadership level, with the respective governments announcing the withdrawal of FIRs against the Chief Minister of Assam and a Rajya Sabha MP from Mizoram, among other steps, comes as a great relief. These actions followed the deaths of six policemen and a civilian from Assam in a violent gunfight in the border town of Vairengte in Mizoram on July 26, which exacerbated an already fraught situation between the States. The retaliatory actions such as filing FIRs against prominent representatives, at a time when locals in the Barak Valley in Assam had already imposed a blockade, disallowing trucks with essential goods from entering Mizoram, seemed to indicate that the States' leaderships were throwing away their scabbards, militating against their own moves to restore calm. After all, the governments had taken the right decision to withdraw their police forces from a four-kilometre "disputed stretch" and let it be manned by central paramilitary forces till a permanent solution is found on the border question. But the "blockade" and the damage caused to the only rail line connected to Mizoram made matters tough, culminating in the Mizo Bar Association filing a PIL before the Aizawl Bench of the Gauhati High Court against the "economic blockade". The Chief Ministers now seem committed to talks, with Assam's Himanta Biswa Sarma even suggesting that his government will approach the Supreme Court to find an amicable solution. Continuing talks without recriminations is the only way out to tamp down tensions between the two States.

The situation should never have come to this. What began as a conflict between residents of the States in the border area that is disputed between them, morphed into a violent battle between police, with paramilitary forces doing little to control or halt this. Their role in stopping the violence and securing the peace in the border areas between the States will now be paramount, even as the Assam government must compel residents to avoid continuing the blockade. An impartial inquiry into the sequence of events that led to the firing incident and the deaths must also be held so that such a situation does not recur. On the question of settling the borders to the satisfaction of both States, a concerted, people-oriented approach by the respective authorities with the facilitation of the Centre can strive to achieve that instead of a purely juridical approach that seeks to address this via the States' respective historical claims, a method that is used to settle sovereign claims. After all, both Assam and Mizoram are part of the Indian Union, and inter-State cooperation and cohesion are central to the sanctity of the federal system.

Tigray's woes

Ethiopia should end the blockade of the north and engage in talks with the TPLF

Then Ethiopian Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed sent troops to Tigray, the country's northern-**V** V most region, in November 2020, he promised it would be a short campaign against the Tigray People's Liberation Front (TPLF). Seven months later, when Ethiopia declared a unilateral ceasefire and withdrew, Mr. Abiy was indirectly accepting defeat. Government troops are now facing serious allegations of war crimes as bodies wash up in a river in Sudan that borders Ethiopia. The federal troops had initially ousted the TPLF from Mekele, the Tigrayan capital, and established a parallel government. But the TPLF retreated to the mountains, and then struck back. In June, it recaptured Mekele, forcing the federal troops to pull back. At least in defeat, Mr. Abiv could have accepted his mistakes and sought a settlement. But instead, he announced a blockade on Tigray, with even international aid deliveries stopped. The UN says at least 3,50,000 people are facing a "severe food crisis" in the region. The TPLF says it will not stop fighting unless the government lifts the blockade and pulls back all opposing troops. The conflict has already spilled over into the Amhara and Afar regions, threatening the very regional make-up of ethnically divided Ethiopia. An influx of re-

fugees has raised tensions with neighbouring Sudan.

Mr. Abiy, a Nobel Prize winner, went to war in Tigray as part of an ambitious plan to rewrite the country's power balance. Since Ethiopia embraced democracy in 1995, the TPLF, which led the resistance against the military dictatorship, the 'Derg', had played a key role in the ruling coalition, the Ethiopian People's Revolutionary Democratic Front (EPRDF). Mr. Abiy, an Oromo, rose to power in 2018 amid growing ethnic tensions and protests as the EPRDF's nominee. He ended the war with Eritrea, released political prisoners and promised more freedoms. But he also moved to end the TPLF's clout in Addis Ababa, which led to a split in the EPRDF. He formed a different coalition, the Prosperity Party, and retained power, by cutting the TPLF off federal government networks. When a defiant TPLF challenged the government, he declared war on Tigray. He may have hoped that the federal troops could oust the TPLF from power and establish order quickly. But he seemed to have overlooked Ethiopia's complex history of ethnic relations and the TPLF's guerrilla warfare. The war may have helped him politically – his coalition won a huge majority in the delayed June Parliamentary elections which were held in all regions except in Tigray – but it has pushed Tigray into an endless rebellion and shaken up the country's ethnic balance. It is time for Mr. Abiy to act like a statesman. He should stop the collective punishment of the Tigrayan people, end the blockade and be ready for talks with the TPLF for a mutually agreeable cessation of all hostilities.

A language ladder for an education roadblock

On a parallel note, the decision of the All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE), to permit B. Tech programmes in 11 native languages in tune with the New Education Policy (NEP), is a momentous one. This monumental move opens the door to a whole world of opportunities - to students of B.Tech courses, in Hindi, Marathi, Tamil, Telugu, Kannada, Gujarati, Malayalam, Bengali, Assamese, Puniabi and Odia.

The Prime Minister, Narendra Modi, in his address marking the first anniversary of the National Education Policy (NEP), hailed the move and pointed out that the NEP's emphasis on the mother tongue as the medium of instruction will instil confidence in students from poor, rural and tribal backgrounds. Importantly, he added that even in elementary education, the mother tongue is being promoted and referred to one of the key drivers in this regard – the Pravesh programme launched on the occasion.

These remarkable steps should be welcomed and scaled up over the next few years to ensure that the dreams of millions of students seeking to pursue professional courses in their mother tongue are

Interestingly, in a survey conducted by the AICTE in February this year, of over 83,000 students, nearly 44% students voted in favour of studying engineering in their mother tongue, underscoring a critical need in technical edu-

The progressive and visionary NEP 2020 champions education in one's mother tongue right from the primary school level - improving the learning outcomes of the child and the development of his/ her cognitive faculties hinge upon

Multiple studies have proved that children who learn in their mother tongue in their early, formative years perform better than those taught in an alien language. UNESCO and other organisations have been laying emphasis on the fact that learning in the mother tongue is germane to building selfesteem and self-identity, as also the overall development of the child. Unfortunately, some educators and parents still accord unquestioned primacy to English, and resultantly, the child's mother tongue ends up as their 'second/ third language' in schools.

There are bubbles now

It would be pertinent to recall the words of the great Indian physicist and Nobel Laureate, Sir C.V. Raman, who, demonstrating exemplary vision, observed, "We must teach science in our mother tongue. Otherwise science will be come a highbrow activity. It will not be an activity in which all people can participate... (https:// bit.ly/2VvakX6)." While our educational system has seen phenomenal growth to the extent that it offers courses of international repute in engineering, medicine, law and the humanities, we have, paradoxically, excluded our own people from accessing it. Over the years, we have ended up building academic roadblocks, impeding the progress of the vast majority of our students and remained content with creating a small bubble of English-medium universities



and colleges, while our own languages languish when it comes to technical and professional

Global practices

A cursory look at the global best practices in the medium of instruction at the level of higher education should inform us more on where we stand. Among the G20, most countries have state-of-theart universities, with teaching being imparted in the dominant language of their people.

Take the Asian nations among them, for instance. In South Korea, nearly 70% of the universities teach in Korean, even as they aspire to play a role on the international stage. In a unique move, with the increasing craze for learning English among parents, the South Korean government, in 2018, banned the teaching of English prior to third grade in schools, since it appeared to slow

pupils' proficiency in Korean. Similarly, in Japan, a majority of university programmes are taught in Japanese; in China too, universities use Mandarin as the medium of instruction. In Europe, France and Germany offer us great insights into how nations protect their languages. France went to the extent of having a strict 'French-only' policy as the medium of instruction in schools. In Germany, while the language of instruction in schools is predominantly German, even in tertiary education, more than 80% of all masters' programmes are taught

Canada showcases a sound approach to education, revealing a picture of a country with linguistic diversity. While English is the dominant medium of instruction in most provinces, in Quebec, a province with a majority Frenchspeaking population, French is the medium of instruction in primary and secondary education in many schools, as also a number of un-

In this global context, it is ironic that India has an overwhelming majority of professional courses being taught in English. In science, engineering, medicine and law, the situation is even bleaker, with native language courses being practically non-existent. Fortunately, we are now beginning to find our voice in our own languag-

How do we improve this grim situation? The NEP outlines the road map, demonstrating to us the means to protect our languages while improving the access and quality of our education. We must begin with imparting primary education (at least until Class 5) in the student's mother tongue, gradually scaling it up. For professional courses, while the initiative of the 14 engineering colleges is commendable, we need more such efforts all across the country. Private universities must join hands and offer a few bilingual courses to begin with.

One of the biggest bottlenecks for more students to take up higher education in the native languages is the lack of high-quality textbooks, especially in technical courses, and this needs to be addressed urgently.

Build on these initiatives

In the digital age, technology can be suitably leveraged to increase accessibility of these Indian language courses to students in remote areas. Content in the digital learning ecosystem, still a nascent domain in our country, is greatly skewed towards English which excludes the vast majority of our M. Venkaiah Naidu is the Vice President of children, and this has to be India

A welcome development in this regard is the collaboration between the AICTE and IIT Madras to translate SWAYAM's courses in eight regional languages such as Tamil, Hindi, Telugu, Kannada, Bengali, Marathi, Malayalam and Gujarati. This will be a major boost for engineering students and help them transition more smoothly to an English-dominated curriculum in later years. We need more such tech-led initiatives to really democratise higher education.

Not exclusivist

Laying the stress on instruction in the mother tongue is not exclusivist in nature – as I often say, one should learn as many languages as possible, but what is required is a strong foundation in the mother tongue. In other words, what I am advocating is not a 'Mother tongue versus English', but a 'Mother tongue plus English' approach. In today's increasingly interconnected world, proficiency in different languages opens new vistas to a wider world.

Together, we must work to remove the sense of inferiority some of us display when it comes to speaking in our own languages. In the end, we must remember that if we neglect a language, not only do we lose a priceless body of knowledge but also risk depriving future generations of their cultural roots and precious social and linguistic heritage

I hope more institutions will be encouraged and inspired in the coming years to offer courses in regional languages. India is a land of immeasurable talent. We must unlock the full potential of our youth, without letting their seeming inability to speak a foreign language impede their progress. It is against this backdrop that the decision of the 14 engineering colleges across eight States to offer courses in regional languages needs to be seen and appreciated.

