IPCC report forecasts a future of severe weather

Global warming to trigger extreme rain in South India, it says

The Indian Ocean is warming at a higher rate than other oceans, said the latest report by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) released on Monday, with scientists warning that India will witness increased heatwaves and flooding, which will be the irreversible effects of climate change.

The current overall global warming trends are likely to lead to an increase in annual mean precipitation over India, with more severe rain expected over southern India in the coming decades.

The authors of the IPCC's Sixth Assessment Report, "Climate Change 2021: The Physical Science Basis", said the warming of the ocean would lead to a rise in sea levels, leading to frequent and severe coastal flooding in low-level areas. With a 7,517km coastline, India would face significant threats from the rising seas. Across the port cities of Chennai, Kochi, Kolkata, Mumbai, Surat and Visakhapatnam, 28.6 million people would be exposed to coastal flooding if sea levels rise by 50 cm.

Monsoon extremes are likely to increase over India and South Asia, while the frequency of short intense rainy days are expected to

rise. Models also indicate a lengthening of the monsoon over India by the end of the 21st century, with the South Asian monsoon precipitation projected to increase.

Stating that human activities are causing climate change, the report said the planet was irrevocably headed towards warming by 1.5 degrees Celsius over pre-industrial times in the next two decades. Keeping global warming below 2 degrees Celsius of pre-industrial levels by the turn of century and endeavouring to limit it to 1.5 degrees Celsius was at the heart of the 2015 Paris Agreement. Unless extremely deep emission cuts are undertaken by all countries immediately, these goals are unlikely to be met. The report recommended that countries strive to achieve net zero emissions - no additional greenhouse gases

Working to solve border row: Himanta

Assam Chief Minister says his priority is to protect the interests of the State

A return to the 19th century border demarcation as being demanded by Mizoram may be impractical but a resolution can be found to the border dispute between the two States, Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma said.

Six policemen and a bystander were killed on July 26 during clashes between the police forces of the two States arising out of the dispute. Two conflicting demarcations of the borders between communities on both sides - one in 1875 and another in 1933 - are at the

root of the dispute. The Mizos want the 1875 demarcation to prevail.

'Not provocative'

Talking to *The Hindu* ahead of his meetings with Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Union Home Minister Amit Shah on Monday, Mr. Sarma rejected the suggestion that his statements on the conflict were provocative. "I spoke only after the killing of our policemen. If I do not speak for them, I would be letting them down. You must understand that the Assam police have been fighting the ULFA and other insurgencies

for a long time. We cannot allow their morale to drop," he

Asked whether he had a larger role to play in reconciliation, considering that he was also the BJP's pointsman for the entire northeastern region, he observed that his priority was to protect the interests of Assam. "I am the CM of Assam first, and I cannot sacrifice the interests of

with Meghalaya and Arunachal Pradesh. At some point, I will also speak to Mizoram CM, with whom I have a good personal relationship," he stated.

The ambiguities regarding the boundaries between Assam and States such as Meghalaya and Mizoram were allowed to fester for a long time and now the issues had become more complicated. "These issues should have been resolved decades ago. Now that we are here, we have to be careful that our attempts to solve the problems should not lead to worse problems," he said. "I came only two months ago."

Jharkhand judge death: SC not happy with CBI report

seen the CJI lash out at Central agencies such as the CBI, the Intelligence Bureau and State police forces for ignoring complaints from judges about abusive messages and threats even as attacks on the judiciary were on the rise.

The court, which has taken suo motu cognisance of the rising number of attacks on judicial officers and even High Court judges, suggested the formation of a special force to protect judges, especially trial judges who decide criminal cases involving highprofile accused.

"We have seen that in criminal cases involving high profile people, there is a new trend of maligning judges. There is no freedom for judges to work. The CBI, the police, the IB do not help the judiciary. I am making this statement with some sense of responsibility..." the CII oral-



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
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Police lodge case over hate slogans

Delhi Police on Monday registered a case in connection with a video in which people can be heard chanting anti-Muslim slogans allegedly during a 'Bharat Jodo' event at Jantar Mantar.

The video, showing people raising slogans against the Muslim community and threatening them, had gone viral on social media.

Deputy Commissioner of Police (New Delhi) Deepak Yadav said, "We received a video and we are examining it. A case has been registered under relevant sections and an investigation is in progress."

Shipra Srivastava, media in-charge of 'Bharat Jodo Aandolan', said a protest was held on Sunday at Jantar Mantar under the leadership of advocate and former BJP spokesperson Ashwini Upadhyay.

Unknown people

"The protest was held against colonial laws and demanding to abolish 222 British-era laws. We have seen the video, but have no idea who the people are. The police should take strict action against the persons who raised the slogans," Ms. Srivastava said.

Hundreds of people had attended the protest in New Delhi on Sunday.

'Bharat Jodo' event organiser seeks action against sloganeers

Supreme Court lawyer and former Delhi BJP spokesperson Ashwini Upadhyay, who organised the 'Bharat Jodo Movement' rally where inflammatory anti-Muslim slogans were allegedly raised on Sunday, said that the videos appearing on social media "fail our movement".

Strongly disassociating himself from the crowd which raised slogans, he said, "If the videos are genuine, then they are made to fail our movement. In our event, we did not call any person who talks about dividing the country," he said.

Sharing his opinion on the content of the videos, he asserted, "I have filed more than 100 public interest litigation and none of them are against or for any particular community. The movement is about united India and not dividing India". In videos shared by Mr.

Upadhyay himself on social media, he is surrounded by a crowd chanting "Jai Shri Ram" and "Bharat Mata Ki Jai". In another video he shared of the event. Mr. Upadhyay, wearing a saffron turban and scarf along with a rudraksha band on his hand, is joined by actor Gajendra

Chauhan and people clad in saffron clothes.

The advocate, however, said he came for the event around 11 a.m. and left around noon as he realised the crowd was growing.

"It started raining heavily which also became a reason to leave," he said, adding that those who chanted anti-Muslim slogans "probably did it later in the afternoon".

Mr. Upadhyay has filed a complaint with Delhi Police demanding action against those who associated him with the raising of anti-Muslim slogans. "There are people who are sharing these videos in my name on social media. I don't know these people, I haven't met them was to demand new laws instead of those laid down by the British," he said.

Fear psychosis

Demanding action against the hate sloganeering, Jamiat Ulama-i-Hind's general secretary Maulana Hakimuddin Qasmi met senior police officers and submitted a complaint stating that "highly objectionable and threatening speech and slogans" were raised at the event. "It has created a fear psychosis among the Muslim community and peace-loving people across all communities".

In the letter addressed to Delhi Police Commissioner Rakesh Asthana, the organisation's president Mahmood Madani wrote: "I would like to recall your statement when you joined as Commissioner of Delhi Police, you affirmed that communal harmony and fairness will be your top priority". They also hoped that strict action will be taken against those calling for "massacring Muslims".

"I am apprehensive about the situation in Delhi. Law and order is being put at risk by extremist groups once again and situation like the 2020 riots may occur if such people are not apprehended in time," the letter stated.

Go out only if needed, court tells Unnao rape survivor

A Delhi court on Monday directed the Unnao rape survivor, who has been provided security by the Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF), to step out only when necessary until the case is over and inform her personal security officers before going out.

Security officers

District and Sessions Judge Dharmesh Sharma issued the directions on an application filed by the rape survivor in which she alleged harassment by the personal security officers.

She also told the court that they were curtailing her movements and not allowing her to enjoy her liberties. Taking note of her submissions, the judge said, "Inform them [security officers] before going out. They are deputed for your security. You must plan in a way that you don't have to venture out every day. Go out only when necessary. You must take precautions until the case is over."

The court also noted that the survivor and her personal security officers have agreed to amicably resolve the issue. The judge added, "For now, the prosecutrix is impressed upon to ensure that whenever she or family members wish to go outside Delhi in connection with any pending case, they would communicate it to CRPF Assistant Commandant so that proper security arrangements and escorts could be made."

The woman was kidnapped and raped by expelled BJP MLA Kuldeep Singh Sengar in 2017 when she was a minor.

A 22-year-old man has been arrested along with two of his friends for allegedly killing his live-inpartner in South Delhi's Maidangarhi on Sunday, the police said.

DCP (South) Atul Thakur said that the accused has been identified as Anuj, resident of Fatehpur Beri, and his friends Ramzan (32) and Naushad (21). Ramzan himself called the police to inform about the incident.

The police said that a PCR call was received on Sunday evening regarding a woman's body lying in the jungle behind Rajpur Khurd village. The police found the woman to have been strangulated.