A grand tax bargain in danger of coming apart

A Goods and Services Tax version 2.0 may have to be designed soon given the flaws in the existing structure,

fter four years, the promise of the Goods and Services Tax (GST) remains substantially unrealised. It is a far cry from the attempted avoidance of cascading and continues to be a not very transparent multi-rate system with associated difficulties in computing and assessing tax liability, tax burden and tax incidence. States have less headroom in handling GST collection shortfall after surrendering their fiscal autonomy. When the period of five years of compensation ends in 2022, will we see a continued flawed system or a freshly minted GST 2.0, given the asymmetry of the power equations between the States and the

The tax base of GST does not appear to be expanding as the recent uptick has reversed last month. The GST is strongly co-related to overall GDP. Revenue collection of the GST is dependent on the nominal growth rate of Gross Value Added (GVA) in the economy. Since inception, GVA per quarter has been between ₹40-lakh crore to ₹47-lakh crore and GST revenue has not been higher than ₹2.7-lakh crore to ₹3.1-lakh crore. The Tax to Gross value addition is only about 5% to 6.5% though GVA growth was much higher. Obviously, a very large segment is covered exemption, composition schemes, evasion and lower tax

Centre holds the cards

The fundamental weakness of the GST is its political architecture which is asymmetrically loaded in favour of the Centre. Disputes between States and between the Centre and the States are inevitable in a mosaic arrangement. But in the current structure, no particular body is tasked to adjudicate this though the original Constitution (115th Amendment) Bill 2011 (GST Bill) had a provision for such an institution. In the voting, the central government has one-third vote and States have two-thirds of total votes (with equal voting rights regardless of size and stake). With the support of a dozen small States whose total GST collection is not more than 5% of the total and their Budget is mostly underwritten by the central government – the game is hugely in the Centre's favour. With equal value for each States' voting, larger and mid-sized States feel short-

changed. Severe fiscal strain is expected when the 14% compensation comes to an end as the median growth rate of subsumed taxes is only 11%, and in many States between 5% to 10%. The median subsumed tax buoyancy is below unity. This means with 1% growth, there will be a 0.75% growth of tax. The contraction of GST revenue

across the country means that the compensation amount will be higher and the clamour for a continuance of compensation scheme is inevitable.

Issues with tax structure

The second problem is the design flaws in the tax structure. Nearly 45% to 50% of commodity value is outside the purview of the GST, such as petrol and petroleum products. In addition, States which export or have inter-State transfers or mineral and fossil fuel extractions are not getting revenue as the origin States and need a compensation mechanism. The pre-existing threshold level of VAT has been tweaked too often which has led to an evaporation of tax base incentivising, enabling evasion and misreporting. Most trading and retail establishments, (however small) are out of the fold of the GST. At the retail level, irrespective of whether Input Tax Credit (ITC) is required or not, the burden can be passed off to the consumer. As a result, the loss could be as high as one third.

Third, exemptions from registration and taxation of the GST

have further eroded the GST tax complexity it creates in record base compared to the tax base of the pre-existing VAT. Exemptions are purely distortionary and also provide a good chance to remain under the radar, thereby directly increasing evasion or misclassifisation. As multiple rates are charged at different stages, it goes against the lessons of GST history. This tax works well with a single uniform tax rate for all commodities and services at all stages, inputs and outputs alike. While most countries have a single rate, India stands out and is among the five countries to have four rates/slabs.

Exclusion as another issue

The fourth is that of exclusion. Petroleum products remaining outside the purview of GST has helped the Centre to increase cesses and decrease central excise, in what would otherwise have been shareable with the States. Now, States will be keen on including petrol and diesel under the GST as their share of tax goes up in the process, even if there is a special rate fixed for it.

In April 2017, cess and surcharge formed 56% and 35% of the excise duty on petrol and diesel, respectively. Now, their share has increased to 91% and 85%, respectively, and the shareable central excise has reduced by ₹6.5 a litre, making it ₹2.98 for petrol and ₹4.83 for diesel. Equity requires that petrol and diesel be brought under the GST. Apart from the

keeping and 'granting ITC', in the present form it also leads to a cascading which the GST avowedly tried (https://bit.ly/3xiIhYp).

Fifth, compliance with GST recation. Theoretically, exemptions turn (GSTR-1) filing stipulation and not up to date. The gap in filing GSTR-1 was 33% in 2019-20 and has been increasing. As per GSTR-3B, the effective tax rate is as low as 6.5% when GSTR-1 shows an average 15% tax rate. Fraudulent claims of Input Tax Credit (ITC) because of a lack of timely reconciliation are quite high though it has come down by two thirds. Tax evasion, estimated by a National Institute of Public Finance and Policy's paper, is at least 5% in minor States and plus 3% in the major

These policy gaps with regard to a higher threshold (when in sales tax, it was lower) exemption level and multiple tax rates have led to a base erosion. Policy gaps along with compliance gaps do need to be addressed. Without proper tax information, infrastructure and base, the States would go in for selective tax enforcement. In the long run, voluntary compliance will suffer and equity in taxation will be violated. Finally, the grand bargain will come apart. Given all these problems, a version 2.0 of GST may have to be designed sooner rather than later.

The doubted scientist and her vaccine revolution

Katalin Kariko's once-derided idea led to the genesis of two vaccines to fight COVID-19 and more

As the world continues to grapple with the COVID-19 pandemic, it is becoming increasingly apparent to every country that rapid mass vaccination is the only sure way to stop the virus in its tracks. Yet, as we debate issues like vaccine inequality and vaccine nationalism, we tend somewhat to neglect the science bit, the creation of the vaccines, which happens to be the only positive element in the discourse about the pandemic. Indeed, the speed with which the vaccines to fight COVID-19 have been invented and tested is unparalleled in the history of medical science. And one interesting fact about this stunning feat of science is that several women have led it from the front.

These women of science have emerged as role models in a field of human endeavour that is still perceived as 'masculine' and is dominated by men in leading positions. Sarah Gilbert at the University of Oxford led the creation of AstraZeneca's Vaxzevria (known in India as Covishield). In the same league we have K. Sumathy, who steered the team behind Bharat Biotech's Covaxin. Hanneke Schuitemaker, a Dutch virologist, guided the development of Janssen by Johnson & Johnson. Elena Smolyarchuk at Sechenov University led the study for Sputnik V.

A bold idea

However, the scientist who should be feted the most for her work on developing vaccines to fight COVID-19 is Katalin Kariko, a Hungarian-origin biochemist working in the U.S. Dr. Kariko has not only led the creation of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine, which is one of the most effective, but in doing so, she has also invented and perfected a new technique involving a molecule called the mRNA. This has revolutionised biotechnology, paving the way for unheard-of miracles in drug development.

The mRNA (messenger-Ribonucleic Acid) is a molecule naturally manufactured by animal cells that gives signals to cells about which pro-

cells vital genetic information upon which protein synthesis, one of the most critical physiological functions, thoroughly depends. Yet, no one before Dr. Kariko thought mRNA could be modified in labs to harness their code-carrying ability for triggering the manufacture of specific proteins by cells - proteins that would generate precise antibodies needed to fight particular antigens or diseasecausing micro-organisms.

This idea, of tweaking the 'message' in the mRNA for customised signalling to cells, was simple and logical, like many breakthrough ideas in science. But it was also stunningly bold. In effect, Dr. Kariko was aiming to play God with a cellular function so foundational that it has always been taken for granted. Expectedly, her idea was treated by the whole scientific community in the U.S. as odd and improbable. It was repeatedly rejected by funding bodies, and Dr. Kariko struggled to get a grant or even a lab to work consistently on the mRNA.

Two chance encounters

Yet, she held on to her idea, working on it sporadically in shared labs, while surviving on a low-end, insecure job at the University of Pennsylvania. And this – the lack of grants or

teins to make. That is, it carries to the a solid professional position – meant more rejections and more isolation. Dr. Kariko was at the point of giving up when a chance encounter at a photocopy centre one morning in 1998 changed her decision. Dr. Drew Weissman, an influential biotechnologist working at UPenn, was moderately impressed by Dr. Kariko's idea and agreed to share his lab and other

resources with her.

It was here that Dr. Kariko honed the technology to modify the mRNA and tested it on mice. After an initial hiccup, she was successful. The modified mRNA was able to trigger targeted protein synthesis in mice with no negative side effects. Yet – such is the hold of convention and status on the scientific establishment – there was hardly any excitement around the invention. Dr. Kariko remained where she was and what she was until another chance meeting at a conference with Uğur Şahin, the CEO of BioNTech. Dr. Kariko, an academic, became the vice-president of BioN-Tech RNA Pharmaceuticals, using her technology to manufacture an influenza vaccine.

And then COVID-19 hit the world. In February 2020, when the virus was still mostly confined to China, her employer seemed to sense it was going to be much worse. He and Dr. Kariko decided to start working on a

vaccine against the novel pathogen using the mRNA technology. By then BioNTech had partnered with Pfizer, and Dr. Kariko's work led to the development of their vaccine against CO-VID-19. Moderna later used the same technology to develop their vaccine. Thus, Dr. Kariko's once-derided idea led to the genesis of two of the most effective anti-COVID-19 vaccines, in the process establishing an epochmaking new technology

Lessons from the invention

Dr. Kariko's brilliance as an innovator underscores the point that women can be as good as men in science - a point that should have been well-established by now, but which is hardly the accepted view among people even in the Western world. Her revolutionary invention, one hopes, would go some way in negating sexist assumptions about women in science, not many of whom achieve such spectacular success but all of whom contribute to the collective endeavour of human science. Dr. Kariko's career, moreover, should have a lesson for all systems of power everywhere - that when some idea challenges the norms or conventions of a system, it is the system that needs to stretch itself in order to give it a chance. Entrenched conventionality is the bane of all human endeavours, and especially of science, which is synonymous with progress.

When Dr. Kariko was invited to a vaccination site for health workers at UPenn, in December 2020, the otherwise emotionally stable woman was moved by the sight of the big crowd waiting to get a shot of her vaccine. And when the doctors broke into spontaneous clapping as she and Dr. Weissman walked past them in a hall, she gave in and "cried a bit" in joy, she told Gina Kolata of The New York Times. Her life's dream, which she had been chasing since she was 22, was finally realised, and a long saga of doubt, implied insult, and unrewarded toil had come to an end. I believe Dr. Kariko deserves the Nobel Prize in Medicine for her revolutionary idea and her incredible hard work. Hers is an idea that has opened up the scope for endless possibilities in drug development.

Clash of cultures in a federation

The homogenising tendency of the union in India and EU clashes with the particularism unique to individual states

Though probably the most equitable form of governance for multiracial, multicultural countries, there are only a few confederations in the world, such as Canada and Switzerland. India and the European Union (EU) are unions. However, India is a federation because powers are divided between the Union and the States, and the EU a supranational organisation that defies definition, with both confederal and federal aspects. It is this division of powers in India and the EU that brings the unions into conflict with their constituent parts.

Latest controversy in the EU

The EU is variously criticised as a "political dwarf", "a hobbled giant" distracted by internal bickering and competing national agendas, and an aggregate of secondary powers in search of primary status through collective agency. Despite the EU being one of the largest economies of the world, the 27 leaders squabble over issues from fisheries to budget allocations. The union finds it easier to promote universal standards in areas like climate change and food and bio-safety than domestic values. The latest controversy with Hungary and Poland on gay and lesbian rights is a case in point. Gay marriage is not recognised by Budapest and only heterosexual couples can legally adopt children. The LGBTQ law that took effect in July outlaws information perceived as promoting homosexuality or gender change to children under 18. This led to strong criticism from 17 liberal EU nations who believe the Hungarian law undermines the principle that discrimination on the basis of sexuality, ethnicity and gender is not permissible within the union.

Hungarian Prime Minister Victor Orbán has countered by proposing a national referendum on the law. He has been re-elected thrice, commands two-thirds of the legislature, and has diminished institutions designed to limit the powers of the state, such as free media, universities and an independent judiciary. Mr. Orbán also regularly frustrates EU's unity on foreign policy, such as on refugees in 2016, opposing criticism of China's actions in Hong Kong, and the call for a ceasefire between Israel and Hamas. Hungary was the first EU member to accept Russian and Chinese COVID-19 vaccines before approval by the EU medicines regulator.

The European Parliament voted over-

whelmingly to haul Hungary before the European Court of Justice over its LGBTQ law, and while there is an EU provision to remove voting rights from an offending country, penalties require unanimous agreement from EU states. This will never be forthcoming since Hungary and Poland support each other and the union cannot expel a member state without the unanimity requirement.

Poland's Catholic-conservative governing party takes a similar stance on LGBTQ with by-laws that have designated one-third of the nation as 'LGBT-free zones'. Budapest and Warsaw are supported by Slovenian Prime Minister Janez Janša, who condemns Brussels for imposing "imaginary European values" without paying heed to local tradition. All three countries' leaderships have expressed doubts, and placed restrictions, on the functioning of judicial independence.

Although none of these leaders believe they can convince their EU colleagues to follow their social policies, they do not wish to separate from the union, since EU membership is supported by a huge majority. Hungary is the second-largest net beneficiary of the EU budget, receiving €5 billion more than it contributes each year. The measures introduced by the three nations are for domestic popularity in a combined population of nearly 50 million with cultural traditions different from more liberal EU member states. The crisis represents a clash of cultures, which underlines why integration towards a closer union is unlikely to materialise.

A fractious relationship

In India, the Centre and Opposition-controlled States have a historically fractious relationship. Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru in 1959 dislodged the Communist government in Kerala on specious grounds. Ever since, the pattern of the Union government attempting to subvert Opposition States by stimulating defections, ordering selective raids by investigative agencies, electronic surveillance, and delaying or refusing financial entitlements has become the unsavoury norm, now taken to extremes by Hindutva ideologues in control of the Centre. The tensions between New Delhi and the Opposition-led periphery are magnified by differences in values, perceived arrogance on the part of the Centre and the victimhood card played by Opposition parties. The homogenising bias of the union clashes with the particularism unique to individual States, resulting in the clash of cultures. The term 'cooperative federalism', coined by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, has been reduced to an oxymoron.

No fundamental right to strike

Essential workers should not resort to strike

Recently, the Minister of Defence introduced the Essential Defence Services Bill, 2021, in the Lok Sabha to provide for the maintenance of essential defence services so as "to secure the security of nation and the life and property of the public at large" and prevent staff of the government-owned ordnance factories from going on strike. The Bill seeks to empower the government to declare services mentioned in it as "essential defence services" and prohibit strikes and lockouts in any industrial establishment or unit engaged in such services. The Minister, however, assured the Ordnance Factory Board (OFB) employees that their service conditions will not be affected.

Rules and rights

This is not for the first time that strikes by government employees are being made explicitly illegal by the government. The Madhya Pradesh (and Chhattisgarh) Civil Services Rules, 1965, prohibit demonstrations and strikes by government servants and direct the competent authorities to treat the durations as unauthorised absence. A strike under this rule includes "total or partial cessation of work", a pen-down strike, a traffic jam, or any such activity resulting in cessation or retardation of work. Other States too have similar provisions.

Under Article 33 of the Constitution, Parliament, by law, can restrict or abrogate the rights of the members of the armed forces or the forces charged with the maintenance of public order so as to ensure the proper discharge of their duties and maintenance of discipline among them. Thus, for the armed forces and the police, where discipline is the most important prerequisite, even the fundamental right to form an association can be restricted under Article 19(4) in the interest of public order and other considerations.

The Supreme Court in *Delhi Police* v. Union of India (1986) upheld the restrictions to form association by the members of the non-gazetted police force after the Police Forces (Restriction of Rights) Act, 1966, and the Rules as amended by Amendment Rules, 1970, came into effect. While the right to freedom of associa-

tion is fundamental, recognition of such association is not a fundamental right. Parliament can by law regulate the working of such associations by imposing conditions and restrictions on their functions, the court held.

In T.K. Rangarajan v. Government of Tamil Nadu (2003), the Supreme Court held that the employees have no fundamental right to resort to strike. Further, there is prohibition to go on strike under the Tamil Nadu Government Servants' Conduct Rules, 1973. Also, there is no moral or equitable justification to go on strike. The court said that government employees cannot hold the society to ransom by going on strike. In this case, about two lakh employees, who had gone on strike, were dismissed by the State government.

Grievance redressal

A police havildar was convicted of contempt of court by the sub-divisional officer, Gaya. The Gaya police, thereupon, gave notice of strike unless redress was given to the havildar and the sub-divisional officer punished. Though an inquiry was ordered immediately, the strike commenced on March 24, 1947. When some representatives of policemen met Gandhi at Jehanabad on the March 28, he told them that their strike was ill-advised. They were not mere wage-earners but the members of an essential service. They should immediately and unconditionally call off the strike. In his speech on March 27, Gandhi said that "the police... should never go on strike. Theirs was an essential service and they should render that service, irrespective of their pay. There were several other effective and honourable means of getting grievances redressed..."

There is no fundamental right to strike under Article 19(1)(a) of the Constitution. Strikes cannot be justified on any equitable ground. Strike as a weapon is mostly misused which results in chaos. Though the employees of OFB have threatened to go on strike, Parliament, which has the right to restrict even the fundamental rights of the armed forces, is well within its right to expressly prohibit resorting to strike.



Air Quality Commission Bill for National Capital Region cleared

It has a full time chairperson, will have the final say on policy to address problem

The Lok Sabha on Wednesday passed the Bill to formalise the Commission for Air Ouality Management For National Capital Region and Adjoining Areas. The body has a full time chairperson and a range of members consisting of both representatives from several Ministries as well as independent experts and will have the final say on evolving policy and issuing directions to address air pollution in Delhi and the adjoining regions.

The Centre, facing flak earlier this year from farmers protesting the farm laws, had committed to removing a clause in the Air Commission Bill that would penalise farmers for burning stubble, an important contributor to noxious air quality. The text of the Bill does away with this clause.

The body first came into

being in October, 2020 on the back of an ordinance - a temporary measure - and the law requires that a formal Bill be presented to Parliament within six weeks of it reconvening - in this case -January 29 when the Budget Session began. Before a Bill is tabled in Parliament, it needs to be approved by the Union Cabinet. However, in spite of several Cabinet meetings since January, it wasn't taken up for discussion due to which, the tenure of the body expired, without ever making it to Parliament.

As The Hindu had reported in March, members who were part of the Commission said they were taken aback by the sudden dissolution of the body. The dissolution happened despite the nodal Union Environment Ministry submitting the paper work to the Union Cabinet Secretariat, required to give legal backing to the Commission. The Commission was revived on April 13 after another ordinance was promulgated by the President.

The Centre had said the new organisation would be a 'permanent' body to address pollution in the National Capital Region Delhi and address sources of pollution in Delhi, Punjab, Rajasthan, Haryana and Uttar Pradesh. The all-powerful body assumed several powers to coordinate action among States, levy fines – ranging up to ₹1 crore or five years of prison - to address air pollution.

While the Central Pollution Control Board and its State branches have the powers to implement provisions of the Environment Protection Act for air, water and land pollution, in case of dispute or a clash of jurisdictions, the Commission's writ would prevail specific to matters concerning air pol-

Row over Pegasus, farm laws continues

The Rajya Sabha on Wednesday passed three Bills in about one hour, while the Opposition continued its protest against the government on the Pegasus spyware issue and demanded the repeal of the three farm laws.

Bills were introduced. discussed and passed amid din. The House was also adjourned for 15 minutes in that time. Asked to speak on the Bills, many of the Opposition MPs chose to raise the issues they have been protesting over, leading to the chair cutting them short.

The Limited Liability Partnership (Amendment) Bill 2021, which seeks to encourage the start-up ecosystem and further boost ease of doing business, was cleared. The Bill was passed in 20 minutes with neither the speeches of the members nor the reply by Fi-

nance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman clearly audible. Demands for a division were ignored as Deputy Chairman Harivansh said the House was not in order.

Sujeet Kumar (BJD), Kanakmadela Ravindra Kumar (TDP) and M. Thambidurai (AIADMK) spoke briefly in support of the Bill.