"Initially, the caller Ramzan stated that he is an alcohol addict and came to jungle to drink. When he was drinking, he noticed that two unknown persons allegedly took the woman to the jungle and murdered her. The caller was in great fear and ran away to his house and after that he made the PCR call," Mr. Thakur said, adding that there were discrepancies

in his version. The police said that closer examination of CCTV footage showed the caller also going towards the spot. During sustained interrogation, he stated that he knew the victim and she was his friend Anuj's livein-partner who he had married in a temple also.

During inquiry, it was revealed that Anuj liked a woman, however, due to lockdown, she had left the city. Anuj then met the victim and started living with her. Another woman, he had

earlier met and liked, came back a few months ago and the two got in a relationship. Anuj then decided to kill his live-in-partner and roped in his two friends.



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Nangal case: BJP demands AAP govt. give ₹1 crore to kin

The Delhi BJP on Monday protested outside Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal's residence demanding that the city government pay ₹1 crore compensation to the family of the nineyear-old girl who was allegedly raped and murdered in Nangal village.

State unit vice-president Rajiv Babbar said the Delhi government must also give a job and a house to the family. "Instead of caring for Delhiites, the Kejriwal government's focus seems to be more on AAP's campaign and expansion in other States at Delhi tax payers' money," Mr. Babbar alleged.

HC seeks govt. reply on petition challenging home delivery of liquor

STAFF REPORTER NEW DELHI

The Delhi High Court on Monday asked the city government to reply to a plea by BJP MP Parvesh Sahib Singh Verma challenging the provision in the new excise policy of 2021, which allows home delivery of liquor. A Bench of Chief Justice D.N. Patel and Justice Jyoti Singh listed the petition for further hearing on September 20.

Senior Advocate Abhishek Manu Singhvi, representing the Delhi government, submitted that "₹10,000 crore has been earned by Delhi, pursuant to the new excise policy amid the ongoing pandemic".

Mr. Verma, in his petition, has challenged Rule 66(6) of

the Delhi Excise (Amendment) Rules of, 2021, which he stated suffered from various constitutional illegalities and is not sustainable under law.

"The new policy undermines the ban on the consumption of liquor in public places by making it possible to deliver alcohol to public places... The Rules enable the possibility of delivery of alcohol to hospitals and schools. It lacks any consideration to the safety of those delivering the liquor," the petition stated.

The plea further said that home delivery of liquor was against Article 47 of the Constitution, which makes it the duty of the State to improve public health.

Schools to have quarantine rooms, staggered timings

Delhi govt. issues guidelines for reopening of schools for students of Classes X-XII

SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT NEW DELHI

The Delhi government on Monday issued a set of guidelines and a standard operating procedure (SOP) for the reopening of schools for students of Classes X-XII.

Students can now visit the schools for admissionrelated work, counselling, guidance and practical activities related to Board examinations.

Safety measures include staggered timings to ensure there is no crowding at the entry and exit gates of the campus. Also, there needs to be a minimum gap of one hour between the exit of students in morning school and the next batch coming in the evening, at schools that run on double shifts.

A quarantine room will have to be created in each school for emergencies.

The schools will have to ensure that written consent

all students who are willing to visit the school, and heads of schools will have to make a specific schedule as per the capacity of the classroom/labs following COVIDappropriate behaviour. An order from the Direc-

torate of Education said, "All required measures/precautions like social distancing, wearing of face mask,

etc. need to be observed by is obtained from parents of everyone at all times."

The government has mandated that all employees and students will have to go through thermal scanning before entering school premises, and anyone having cold/cough/ fever or flu-like symptoms shall not be allowed to attend school. Students will

be told not to share station-

It added that online classes/digital distance learning shall continue and those students who wish to continue their studies through online classes shall be allowed to do so. Health checkups and referral services situated on school premises, or conducted from there, can also resume, the order stated. The heads of schools have been asked to ensure that all teachers and employees are vaccinated on priority. Schools have been directed to upload daily status of vaccinated staff on a link.

'Delhi govt. not prepared for third COVID-19 wave'

AAP did not improve health sector: BJP

SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT NEW DELHI

The Delhi government is not prepared for a possible third wave of COVID-19 since the city's health infrastructure has not been improved by the AAP since it came to power, the BJP alleged on Monday.

Delhi BJP president Adesh Gupta said while Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal may make tall claims of making Delhi world-class, the fact remained that only 628 new beds had been added in government hospitals since the past year.

Referring to an RTI reply, Mr. Gupta alleged that when the Aam Aadmi Party came to power in Delhi, there were about 9,000 beds in city hospitals. By March 30, 2021, this number had gone up to only 10,993.