The Rajya Sabha also passed the Deposit Insurance and Credit Guarantee Corporation (Amendment) Bill, 2021 after a brief discussion, amid disruptions from the Opposition. Ms. Sitharaman said it was in the interest of small depositors.

The House also passed the Airports Economic Regulatory Authority (Amendment) Bill, 2021, which would change the definition of "major airport" and allow the government to club together smaller airports. Civil Aviation Minister Jyotiraditva Scindia said the Bill would include airports in smaller cities.

Govt. establishing a new normal: Chowdhury

Objects to passing Bills amid din

Twitter violated principle of natural justice'

The government on Wednesday said that the labelling of tweets as "manipulated media" by Twitter does not come under the purview of the new IT Rules. However, the U.S.headquartered microblogging platform has been told that by doing so it violates "the principle of natural

In May this year, the government had asked Twitter to remove the "manipulated media" tag from certain tweets by some Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) leaders, including the party's national spokesperson Sambit Patra, related to a "Congress toolkit" allegedly used to defame the government's efforts related to COVID-19.

Fairness and equity

The government had reasoned that "the tags affixed prejudicially" should be removed in the interests of fairness and equity, and that investigation by law enforcement agencies would determine the veracity of the content.

Minister of State for Electronics and IT Rajeev Chandrasekhar said in a written reply to the Lok Sabha: "The issue of labelling of user tweets as manipulated media does not come under the purview of the above said Rules. Further, on the issue of manipulated media, Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology has pointed out to Twitter that they are violating the principle of natural justice and urged Twitter to be transparent and equitable in applying the criteria."

'EC proposal to link electoral roll with Aadhaar under study'

To avoid multiple enrolment of same person: Kiren Rijiju

The proposal of the Election Commission of India to link the electoral roll with the Aadhaar ecosystem in order to check multiple enrolment of the same person is under consideration of the government, Law Minister Kiren Rijiju informed the Lok Sabha on Wednesday.

Responding to a question on electoral reforms, the Law Minister, in a written reply, said the Law Commission in its 244th and 255th reports had extensively dealt with the subject.

"The Election Commission of India has proposed to

link the electoral roll with the Aadhaar ecosystem with a view to curbing the menace of multiple enrolment of the same person at difference places. The matter is under consideration of the government," he said to a specific question.

The Minister also answered separate questions on the pendency of cases and the advice given to government departments that are engaged in a number of litigations.

Talking about pendency of cases, the Minister said according to the information available on National Judicial Data Grid (NJDG), over 3.93 crore cases were pending in the lower and subordinate courts as of July 30 this year.

"No time frame has been prescribed for disposal of various kinds of cases by the respective courts," he said.

NGOs, trusts, memorials owe ₹1.4 crore for office space: Puri

Suspended TMC MPs try to enter RS

Security officer hurt in scuffle

A Parliamentary security officer suffered minor injuries on Wednesday in a scuffle with suspended Trinamool Congress members who tried to enter the Rajya Sabha chamber after the House

Our suspension was over once the House was adjourned for the day. Why were we stopped? Democracy hits new low #Parliament," TMC MP Dola Sen tweeted.

2 years on as U.T., Kashmir militancy yet to wane

Fears grow that a Taliban comeback in Afghanistan may raise ability to strike

PEERZADA ASHIQ

As Jammu and Kashmir completes two years as a Union Territory, militancy remains a major challenge to the security apparatus amid growing fears that the Taliban takeover of Afghanistan is likely to increase the striking capabilities of militant outfits, especially the Jaish-e-Muhammad (JeM) and the Harkat-ul-Mujahideen

Official data accessed by The Hindu suggested that J&K saw 82 militant recruitments in the first seven months, with the JeM's focus growing on capital Srinagar, where it managed local recruits around three or four. Earlier, the JeM would focus on the Pulwama-Awantipora-Tral belt in south Kashmir. In 2020, 163 locals were recruited into the militant ranks.

"JeM's strength in J&K is 44, including 10 locals and 34 foreigners. We managed to kill seven JeM terrorists so far, including two foreigners and five locals. JeM No.1 and No. 2 were killed recently," Inspector General of Police (IGP) Vijay Kumar told The Hindu.

Though more than 60% recruits hail from districts in south Kashmir, there is growing recruitment in Srinagar, where the frequency of militant attacks saw a major spur this year, and in north Kashmir as well.

In a sustained pressure

maintained by the security agencies by launching multiple anti-militancy operations every day, at least 89 militants were killed so far, including the top brass of most of the militant outfits operating in the Valley.

In July, 31 militants were

killed in 15 encounters.

However, a fresh list of 10 local militants released by the police again highlighted that local militants continue to command and control outfits such as the Hizb-ul-Mujahideen, the Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) and the The Resistance Front (TRF) in the Valley.

The wanted list included Hizb chief Farooq Nali, LeT chief Riyaz Ahmad Dar and TRF chief Abbas Sheikh.

According to the police record, Sheikh, a resident of Rampora Qaimoh in Kulgam, is the 'operational chief commander' of the TRF and is involved in more than 30 FIRs. "Sheikh is a recycled terrorist," a police report said. A

recycled militant is one who is arrested for his activities and jailed, but rejoins the militant ranks after his

Meanwhile, multiple security agencies are working on an on-ground assessment of the likely fallout of the Taliban takeover of Afghanistan. A police officer suggested fears were growing within the security apparatus over the JeM and the HuM augmenting their striking capabilities.

"Both the outfits are known for attacks in Kashmir. They have their cadres fighting along with Taliban. If the Taliban takes over Kabul, the fallout is likely to grow starker," he added.

Supreme Court to hear pleas on Pegasus today

Journalists seek independent probe

A Supreme Court Bench led by Chief Justice of India N.V. Ramana is scheduled to hear on August 5 a petition filed by senior journalists N. Ram and Sashi Kumar for an independent probe headed by a former or sitting top court judge into the mass surveillance of over 142 potential "targets", including journalists, lawyers, Ministers, Opposition politicians, constitutional functionaries and civil society activists, using military-grade Israeli spyware Pegasus.

Court The Supreme would also hear separate petitions filed by Rajya Sabha member John Brittas and Supreme Court advocate M.L. Sharma on the same issue, which has seen more petitions being filed, including one by the Editors Guild of India for an independent investigation into the Pegasus allegations and another by five journalists who were targets of surveillance.

Mr. Ram and Mr. Kumar, in their petition, have said mass surveillance using a military-grade abridges several fundamental rights and appears to represent an attempt to infiltrate, attack and destabilise independent institutions that act as critical pillars of our democratic set-up. They have sought a full

disclosure from the government on whether it has authorised the snooping, which seems be an attempt to muzzle free speech and to chill dissent. The government, the petition said, had still not given a straight answer to whether the illegal hack was done with its blessings. The journalists have contended that spying has caused serious dents on the rights to free speech and privacy. It has no legal basis. In fact, the legal regime for surveillance under Section 5(2) of the Telegraph Act seems to have been completely bypassed, and civilians have become targets.

Tarigami said, "Unconscionable suppression of civil and democratic rights continues unabated, indiscriminate arrests and harassment of all sections of our people, including employees on different pretexts continues. An 'adverse police report' cannot be a substitute for being found guilty in a court of law. This amounts to violation of the most sacred principles of the justice system".

Mr. Tarigami said the BJP's 'Naya Kashmir' slogan "is a joke now". "By demolishing the Constitution of I&K, it had crossed all the limits of constitutionality.

The report said, "Most of the rights violations, includ-

ing arbitrary detentions, prohibition on Assembly, remain valid still. Close to 1,000 people are still in prison, including minors and elected legislators. The J&K administration added a new vigilantism against government employees, whose social media content is now subject to police scrutiny for 'anti-national activities', potentially leading to dismissal. Eighteen government employees have already

been dismissed". The report was released a day ahead of J&K completing two years as a Union Territory. The report suggested that the June 24 meeting between J&K leaders and Prime Minister Narendra Modi "raised hopes".

Assam CM's 'expansionist' tendencies cause of clashes: MP

The State is illegally occupying more than 509 sq miles of Mizo territory, says K. Vanlalvena

Assam is illegally occupying more than 509 sq. miles of the Mizo territory, Mizo National Front (MNF) Rajya Sabha member K. Vanlalvena said in an interview with The Hindu. He blamed Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma's "expansionist" tendencies for the recent flare-up between Mizoram

and Assam. On July 26, an exchange of fire between the police forces of both the States left six Assam policemen and a civilian dead, and 60 injured. Assam claimed that the firing was one-sided and unprovoked, while Mizoram said they had retaliated to the aggression by the Assam police.

Vanlalvena was booked by the Assam police for his public comments on the clashes, where he said the Mizoram police should have "killed them all". The case has been withdrawn now as the two sides are trying to work out a peace deal.

The MNF government in Mizoram is backed by the BJP. When asked if the BJP was responsible for this recent flare-up, Mr. Vanlalvena said, "I cannot pin the blame on any one party. I think we have reached this situation because of the uncontrolled influx of the Bangladeshis. The population of 'infiltrators' is now 60% in Assam".

The July 26 clashes, Mr. Vanlalvena said, had been in the making for the last several months. He said the Assam police made several "incursions" into the Mizo Territory. In total, he said, 509 sq.

miles of Mizo area had been captured by Assam. "This is part of the expansion policy of the newly elected Assam CM. During the recent campaign for Assembly election, he had promised to provide land to rehabilitate the Bangladeshi immigrants. And since he cannot accommodate them in his State, he wants to expand further into our territory," he said.



the scheme's suspension, SCF report on the Statistics Ministry's demands for grants pointed out that many MPLADS projects that began earlier were "left unfinished midway despite the sanction letters being issued and funds for the same were withheld", citing the suspension of the scheme. The pa-

nel had sought the release of funds for these projects so that MPs could fulfil their promises to the public.

Condition attached

The very same day, the Department of Expenditure (DoE) conveyed its intent to allot ₹2,200 crore for such projects to the Statistics Ministry. However, the actual allotment of funds by the Department of Economic Affairs (DEA) took place on March 22, with the condition that the funds must be spent or allotted further for eligible projects "within financial year 2020-21 itself, so that the amount is not lapsed".