"The AAP, in its 2015 manifesto, had said the number of beds will be raised from 10,000 to 40,000. In all these years, forget 30,000 more, the Kejriwal

add 700 new beds," Mr. Gupta said.

'False propaganda' "The government is run-

ning on the basis of falsehood and propaganda. It had promised that as per international norms, there would be five beds available per 1,000 citizens," the senior BJP leader said.

Mr. Gupta added the city was in for a grave crisis if the Delhi government continued with the same "laxity and negligence" shown by the Kejriwal-led government during the first and second wave of the epidemic.

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



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Only one student fails in Karnataka SSLC exams

As many as 157 students secured 625/625 marks in the SSLC examination held last month in Karnataka. Of the 8,71,443 candidates who appeared for the Class 10 examination, all barring one were deemed as pass. The pass percentage was 99.99%.

The pass percentage in 2020-21 was 71.8%.

While the Department of Primary and Secondary Education had announced that all SSLC students would be declared as pass, one private candidate failed the examination as she had allegedly indulged in impersonation.

This year, the pattern of the examination was changed due to the second wave of COVID-19. Students had to attempt multiple choice questions for all six exams that were held over a span of two days. Each subject paper was for 40 marks that was later converted to 100 marks, while the first language marks were converted to 125

Grace marks given Announcing the results on

Monday, Primary and Secondary Education Minister B.C. Nagesh said 9% of the students were able to clear the SSLC examinations as grace marks were awarded to them.

"Experts had estimated that the numbers would be higher than this and a large percentage of students would pass only because of grace marks, but only a small percentage of students were benefited."

The Minister said the highest grace marks given for a subject was 28 and 13 students had got it.

The Punjab police said on Monday that the State was on high alert after a tiffin box bomb, packed with over 2 kg of RDX, was recovered from a village in Amritsar which they suspect was dropped by a drone flying in from Pakistan.

Director General of Police Dinkar Gupta said the bomb could be set off through a remote device or a timed mechanism.

The tiffin box bomb can be described as an Improvised Explosive Device. The

IED was created in a doublechambered tiffin box with attractive pictures on it. Last evening, the recovery was made near Dalake village under Lopoke Police Station in Amritsar," Mr. Gupta told media persons.

"Our assessment is that this bomb has been delivered through a drone across the border," he added.

According to police, some hand grenades and cartridges were also found from the bag containing the tiffin bomb days ahead of Independence Day.

Road ahead from Gogra

While disengagement happens, a long-lasting solution along the LAC remains a challenge

fter the talks on July 31, India and China have taken one more step towards restoring peace and ▲ normalcy on the LAC by disengaging at Gogra. It is, however, only one step, and the road ahead towards returning to the status quo of April 2020, before the tensions of last summer upended years of a carefully managed even if uneasy peace along the LAC, remains uncertain. It has taken 12 rounds of military-level talks to see both sides disengage and put in place buffer zones in the Galwan Valley, the site of the June 2020 clash that marked the worst violence since 1967, Pangong Lake, and now Patrolling Point 17 in Gogra. The disengagement process at PP17 took place on August 4 and 5, with a return to permanent bases. The next round of talks will discuss PP15 in Hot Springs. Demchok, where China has transgressed in relatively smaller numbers than the deployments seen in Pangong Lake, also remains unresolved. Beijing has appeared unwilling to discuss the strategically significant Depsang plains, where the Chinese side has been blocking Indian patrols. The buffer zone model, where both sides temporarily cease patrolling in disputed areas, has appeared to work so far in keeping the peace. It is, however, only a temporary measure, and one that India should not accept as permanent as it would prevent India from enforcing its territorial claims and favour the PLA, which can deploy faster in larger numbers owing to more favourable terrain and better logistics.

The next step will be full de-escalation, and a withdrawal of some of the new forward deployments that have come up close to the LAC. India has signalled that it is prepared for the long haul; its message: relations cannot return to normal without a full restoration of normalcy on the borders. While the strategic motivations of China's border deployments last year are not clear, the tactical objectives are not difficult to ascertain. Since the 2017 Doklam crisis, China has consistently stepped up building new permanent airbases and air defence units closer to the LAC, with at least 13 new positions coming up since then, according to an analysis of satellite images from Stratfor. India has been moving to rapidly upgrade its own infrastructure to close the gap. The result is an entirely changed security dynamic along the LAC. There is a need to come up urgently with new protocols and confidence-building measures, as both sides gradually resume patrolling in the buffer zones. The multiple transgressions by China and the violence of last year have set back years of efforts to carefully manage the borders and thrown into doubt whether the four agreements regulating the behaviour of both sides still remain valid. While the recent moves towards restoring the peace are certainly welcome, finding a more long-lasting solution to ensure peace along the LAC will present a taller challenge.