The Statistics Ministry said it cleared eligible proposals received till March 31 noon, amounting to ₹1,107.5 crore, leading to a balance ₹1,092.5 crore lapsing.

In a fresh report tabled in

Parliament on Tuesday, the SCF headed by BJP MP Jayant Sinha sharply criticised this

"ad-hocism" and noted: "The Committee are unable to comprehend the reason as to why ₹2,200 crore were allotted to MoSPI barely one week before the end of FY 2020-21... This constitutes a serious lapse in fiscal management with negative consequences for communities across India."

"Only those proposals which were not found eligible due to lack of documents and non-fulfilment of eligibility criteria as per MPLADS guidelines, and in those districts where the model code of conduct was under implementation due to Assembly elections in five States/UT and by-elections in some constituencies, the Ministry was not able to release pending instalments," MoSPI informed the committee.

The Statistics Ministry said it wrote to the Finance Ministry on April 7 to allot the remaining funds towards MPLADS this year so that the pending instalments as on March 31, 2020 may be released.

'Tighten norms'

The Finance Ministry also asked the Statistics Ministry to further tighten the scheme's guidelines by September this year, so that "if a work sanctioned by an MP is not used for five years, it will automatically lapse even if there is a committed liability for the work to be complet-

Currently, funds released to district authorities under MPLADS is not lapsable, while funds not released by the government in a particular year are carried forward.

4 with links to IS-inspired module held

The National Investigation Agency (NIA) on Wednesday arrested four persons allegedly associated with an Islamic State-inspired module, following searches in Karnataka and Jammu & Kashmir in coordination with Central intelligence agencies and local police.

The accused have been identified as Obaid Hamid, a resident of Srinagar; Muzammil Hassan Bhat, a resident of Bandipora; Ammar Abdul Rahman from Mangaluru; and Shankar Venkatesh Perumal alias Ali Muaviya, a resident Bengaluru. They were involved in raising funds, radicalising and motivating others to join the Islamic State, the agency said.

During the searches earlier, the four accused were detained along with a woman from Mangaluru. It was alleged that she had attempted to travel to Afghanistan.

The module was unearthed about a year ago when the intelligence agencies came across an Instagram channel named "Chronicle Foundation", comprising more than 5,000 persons from different parts of the world, which had allegedly been indulging in Islamic Staterelated propaganda. The agencies gradually established the identities of several members of the module. As it turned out, some associated members were planning to visit Syria, Iraq and Afghanistan, while some had even made unsuccessful attempts to travel to Afghanistan via Iran in April 2019.

The alleged leader of the module, identified as Mohammed Ameen, intended to travel to Pakistan and J&K to join terror groups. Some suspects were also involved in raising funds and even transferring a portion to entities operating in J&K.

PM calls Mamata on flood situation

CM says heavy release from DVC dams lead to 'man-made' floods year after year

Hours after the conversation, Ms. Banerjee wrote to Mr. Modi urging "for a holistic and long-term solution" to ensure that West Bengal was "spared the regular devastation and suffering from man-made floods perpetrated by huge release from the DVC [Damodar Valley Corpo-

He said 1,950 persons were still stranded in flood-hit areas and efforts were on to rescue them. PTI

'No active surveillance to detect cases in Kerala'

Stringent norms needed, says Minister

Coming down heavily on Kerala, which has seen a spike in COVID-19 cases recently, Health Minister Mansukh Mandaviya has written to Chief Minister Pinaravi Vijayan on Wednesday, stating that the COVID-19 case detection in several parts of the State was mainly through testing of those reporting to health facilities with COVID-19-like illness coupled with no active surveillance to detect cases.

Kerala is presently reporting more than 20,000 cases per day.

In his letter, the Minister said in view of the continued upsurge of COVID-19 cases in Kerala, a Central multi-disciplinary team was deputed to the State on July 30, and the team in its report submitted to the Ministry noted lapses in the manner in which the virus was

being tackled in the State. The Minister's communi-

cation said the team found a continued high number of COVID-19 cases being reported from almost all districts of the State, and highlighted that stringent containment were needed "The ongoing ABCD clas-

sification made in the State has not yielded desired results, and technical guidance from the Central government on defining containment zones and active case search within such zones is crucial for controlling high case positivity," he said. He added that any restric-

tions once imposed may be for a period of epidemiological significance, that is, at least 14 days, and may be effectively monitored.

"The number of contacts traced per positive case is also quite low," the Health Ministry said.

Cabinet approves Samagra Shiksha scheme extension till March 2026

The Centre plans to pay students their Right to Education (RTE) entitlements in the form of cash transfers as part of a revamp and extension of its flagship school education scheme that was approved by the Cabinet on Wednesday.

The Samagra Shiksha scheme, which has been extended till March 2026, will have a financial outlay of ₹2.94 lakh crore, including a

Central share of ₹1.85 lakh crore, and several new initiatives on early childhood education, foundational literacy, and numeracy and language education.

Higher Central share

Samagra Shiksha is an integrated scheme for 11.6 lakh government and aided schools with over 15 crore students and 57 lakh teachers. It involves a 60:40 split in funding between the Centre and most States.

The Centre's share now works out to about ₹37,080 crore per year, higher than the amounts allocated over the last three years.

"In order to enhance the

direct outreach of the scheme, all child-centric interventions will be provided directly to the students through DBT [or direct benefit transfer] mode on an IT- based platform over a period of time," said an official statement issued after the Cabinet meeting.

This DBT would include RTE entitlements such as textbooks, uniforms and transport allowance, Education Ministry officials told *The Hindu*, although it is not clear whether the tuition fees for students in the economically weaker section quota in private schools would also be paid directly to students as a cash transfer. The stipend for children with special needs will be paid in this mode, officials

The Border Roads Organisation (BRO) has constructed and completed blacktopping the world's highest motorable road at Umling La in Eastern Ladakh, located at an altitude of 19,300 ft, the Defence Ministry said on Wednesday.

The BRO has created a record in high-altitude road construction, the Ministry said. "It has constructed a 52-km long tarmac road through Umling La..."

The strategic road built under 'Project Himank' passes through the Umling La Top and connects Chisumle and Demchok villages. The road is close to the Line of Actual Control (LAC) and will allow quick movement of troops and equipment.

A Defence official said the road construction had a number of phases and the project had been under way since 2017. The top blacktopping had been done four days ago, the official said.



otal Gaming's YouTube channel puts a 33-second countdown for Garena Free Fire (a Battle Royale multiplayer shooter game) live session. On the live chatbox, more than a hundred messages cascade within this half a minute.

Channel owner Ajay (known as Ajjubhai in the gaming world), welcomes his fast-increasing audience, reads out the sponsor's name and gets down to business. In the four-hour-25-minute livestream, he makes silly jokes, replies to a few messages, gives shout-outs for Super Chat (a feature wherein viewers pay to highlight their message in the chatbox) and sings, as his characters roam, shoot, jump and dive. The stream, within two days, gets two million views on YouTube.

Ajjubhai is a superstar streamer. He started in October 2018, with just four people watching his videos.

Today, the Total Gaming channel has over 26 million subscribers and its videos have been watched over four billion times. Ajjubhai, who featured in You-Tube's list of top live streamers





Super Chats and Super Stickers, and sponsorship or brand deals. It is significantly more than what Hari Raman, a young doctor

from Purushanur, a hamlet in Tamil Nadu's Villupuram district, earns through his job at Villupuram Medical College. Hari's YouTube channel, PVS

Gaming, has close to two million subscribers. He started the channel in 2018 while pursuing an MBBS course at a college in North India. "Because I couldn't speak Hindi very well, I didn't have a lot of friends at college. Streaming games in Tamil got me a lot of people to interact with online," he says. His subscribers grew exponentially and the channel helped him meet his educational expenses, which had been a challenge.

Hari had to overcome odds to be a doctor. He recalls how his village would treat his humble roots with derision - "Why does a coolie's son want to be a doctor?", some would ask. He fulfilled his dream early this year, finishing MBBS. But gaming, he says, has

Hari can afford to give up his profession. But he won't, because it is also his passion. Now, he dispenses medical advice during his streaming sessions. 'There was a lot of hesitancy about taking the vaccine this year. I used to dispel the myths and misinformation," he says.

While YouTube still continues to be the most successful platform for game streaming in India, independent platforms such as Twitch, Rooter and Loco have seen ballooning audiences. These platforms serve as alternative sources of revenue for gamers, some of whom enter a contract with them for streaming.

Imagine a pyramid with top, middle and bottom sections, each representing the three categories of gamers: star players with their own clout, upand-coming gamers with significant following, and novices.

Platforms such as Rooter, which has over 7.5 million active users of which 3.8 million come from their app, primarily target the bottom and middle parts that

consist of a sizeable proportion of gamers. "YouTube is not going to support middle players because their algorithm throws them out of the system. These are gamers with potential to go big; we are giving equal opportunity irrespective of size," says Piyush Kumar, CEO, Rooter.

Selling their personality

Live streaming sessions can go up to four or five hours. There are no time restrictions for streaming on Rooter, says Kumar. In fact, when Kumar got on a call with us, a streaming had been on-going on for seven hours and still had over 1,200 followers.

Rooter, especially, has been actively building its brand by signing contracts with star gamers like Gyan Gaming, who has 11 million subscribers on YouTube, and PVS Gaming, with the biggest subscriber base in South India.

How do they hold their audience's attention for so long?

"It is, in a sense, a performance," says Kaashvi Hiranandani, who owns YouTube channel Kaash Plays. She has the energy of

a radio jockey in her streams. "In real life, I am a bit reserved. If a person I am close to offline watches my stream, they will be shocked," she says, but reckons this change in personality is necessary: "People are investing two or three hours of their time in what I am doing. It is like a TV show for them. So, I try to be as entertaining as possible."

In a way, these streamers sell a personality - and, it needn't always be theirs.

Ajjubhai, for instance, does it without even revealing his face. "When a fellow YouTuber gamer revealed his face after a while, people turned up at his house, and college. Fans even called his parents. I get very uncomfortable with such attention," he says.

The regional connect

Language seems to be an important determiner in gaining followers. Hari reckons audiences prefer regional languages over English. All the Indian streamers featured in YouTube's list of top live streamers for 2020 speak Hindi in their videos. Kaashvi, who grew up in Singapore, used to stream in English initially. But, upon her audience's request, she polished her Hindi, which significantly increased her subscribers.

There are also streamers who use abusive language to draw followers, most of whom are adolescents. Scrutiny on such streamers increased in Tamil Nadu after the recent arrest of Madan Kumar Manikkam (known as Madan OP), after complaints about him hosting obscene conversations with minors and women.

This incident, Hari says, got a bad rap for streamers in Tamil Nadu. "Even my parents asked me to reconsider gaming," he adds, "But streamers like this are in the minority."

However, abuse cannot be prevented, especially when it comes from the audience. Kaashvi, as a female streamer, understands this better, explaining, "If I get 100 good comments, there will be 10 bad ones. And, some of them get really nasty. People know how to pick on one's insecurities. I am fairly new to streaming, so it does bring me down."

Despite the challenges, she continues to stream because it is as lucrative as it is fun.

Kaashvi works in finance, drawing "a mid-seven-figure salary" a year. But, she once made as much money in a month through streaming. She concludes, "It's probably a dream job."

Women of the uprising

Rudrangshu Mukherjee's A Begum & A Rani digs out lesser-known accounts of two prominent women in India's colonial history — Rani Lakshmibai and Begum Hazrat Mahal

A few years after her heroic death, folk memory – in the form of songs and poems - waxed eloquent of Rani Lakshmibai's valour in the battlefield. At the same time, stories of her alleged "intemperance" spread far and wide, with the British calling her sexually promiscuous, a liquor addict with a violent temper. In sharp contrast to this stands Begum Hazrat Mahal's absence in public memory or recollection.

These are two women who never met each other, but led similar lives, with a common goal: to overthrow British rule in India. While one has been hailed a nationalist icon, the other remains shadowed in forgotten accounts. Right from their eventual rise during a pivotal moment of India's colonial history – the Revolt of 1857 – to their heroic yet poignant deaths, author Rudrangshu Mukherjee's latest non-fiction work, A Begum & A Rani – Hazrat Mahal and Lakshmibai in 1857, (published by Penguin), captures what makes

them feminist icons. Mukherjee has been researching the 1857 uprising for nearly 45 years and this is his sixth book on the subject. His area of research was largely on Awadh and Kanpur, but this time, he decided to shift his focus to

"I noticed the contrast - Lakshmibai was treated as a nationalist icon, whereas Hazrat Mahal, also a woman leader of the rebellion in Awadh, was relatively a forgotten fi-

gure," says Mukherjee of the inception of the book

The seed had been in his mind for at least five to six years. "It was when I became housebound, with all this archival work here with me, that I decided to give it a structure," he recalls, adding that he started writing in February 2020.

Through the narrative, he examines this anomaly and at the same time highlights the achievements of these two remarkable women, who fought tooth-and-nail not only against the British, but also the oppressive, patriarchal norms that

plagued mid-19th century India. Chronologically, their stories run parallel but the trajectories are different, says Mukherjee. The first



contrast that struck him was that Lakshmibai was a late entrant in the uprising of 1857.

"She didn't turn a rebel till January or February of 1858. But Hazrat Mahal was a rebel since the uprising was taking place in Lucknow, end of May/early June 1857. The second contrast that is equally intriguing is that Lakshmibai died on the battlefield, fighting. Meanwhile, there is no sighting of Hazrat Mahal even though we know that she was sending directions as a general. Unlike Lakshmibai, she fled to Nepal where she died in penury and obscurity," says Mukherjee.

He asks questions on whether the manner in which both died has anything to do with their differing popularity. "The other suggestion I make is that one was an upper-caste queen, from a royal family whereas Hazrat Mahal was a slave's daughter who caught the fancy of the king of Awadh. She becomes somebody only when her 12-year-old son is put on the throne by the rebels." The different social standing, Mukherjee believes, had an impact on the way people saw these women.

Largely pinned on years of archival research, the narrative of *A* Begum & A Rani takes on a different hue towards the end, as Mukherjee meditates on their afterlives by analysing public memory.

"I see history as an exercise in retrieval of the aspects of the past. The more aspects we retrieve, the richer our understanding of history becomes," he concludes.

Naturalist, frog enthusiast and Kerala Tourism guide Hadlee Renjith, who leads herping tours in Munnar, constructed two ponds at Windermere Estate to restore the habitat for the Anaimalai flying frog. He struck upon the idea on one of his photography tours at the 60acre property, when he caught a glimpse of the frog in a cement tank previously used for irrigation.

Hadlee sought support from the Wildlife Trust of India (WTI), which took it up as its first rapid action pro-

The first season written and directed by John Carney featured a bunch of A-listers including Anne Hathaway, Tina Fey, Andy García, Dev Patel and John Slattery. Season 2, which streams from August 13, has its share of stars from Tom Burke and Minnie Driver to Kit Harington and Tobias Menzies.

The right choice

"It feels like you will find the right actor for the right job in this show," Carney, who reprises his writer-director duties for Season 2, says over a video call. "It is half an hour of their time. If the actress is free, she comes and plays for a week and a half. While it is not a huge amount of money or prestige, they feel like 'I connected with that script and got to make these cool episodes'. There is no more commitment and that is attractive to some actors in certain phases of their

careers.' Carney enjoys the show's half-hour format. "I find that challenging. I am getting a little tired of TV going on and on with long shows that require you to watch everything in order. You can dip in to Modern Love at any stage in the series."

Modern Love is a weekly column, which started in 2004. It is also a book, a podcast and a show. Picking articles that

would work as television from 17 years of content is a mammoth ask. "There are two kinds of criteria that I look for. The first is a personal connection with the piece. That can be a dimension of a character, a relationship or a friendship that hits me," says Carney.

He adds, "The second is when I am struck by something about a particular essay as a filmmaker. I could imagine things in a scene playing well. Or I could imagine, directing five things that would be fun, challenging and interesting. I don't usually go 'Oh I love that essay so therefore I love that piece of TV'. That is not the way it works. We have actually found that often the best essays should remain written. I have struggled often to shoehorn an essay that I love into a half-an-hour screenplay that has not worked."

About time

Though the show is called Modern Love, Carney says, love is timeless. "Obviously the circumstances in which we find ourselves, with cell

phones, iPads and computers affect our expectations of love. At the end of the day, what we looked for in these stories is less about being super-current and more about being

About 110 million years ago, the Irritator moved through the coastal lagoons of Brazil. We do not know exactly how it annoyed palaeontologists to earn that name, but what we do know is that it has earned itself a place in a coastal town again - that of Mamallapuram.


The Irritator, with the short-handed T Rex, the toothy Velociraptor and other giant reptiles are the denizens of Dinosaur Museum, the latest addition to India Seashell Museum on ECR. The park, opened last month, features 14 mechanical models fitted with sensors that prompt them to swish their tails, raise

their necks, and roar every time a visitor moves past them.

"Families want entertainment. We added the Dinosaur Museum for children so that they don't get bored as their parents stroll through the seashell museum," says Mohamed Riswan, proprietor of the India Seashell Museum.

The Dinosaur Museum isn't the only addition - over the years, the seashell museum has expanded to accommodate a pearl museum, set up in 2018, and a mineral museum, which was set up last year but owing to the pandemic, could only open this year, after the lockdowns were

wan. But the idea of a mineral museum struck Raja only after a visit to Singapore. "When my father saw the Merlion, he wanted to recreate it with seashells," says Riswan.

A tunnel-like room leads us to the mineral collection – behind glass panels are onyx, amethyst, quartz, moonstones, topaz, jasper and jade,

And so, a giant Merlion, made

all polished and shaped into orbs. From here, our guide, Syed Salim, takes us to the pearl museum, rattling chant from Rameswaram who set up off at full speed the names of oysters that hold pearls inside them. "The colour of the pearl depends on the colour of the lips of the oyster," he says, before explaining how pearls are formed. "When a foreign body enters a mollusc's mantle, it forms a sac around it. Layers and layers of secretion around it creates a pearl." Which is why pearls are not always in the circular shape we know them to be, but appear as coins, claws, nuggets, peanuts, crescents - including one particularly unfortunate fish that has been encrusted into a pearl.

Riswan shares how his father collected these pearls and shells. "My father grew up in Rameshwaram, in a coastal hamlet. He started as a fish merchant at the age of 19. He would walk across the seashore, collect shells and sell them in markets. Once he started earning money as a fish merchant through exports, he used that money to invest in his hobby of collecting shells."

Seashell museums are popular world over, however environmentalists have concerns over their mass collection. "Seashells feed the beaches - they have a function in the ecosystem, so their hardcore collection from one strip would be invasive," points out naturalist M Yuvan.

"Collection shouldn't be for collection's sake, but to facilitate a deeper understanding about what lives on the beach."

The Taliban on Wednesday claimed responsibility for a huge bomb attack in Kabul targeting the Defence Minister, as the insurgents fought for control of a string of besieged cities across the country.

India is keen to resolve the indemnity issue, says official

The U.S. has shipped more than 110 million doses of CO-VID-19 vaccines to middleand-low-income countries. President Joe Biden announced on Tuesday. This exceeds a commitment to donate at least 80 million doses of mostly AstraZeneca vaccine globally.

India did not appear on an official list of countries that had received U.S. vaccines, a consequence of unresolved liability issues between the government of India and vaccine manufacturers.

An Indian official involved in the vaccine negotiations told The Hindu that the government is keen to resolve the indemnity issue for both donations as well as commercial orders for the three U.S. vaccine manufacturers (Pfizer, Moderna and Johnson &Johnson), and all vaccine shipments from the U.S.

are held up for now. In an interview to NDTV, the government's vaccine panel chief, N.K. Arora, suggested that India could reconsider its position on sovereign indemnity for U.S. vaccines if a larger number of doses, between "100 and 200 million doses" were offered, but that India is going ahead with its vaccine plans to inoculate all eligible adults with COVID-19 vaccines without factoring in vaccines imported from the

Thus far, India has only given approval to pharma company Cipla on Tuesday to import the Moderna mRNA vaccine. In early July, a shipment of 7.5 million doses of Moderna vaccines

were bound for India. This shipment, a part of the donations from international vaccine distribution facility COVAX, were held back at the last minute, as neither the government nor Cipla was willing to sign the liability waiver, according to the official who spoke to The Hindu.