IPCC's warning on climate points to a small window of opportunity that still exists

The IPCC has issued arguably its strongest warning yet on impending catastrophe from unmitigated global warming caused by human activity, lending scientific credence to the argument that rising wildfires, heatwaves, extreme rainfall and floods witnessed in recent times are all strongly influenced by a changing climate. In a stark report on the physical science basis of climate change contributed for a broader Assessment Report of the UN, the IPCC's Working Group I has called for deep cuts to carbon dioxide emissions and other greenhouse gases and a move to net zero emissions, as the world would otherwise exceed 1.5°C and 2°C of warming during the 21st century with permanent consequences. Climate change is described by many as a far greater threat to humanity than COVID-19, because of its irreversible impacts. The latest report is bound to strengthen the criticism that leaders in many countries have stonewalled and avoided moving away from coal and other fossil fuels, while even those who promised to act, failed to influence the multilateral system. The new report attributes catastrophic events to sustained global warming, particularly the frequency and intensity of hot extremes, marine heatwaves, heavy precipitation, agricultural and ecological droughts, proportion of intense tropical cyclones, reductions in Arctic Sea ice, snow cover and permafrost. A phenomenon such as heavy rainfall over land, for instance, could be 10.5% wetter in a world warmer by 1.5°C, and occur 1.5 times more often, compared to the 1850-1900 period.

More than five years after the Paris Agreement was concluded, there is no consensus on raising ambition to reduce emissions, making access to low carbon technologies easier, and adequately funding mitigation and adaptation. COVID-19 had the unexpected effect of marginally and temporarily depressing emissions. The IPCC's analysis presents scenarios of large-scale collapse of climate systems that future leaders would find virtually impossible to manage. Heatwaves and heavy rainfall events experienced with increasing frequency and intensity are just two of these, while disruptions to the global water cycle pose a more unpredictable threat. Also, if emissions continue to rise, oceans and land, two important sinks and the latter a key part of India's climate action plan, would be greatly weakened in their ability to absorb atmospheric carbon dioxide. The new report sets the stage for the CoP26 conference in November. The only one course to adopt there is for developed countries with legacy emissions to effect deep cuts, transfer technology without strings to emerging economies and heavily fund mitigation and adaptation. Developing nations should then have no hesitation in committing themselves to steeper emissions cuts.

Saudi Arabia, Iran and the possibilities of détente

Recent pronouncements from Riyadh and Tehran could be supportive of peace and security in the Gulf littoral

ndividuals and human collectives have memories and time spans. The two do not converge but at times overlap. The latter are infrequent vet meaningful. Prudence, if not wisdom, lies in using them. One such occasion betides the Gulf region at this juncture.

The Persian Gulf is a nearly 990 kilometre-long body of water that separates Iran from the Arabian Peninsula. Seven member States of the United Nations lay claim to washing their hands or feet in its waters. At its narrowest point, in the Strait of Hormuz, it is only 54 km wide and the main shipping channels that pass through it are 30km-35 km wide and 8km-12 km wide. They are critical to the transportation of crude oil and LNG to global markets.

For over a century till the early 1970s, the Persian Gulf was a British lake. The imperial withdrawal propelled the United States to step in as the guarantor of the sub-region with its Twin-Pillars (Iran-Saudi Arabia) policy. An abortive effort was also made by Oman through the Muscat Conference in November 1976; it floundered on the obstinacy of Baathist Iraq. Bilateral efforts were also made by King Faisal of Saudi Arabia and the Shah of Iran; King Faisal initiated his Islamic solidarity policy in 1964 and visited Iran in December 1965; in 1966 Saudi Defence Minister Sultan bin Abdulaziz described the Iranian-Saudi friendship as a

perfect example of Islamic brotherhood and neighbourly relations; the two States were also active members of the Five Power 'Safari Club' for intelligence sharing.

Impact of unrest

disturbed the strategic balance in the region and put an end to efforts to develop a regional consensus on security issues. Over the next decade, and particularly during the period of the Iraq-Iran war, the effort of the Gulf monarchies and of their western supporters was to destabilise and wish away the revolutionary regime. The formation of the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) in 1981 was part of the effort to reassure the Gulf sheikhdoms. The end of the war and the cooling of tensions allowed saner perceptions to emerge. These were spelt out among others by the Saudi Arabian Foreign Minister in the Manama Dialogue in December 2004. In 1996, Iranian President Mohammad Khatami told the Saudi Defence Minister that a defence pact would be mutually beneficial. Crown Prince Abdullah attended the Islamic Summit conference in Tehran in December 9-11, 1997. This was seen in Tehran as 'a good beginning for removing misunderstandings'. Subsequent developments in the region relating to Syria and the Hezbollah on the one side and the Saudi intervention in the Yemen on the other conflict pushed back, even reversed, the developing perceptions in Riyadh.

Yemen in particular has been critical to Saudi perceptions of national security. The clash of viewpoints dates back to the 1930s when King Abdulaziz ibn Saud was

The Iranian Revolution of 1978-79

Kingdom of Najd to incorporate the western and southern parts of the Arabian Peninsula. Conflict developed over the southern region of Najran and resulted in a Saudi military victory and the Treaty of 1934. This maintained peace till the Egyptian Revolution and Gamal Abdel Nasser's 'intoxicating blend of nationalism and radicalism' that set the region alight. It led to the Yemeni coup of 1962, the Egyptian military intervention in Yemen and the souring of Saudi-Egyptian relations that lasted till the Arab-Israeli war of 1967. This suited the interests of the United States: military assistance programmes and the stationing of U.S. troops during the Kuwait war of 1990 followed. The Trump era and the jettisoning of the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action witnessed a qualitative strengthening

The key issues

of ties between them.

The last few years have witnessed geopolitical tensions in the Gulf littoral. Most States have been affected adversely by the historically low oil prices and by COVID-19. The GCC has become inoperative with the focus on the boycott of Qatar that is now being reversed. There are new tensions between the United Arab Emirates (UAE) expanding the boundaries of the and Saudi Arabia. Riyadh's access

to the Oval Office in Washington is now not what it was in the Donald Trump era. The Abraham Accords between Israel, the UAE and Bahrain have qualitatively influenced the Arab-Israeli calculus in the Persian Gulf States and in the wider Arab world.

More recently, the U.S.'s decision to withdraw forces from Afghanistan and reduce commitments in Iraq has been the subject of discussions on policy options among knowledgeable observers in Washington. One expert has observed that "on balance, the American ground-force base in Kuwait, the Fifth Fleet naval base in Bahrain, [the] Al Udeid Air Base in Qatar, Al Dhafra Air Base in the UAE and the access arrangements in Oman provide the U.S. with a politically and financially sustainable military presence" in the region. Another view is that "the post-CO-VID-19 environment is going to be unfriendly to Saudi Arabia perhaps more than to any other leading power in the Gulf". The Saudi failure to subdue the Houthis and to close the Yemen conflict on their terms has become a source of concern. The U.S.'s inability to subdue Iran on its terms has also become evident. Others have drawn attention to the Saudi Crown Prince's remark in April that his country wants good relations with Iran and to the Iranian reaction of welcoming it. It is evident that policy options are being explored.

Security is the concern

The impact of these recent developments on Saudi Arabia-Iran relations needs to be assessed in this context. The effort to impart a sectarian orientation to the divide does not seem to hold. Their primary concern is security in the Gulf littoral and the security of the waterway for the transportation of their hydrocarbon exports.

In January 1987, the then U.S. Secretary of State said the Gulf has become 'critical to the economic health of the West.' A good part of the rest of the world can with jus-

tice be added to it. For this to be given practical shape, its essential ingredients would need to be: freedom of access to, and outlet from, Gulf waters through the Strait of Hormuz; freedom of commercial shipping in international waters in the Persian Gulf; prevention of conflict that may impinge on the freedom of trade and shipping; freedom to all States of the Gulf littoral to exploit their hydrocarbons and other natural resources and export them; ensure conditions of peace and stability in the individual littoral States, and ensure that regional or extra-regional conditions do not impinge on any of these con-

Could the achievement of such an arrangement, or a part of it, be the beginning of a much desired and reassuring development? Overtime, it may address itself to bring forth answers to questions such as security for whom, by whom, against whom.