Pfizer is yet to apply for approval in India. During his remarks on Tuesday, Mr. Biden said the U.S. would begin shipping by the end of this month some of the 500 million doses of Pfizer-BioN-Tech vaccines that it had committed to foreign countries. The U.S. was also expanding manufacturing at home and abroad, including in India, according to Mr. Biden.

"We have committed to over a half a billion doses. And we're trying to provide for more and provide for the capacity of countries like India to be able to produce the vaccine themselves. And we're helping them do that. That's what we're doing now," he said.

India and the U.S., along with their Quad partners Japan and Australia, plan to supply at least 1 billion doses of the Johnson & Johnson (J&J) vaccine across Asia by the end of 2022. These will be produced in India by the Hyderabad-based Biological

But the road ahead is far

Far from clear

from clear. After the press reported earlier this week that J&J had withdrawn an application for accelerated approval of its Janssen CO-VID-19 vaccine in India, the company said it remained in talks with the Indian government on "how best to accelerate our ability to deliver our COVID-19 vaccine to India". In Parliament last week, Minister of State for Health Bharti Pravin Pawar said the government-instituted vaccine panel was in "continuous dialogue with Pfizer, Moderna and Johnson & Johnson to discuss and address various issues including the issue of indemnity".

Most of the 111,701,000 doses donated by the U.S. so far have been distributed via COVAX. Indonesia has received the largest share (8 million doses) according to a 'factsheet' released by the White House on Tuesday. Several South Asian countries were on the list: Afghanistan (3.3 million doses), Bhutan (500,000 doses), Nepal (1.5 million doses), Sri Lanka (1.5 million doses), Pakistan and Bangla-



State Bank of India (SBI) on Wednesday said first-quarter standalone net profit rose 55.3% to ₹6,504 crore due to lower loan loss provisioning and sizeable recovery from a bad loan account. This was its highest quarterly net profit, the lender said in a filing.

Profit was lifted by the recovery of ₹1,692 crore from the Kingfisher Airlines loan account during the quarter. Loan loss provisions slid 46.6% to ₹5,030 crore.

Net interest income rose 3.74% to ₹27,638 crore while domestic net interest margin fell 9 basis points to 3.15%. Provision Coverage Ratio declined 39 bps to 85.9%

Service sector contracts for a third straight month: PMI

'Offsets manufacturing rally; overall, jobs dip for 17th month'

India's service sector contracted for the third straight month in July, with job losses extending to an eighth successive month, as per IHS Markit's Purchasing Managers' Index. The PMI stood at 45.4, marginally better than the 41.2 recorded in June.

A score above 50 indicates an expansion. For the first time in a year, services firms were pessimistic about the outlook for the 12-month period on worries about the COVID-19 pandemic, inflation and profit margins.

Consumer services was the worst-affected during July, indicating that the unlocking across States had failed to lift confidence in the resumption of contactThe performance further impacted private sector sales, output, employment

sensitive activity, while transport and storage was the only subsector to see higher sales in the past month.

"In line with sustained falls in new work, there was a further reduction in service sector jobs during July," IHS Markit said in its Services PMI statement for India. "Employment contracted for the eighth consecutive month, albeit at a moderate pace that was slower than that seen in June," it added.

The service sector's performance in July is in contrast to the manufacturing

sector which logged its highest PMI in three months and saw a pause in job losses for the first time since the pandemic's onset last March.

"The subdued performance of services more than offset a rebound across manufacturing, causing further contractions in private sector sales, output and employment," said Pollyanna De Lima, economics associate director at IHS Markit.

India's overall output, manufacturing and services combined, thus contracted for the third month in a row as the Composite PMI Output Index was 49.2 in July. June's reading was 43.1.

"Private sector employment decreased for the seventeenth month in a row in July," IHS Markit added.

'Agri tractor market to sustain growth'

Wheels India said it expected the commercial vehicle (CV) segment to recover during the second half of the year, albeit on a low base.

Addressing the company's 62nd AGM, chairman S. Ram said the CV segment remained muted currently and was expected to post some recovery during the second half. Similarly, the passenger

vehicle market is expected to show reasonable growth this year, he added. Mr. Ram also said he expected the agri-tractor market to sustain the growth momentum this year along with the construction equipment market. "The increasing adoption of aluminium wheels

on passenger vehicles will limit the growth of steel passenger car wheels," he said.

"We have started production of cast aluminium wheels at our new plant in Thervoy Kandigai Chennai and started exporting these to the U.S. Also, we see a strong demand for forged aluminium wheels in export markets," he added.

'U.S. services sector grows at record rate

A measure of U.S. services industry activity jumped to a record high in July, boosted by the shift in spending to services from goods, but businesses continued to face rising prices because supply-chain constraints.

The Institute for Supply Management said its nonmanufacturing activity index raced to 64.1 in July, the highest in the series' history, from 60.1 in June.

Demand is rotating back to services as nearly half of the population has been fully vaccinated against COVID-19, allowing people to travel and attend sporting events among servicesrelated activities that were curbed early in the pandemic in favour of goods.

Bumrah strikes form, England shot out for 183

Scalps four while Shami takes three; Root hits half-century but receives no support; Ashwin omitted

India's Jasprit Bumrah took four wickets as England suffered a batting collapse and slumped to 183 all out on the opening day of the first Test at Trent Bridge Wednesday.

Kohli's men denied England a breakthrough and were 21 for no loss at stumps, with both Rohit Sharma and K.L. Rahul – only drafted in after Mayank Agwaral suffered a suspected concussion while batting in the nets on Monday - unbeaten on nine.

Bumrah, who struck with the fifth ball of the match to remove Rory Burns for one of four ducks in the innings, took four for 46 in 20.4 overs. Fellow paceman Mohammed Shami also impressed, finishing with three for 28 in 17 overs.

England captain Joe Root, who opted to bat, top-scored with 64 and was the only batsman to pass 30, with Jonny Bairstow making 29 on his Test return.

The slump

Bairstow's exit at the stroke of tea sparked a slump that saw England, which had been 138 for three, lose six wickets for 22 runs against an attack without Ishant Sharma and off-spinner R. Ashwin, both dropped.

Shardul Thakur, who took the prize wicket of Root, in a return of two of 41, said: "Bairstow was going well. He was poised to score a fifty, so getting him and Root was

"Root is one of the top players in the world. Whether you get him out in the 60s or early in his innings, it is al-



ways a good wicket to have," added Shardul.

Remarkably, this was the first red-ball innings this season for Bairstow and Jos Buttler, who was out for nought.

"There's a lot of white-ball cricket in the middle of summer, that's always a challenge," said England batting coach Marcus Trescothick. "We'd like a bit more red-ball

In June, England suffered a humiliating eight-wicket loss to New Zealand at Edgbaston that condemned it to a first home series loss in seven years, prompting former captain Alastair Cook to say the current top order "can't handle" the pressure of Test cricket. Most of the England

batsmen struggled again on Wednesday.

Root's decision to bat first after winning the toss on a green-tinged pitch that promised to aid India's four-man pace attack was a bold decision given England's wellknown batting frailties.

It took India just five balls to reduce England to zero for one, with left-hander Burns lbw on review to a Bumrah delivery that cut back.

No. 3 batsman Zak Crawley came to the crease having made just 123 runs in 12 Test innings after a brilliant 267 against Pakistan at Southampton last year.

Crawley scored 27 before he was caught behind after what seemed a speculative review by the tourists revealed a faint nick off Mohammed Siraj – much to the relief of the Indian skipper. Opening batsman Dom Si-

bley, whose 18 took 70 balls, then chipped Shami straight to Rahul at short mid-wicket. Root and Bairstow, howev-

er, kept India at bay. However, their fourth-wicket stand of 72 ended off the final delivery before tea when the latter was struck in front.

Falling cheaply

England's 138 for four at the interval soon became 138 for five when Dan Lawrence was caught behind down the legside off Shami for nought before Buttler, who looked desperately out of touch, nicked Bumrah to Pant for a 17-ball

When he reached 23, Root surpassed Cook's England record of 15,737 runs in all formats.

Shardul gets Root

His fifty took 89 balls before he was trapped in front by Shardul for 64. The England skipper did not bother to re-

view the decision. England's tail, apart from Sam Curran's unbeaten 27, struggled and it was all over when Bumrah castled James Anderson.

Special feeling

"I am grateful to each and every team member who made me realise the dream of another Olympic medal. No doubt, the target was gold.

"But, getting a bronze is also a special feeling for me given the backdrop of how the pandemic disrupted the whole world, especially our tournaments schedule," Sindhu told the media at her residence on Wednesday.

"I must thank my coach [Park Tae-Sang, who was with her at the briefing] for the kind of sacrifices he has made by missing his family for almost a year since he

joined me," she said.

"It is a dream come true for all of us, including the sparring partners from Suchitra Academy, the two gentlemen Praveen Raju and Pradeep Raju from that Academy, fitness trainer Srikanth Verma and physio Evangeline," Sindhu said.

"Well, when my fitness trainer says that I could withstand the training load without any complaints, I must remind myself that unless we put in that kind of effort we cannot be in this position [with a second medal in as many Games 1.

"This is just the beginning and there are many more laurels to come in the run-up to the Paris Olympics," she

Planning and effort

"It has been a really tough year in the run-up to the Olympics. And, this bronze medal would not have been possible but for so much planning and effort," she

"Well, if I keep playing

well and winning tournaments, then the World No.1 can also be a certainty. The preparations for the 2024 Paris Olympics will begin after a short break as the ultimate goal is to win gold there," a smiling Sindhu

"I will continue to train at the Gachibowli Indoor Stadi-

um," she added. Korean coach Park said Sindhu's bronze was the most unforgettable moment

of his life. "This being my first Olympic medal as a coach, I cherish every bit of it. Come on, Sindhu let us start training from tomorrow to get the gold in Paris," he said with a big smile.

The pandemic proved to be very tough for athletes too. We were patient right through and really worked hard," Park said.

Sindhu's fitness trainer at Suchitra Academy, Srikanth said the training programme for the shuttler was torturous and any other athlete would have given up.


However, Dahiya closed the gap to 5-9 and showed his class to pin down the Kazakh spectacularly to reach the final.

He outwitted Vangelov in an action-packed second period to wrap up the contest with 16 seconds left on the clock.

Worlds silver medallist Deepak Punia won two bouts

before losing to former World champion David Taylor of the USA 10-0 in the 86kg semifinals.

He will face either Ali Sha-

banau or Myles Amine in the bronze medal contest.

Anshu Malik (women's 57kg), who went down fighting to double Worlds medallist Iryna Kurachkina 8-2 in the first round, had a reason to celebrate her birthday on Thursday as she made it to the repechage round following the Belarusian's progress to the final.

Anshu will meet Rio Olvmpics silver medallist Russian Valeria Koblova in her first repechage match.

Surmeneli outclasses and outpunches Indian in semifinals

ovlina Borgohain fin-∟ished with a bronze after being outpunched by World champion and top seed Busenaz Surmeneli of Turkey in a women's 69kg semifinal bout on Wednesday.

Lovlina, a double Worlds bronze medallist, gave it her best shot before losing 0-5 in the bout thoroughly dominated by Surmeneli.

Third Indian

After Vijender Singh (2008) and M.C. Mary Kom (2012), the 23-year-old Assam woman has become the third Indian boxer to claim an Olympics bronze.

Boxing with confidence, Surmeneli landed clean, powerful and accurate combinations on Loylina's head to take the early advantage.

The taller Indian, who received a standing count, replied with some well-directed counters but lost the first round 0-5.

The Turkish boxer continued to attack with the same intensity even as Lovlina delivered some body shots and right hooks in the second. The Indian, who was served a warning, felt the fury of Surmeneli's punches.

Though the Turkish boxer continued to land solid blows on target, Lovlina fought on bravely and lasted the course despite receiving another standing count. Surmeneli won the last two rounds, like she did the first, to book a spot in the final.

'I couldn't achieve what I set out to'

It has been my dream to win an Olympic gold medal, says Lovlina

Lovlina Borgohain was bitterly disappointed that she couldn't make it to the goldmedal bout.

"I've just lost, and I am not really happy about it. I've had to be content with the bronze medal throughout my career. A medal is a medal, whether it is an Olympic medal or an interdistrict one," she said right after the bout.

When asked if she realised the gravity of her achievement, which puts her among the elite in India's sporting history, she said: "Ever since I began boxing it has been my dream to win an Olympic gold medal.

"I trained and spent every moment towards this goal. It feels good that I have a medal, but I could not achieve what I set out to. I came here with the target of winning the gold medal, I was sure that I would win the gold." Loyling admitted her stra-

Hurdler McLaughlin sets world record; Kenyan 1-2 in 800m

Andre de Grasse has been the 'nearly-man' for long, winning silver and bronze frequently at the Olympics and Worlds, watching others go past him to embrace glory. All that changed on Wednesday as the 26-year-old won the 200m, his first global title and Canada's first gold in 93 years in the event, shocking World champion and season-leader Noah Lyles.

de Grasse had won the 200m silver, behind Usain Bolt, in Rio and had taken the 100m bronze in Tokyo and it looked like he would have to wait longer, for Lyles was in the front at 150m. But the Canadian produced a superb finish to triumph in a world-leading 19.62s. Americans Kenneth Bednarek (19.68) and Lyles (19.74) took silver and bronze.

For the second successive day, there was a world record in 400m hurdles. This time it was 21-year-old American Sydney McLaughlin who overtook defending champion Dalilah Muhammad in the final straight to better her record with 51.46s for gold with Dalilah (51.58) also coming under the previous record Emmanuel Korir and Ferguson Rotich made it a Ke-

Neeraj qualifies for final in style

Neeraj Chopra surprisingly topped the qualification round with his opening effort and entered the final even as some of the world's top javelin throwers struggled for answers. The 23year-old Asian Games champion's 86.65 was way better than the automatic qualification standard (83.50m).

Germany's world leader Johannes Vetter, who had been consistent over 90m this year, was in danger of being eliminated at one stage after two 82m throws

before making the cut with an 85.64m for the second spot. Pakistan's Arshad Nadeem (85.16m) was third, making him the first from his country to enter an Olympic final in athletics.

Neeraj is the first Indian javelin thrower to enter an Olympic final and the first to top the qualification round.

Meanwhile, Asian silver medallist Shivpal Singh, the other Indian in the fray (PB 86.23m), was nearly 10m behind that as he finished 12th in his group and 27th overall with 76.40m. Only the top 12 made it to Saturday's final.

India goes down to Argentina in a bruising contest

The Indian women's inspiring run ended in the semifinals as the team slipped to a 1-2 loss to former world champion Argentina. Rani Rampal's side will face Great Britain in the bronze medal match on Friday. At the end of a bruising contest, the Argentines revelled while the Indians were left dejected.

Brilliant start

The Sjoerd Marijne-coached team made a brilliant start as Gurjit Kaur scored off a penalty corner – her second in as many games – in the 90th second. Argentina women's team,

which has won medals at

four consecutive Olympics

(2000 to 2012), slowly start-

ed making inroads, winning

eighth minute but nothing came of it. The world's second-ranked team mounted pressure on India, effectively combining aerial passes and scorching runs on the flanks but the Indian defence stood resolute. Argentina came out in the second quarter like Gaucho cowgirls running wild in the Pampas and found the equaliser in the 18th minute. Their 37-yearold captain Maria Noel Barrionuevo rifled a bullet dragflick to restore parity.

India's inability to close out opportunities cost it dear as two penalty-corner chances went begging in the 26th minute. Neha Goyal had a great chance four minutes later when she stormed into the penalty circle, but she shied away from taking a shot, looked for a pass instead, and was robbed of the ball. Argentina's Agustina Albertarrio was a menace on the left and made a marauding run in the 33rd minute that served as a warning. Barrionuevo scored her second goal of the evening in the 36th minute from another penalty corner. The goal, which took a heavy deflection off an Indian defender, was her 197th international goal in 344 appearances.

It was the beginning of the end for India as Argentina dug deep and fortified its defence. India had a few stray chances, but the goal remained elusive. The side had a sliver of hope in the last minute, but Argentina goalkeeper Belen Succi showed great reflexes to keep out Navneet Kaur's deflection from close range.

Argentina takes on the Netherlands, which defeated Great Britain 5-1, in the final.

TTFI to issue show cause notice to Manika Batra

Rejecting the services of national coach is no way to express displeasure, says secretary

Taking a serious view of Manika Batra's refusal to be guided by National coach Soumyadeep Roy during her singles matches in Tokyo Olympics, the Table Tennis Federation of India (TTFI) has decided to issue a showcause notice to her.

The unanimous decision was taken by the TTFI's Executive Board meeting on Wednesday.

virtual meeting, chaired by the TTFI's senior vice-president Rajeev Bodas, was also briefly attended by Haryana's Deputy Chief Minister and the TTFI president, Dushyant Chautala.

According to the TTFI secretary Arun Banerjee, "What happened in Tokyo

was a serious act of indiscipline. When Manika left for Tokyo her personal coach (Sanmay Paranjpe) carried an accreditation card which limited his access to the practice area. Soon after her arrival in Tokyo, Manika demanded that Paranjpe's accreditation be upgraded to enable him to access the Field of Play.

"In spite of the best efforts of the Indian Olympic Association officials, the Organising Committee went by the International Olympic Committee norms and declined upgrade accreditation.

"The Board members felt that if at all Manika wanted to show her displeasure, rejecting the services of the national coach for her singles matches was no way to do it," he said.

It may be recalled that Manika justified her demand by saying Soumaydeep Roy was the personal coach of the other Indian entry in the women's singles, Sutirtha Mukherjee and hence her personal coach be allowed access to the Field of Play for her singles matches.

"Soumyadeep was in Tokyo as the coach of the Indian team, and not as Sutircoach," clarified Banerjee.

The show cause is likely to be issued on Thursday and Manika will have 10 days to respond.

Cracking the whip, the TTFI also decided to make it mandatory for all selected players, coaches and officials

to attend all National camps. Ahead of the Tokyo Games, the TTFI organised a National camp (from June 17 to July 10) which was attended by Sharath Kamal and Surtitha at Sonepat.

G. Sathiyan stayed away, preferring to train with his personal coach S. Raman in Chennai. Manika attended the first three days before returning to Pune.

"No personal coach, sparring partners, support staff, etc. will be allowed in the camp. Medical certificates, if any, issued by only TTFI certified doctors would be valid.

"If a player chooses to stay away, he or she will not be considered for selection to participate in the event for which the camp is being held," explained Banerjee.

Ondra — yelling his way to the top

The Czech rock climber shares his secret of success

Weightlifters are among the most vocal athletes at the letting Olympics, screams as they lock out at the top of a lift: "ahhhhhh!" Tennis players have long been known to be grunters, usually with some form of "ha-uh!" or "ha-ooah!"

The loudest vocalisations of the Tokyo Games may come from the grounds in one of the Olympic programme's newest sports.

Adam Ondra is widely considered the best climber in the world and a gold medal favourite in sport climbing's Olympic debut. He's also a bit of a yeller.

"It might sound bad, but it helps me," Ondra said.

The shrieking comes when I'm at my absolute limit," Ondra said.

Some scientific studies say he may be right. Whatever it is, it's hard to argue with the results. Ondra has become the rock star of rock climbing, a long-limbed, longnecked Czech who moves up sheer faces like a spider across a web.

The 28-year-old has tackled more of the world's most difficult climbs than anyone, scaling routes with names like Silence, Change and Pure Imagination – ascensions that leave even above-average climbers standing on the ground shaking their heads

Ondra also is arguably the world's best indoor climber, winning four World championships and finishing in the top three seven other times. He may be the loud-

est, too. As Ondra's celebrity has risen with his climbs up rock walls, his audible exaltations have become part of popular culture, turned into ringtones, GIFs and mashups with songs. A compilation of his screams has been mixed with metal music and another person inserted his shrieks into Taylor Swift's " I Knew You Were Trouble."

"If I'm focused on a certain move and I scream, I know I'm 100% breathing out," he said.

Ondra is onto something in that aspect. Tennis players have been grunting for years to add power and rhythm to their strokes. Screaming, shrieking and grunting has infiltrated other sports as athletes try to find any extra