The recent pronouncements from Rivadh and Tehran do tend to suggest an inclination to be supportive of some of these suggestions. This is to be welcomed since from an Indian viewpoint the requirement is and will continue to be stability in the littoral States, freedom of navigation and safety of sea lanes.

Later, it had framed the draft rules albeit incompletely under all the codes – incompletely because the rules have not covered some aspects of the Codes, e.g. rules regarding recognition of central trade unions have not been framed so far.

A rushed exercise

Controversies surround the processes of the enactment of codes and the framing of rules. The Government has held only symbolic and partial consultation with the central trade unions. The three codes were passed in Parliament even as the Opposition parties, otherwise insignificant, boycotted the proceedings. The tearing hurry in which the Government carried out the reforms even during the COVID-19 period gave tremendous hope to employers and potential investors. It announced its intentions of implementing the Codes from April 1, 2021 even as State governments were completely unprepared with the rules. Further, the major political parties reallocated their energies to regional elections rather than the

implementation of codes. Symbolically, labour law reforms have been affected and the government can boast of it. Since the Government has not shown serious intent to implement the codes, the NDA government effected reforms to boast that it has executed the longpending reforms; simply put, it is more symbolic rather than a meaningful act.

Court directives

The central government has deferred the possible date of implementation to October 1, 2021. again tentatively. In the meanwhile, the Supreme Court of India has exerted pressure on both the central and the State governments to implement a 'one nation, one ration card' (ONOR) scheme and register all the unorganised workers under the National Database Unorganized (NDUW), which was to have been done by July 31, 2021. Government agencies are rushing to comply with both the directives. In ONOR, Aadhaar seeding and the universal availability of an electronic point of sale (EPOS) system are necessary. And for the NDUW, it has to register each of the approximately 400 million workers, a conservative figure.

Perhaps, the Supreme Court passed such an extraordinary perhaps impracticable order following the hesitancy in early 2020 to provide relief to suffering migrant workers following the national lockdown. The governments did not honour the Supreme Court's orders relating to the registration of construction workers for many years. So, it has a bad track record. One is not sure when governments would comply fully and well with the Supreme Court's orders. Unor-

ganised workers including migrant workers will continue to be deprived of their promised and ex-

The Government said the codes would extend universal minimum wages and social security, enable enhanced industrial safety and the provision of social security to gig workers, among other things. The Industrial Relations Code provides for recognition of trade union(s) by employers, a labour right that eluded workers for seven decades. On the other hand, employers celebrated the extension of tremendous flexibility to them, even those unasked, such as relief from framing standing orders for most firms. But do they enjoy these benefits?

On August 3, 2021, I browsed the Simpliance website (a law portal) to assess the record of State governments regarding rules under the codes. It was a revelation to find that major States such as Tamil Nadu, Kerala, West Bengal, Maharashtra, Haryana and Delhi have not issued the draft rules under any codes. Karnataka, Gujarat and Jharkhand have framed Rules for the Code on Wages and the Industrial Relations Code, Madhya Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, Uttar Pra-

desh, Uttarakhand and Punjab have framed rules for all the codes. Even though the Code on Wages was enacted in August 2019, it was only in March 2021 that the central government notified the constitution of an advisory committee. On June 3, 2021 it also announced an expert committee with a tenure of three years to advise it on minimum wages. Then, on July 12, 2021, it announced that the wage index's base year would be shifted from 1965 to 2019 to use the revised wage index to determine minimum wages. The Government seems to be clueless regarding the implementation of

Poor safety record

The incidence of major industrial accidents has remained undiminished even during the COVID-19 period. For instance, IndustriAll reported that between May to June, 32 major industrial accidents occurred in India, killing 75 workers (https://bit.ly/3ApxvRV). The media reported four accidents in Vizag during 2020. Safe in India's annual reports, CRUSHED, for 2019 and 2020, provide a disturbing picture of industrial accidents in the automobile industry in the Gurgaon region (https:// bit.ly/3CxPfwv). Industrial safety continues to be a grave concern even after the enactment of the Occupational Safety, Health and

Working Conditions Code. According to several research reports, COVID-19 intensified informality, led to the withdrawal of workers from the labour market, reduced earnings, increased unemployment and widened inequality. The non-statutory floor level minimum wage remains a meagre ₹178 still even as Whole-

sale Price Index-inflation rates have galloped to 12% in June 2021. The Government's relief measures to workers, especially unorganised and migrant workers and even to the so-called organised sector workers, are too meagre to make any difference. It did not implement the widely endorsed measure of direct benefit transfer at least for low-income families.

In perspective

Thus, we see two aspects concerning labour market governance in India. One, the Government has failed to provide legal visibility to millions of unorganised and migrant workers, even after decades, and despite direction by the highest court in the land. Two, despite the gazetting of four Codes, ageold laws are in force. Thus, they reflect poorly not only on the governance abilities of the governments but also on the countervailing power of the Opposition parties. Were the labour law reforms rushed with little or no debate and consultation whatsoever, only to remain in the gazette books? Employers and workers cannot enjoy the so-called benefits extended by

Given the facts mentioned above, the legislative impasse continues; one does not know how long it would be. However, India would score impressively on the ease of doing business exercise by any agency including the World Bank by the mere execution of labour reforms without them being implemented: what else then is needed!

Misinformation through a feminist lens

Sexism and online harassment prevent women from taking vocal stands and hinder progress



The online world amplifies the social norms of the physical world. Women face aggressive and offensive trolling on the Internet, designed to undermine and discredit them professionally and shame them into silence. A perfect example is the 'Sulli Deals' app recently created on GitHub that auctioned Muslim women. The active participation of vocal women, especially from minority communities, is resisted by those who do not wish the social order to be disrupted. This isn't to say that men are not targeted online, but the attacks faced by both sexes are vastly different. Misinformation/disinformation also targets men and women differently and unsurprisingly so, especially in India where gender disparity among Internet users is high.

Gendering misinformation

Take, for instance, the type of misinformation used against Congress leaders Sonia Gandhi and Rahul Gandhi who come from the same socio-economic and political background. Mr. Gandhi is referred to as 'Pappu' by his critics. The usual misinformation targeting him questions his intellect. But the same cannot be said for his mother. Whether it's Hollywood actresses sporting bikinis misidentified as Ms. Gandhi or a morphed photo that shows her sitting on a man's lap, she is portrayed to be an 'indecent' woman to undercut her politics. Ms. Gandhi's position of power does not shield her from vulgar misinformation.

A report by Amnesty International last year said that 95 female politicians out of 724 received nearly one million hateful mentions on Twitter between March and May, one in five of which was sexist or misogynistic.

But misinformation like other forms of abuse has inter-sectional challenges. While actor Swara Bhaskar receives some of the most sexist troll attacks, activist Safoora Zargar is targeted for being a woman as well as a Muslim. After her arrest for participating in protests against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act, pornographic videos were shared in Ms.

Zargar's name on social media. Organised disinformation and sexism intersect with Islamophobia, castetism, religious bigotry and other forms of discrimination to threaten women from minority communities.

The harassment is so rampant that more often than not, women are asked to either ignore the abusers or block such handles. As always, women are expected to take precautionary measures instead of men being asked to behave. We also seldom question Twitter on its failure to stop the spread of pornographic content. The women of Shaheen Bagh were targeted in a similar fashion. Surely a social media giant has the ability to detect and purge nudity, especially when shared with hateful captions?

Gendering misinformation should be a part of the feminist discourse. The world has drastically changed after the advent of the Internet and the digital space has the power to impact democracies. But women do not get an equal opportunity to make themselves heard because they are shut down with sexism or, worse, the threat of sexual violence. Former Jawaharlal Nehru University Students' Union leader Shehla Rashid was forced to delete her Facebook account after receiving rape threats for speaking in favour of interfaith marriage. Journalist Rana Ayyub has also complained several times of rape threats making their way into her Twitter messages. A report that I wrote in 2018 revealed how thousands of men on a closed Facebook group, 'Sharing is Caring', sold Instagram and Facebook pages featuring young women. Many of these metamorphosed into political pages after gaining a substantial following. I was targeted with sexist attacks after the

media - both spaces dominated by men - as a 'gold-digging seductress'. The whole episode was a reminder of deep-rooted internalised misogyny in the country. Women also participated in propagating Ms. Chakraborty as the 'culprit' and rejoiced when she was arrested. Why did they not show solidarity? Because patriarchal norms, while subordinating women, also give them the power to oppress women more vulnerable than them.

A symbiotic relationship

Misinformation and sexism have a symbiotic relationship. Misinformation piggybacks on sexism to discredit vocal women and sexism uses misinformation to reinforce patriarchal norms. While organised misinformation and trolling affect women on a personal level, the issue that is often ignored is the effect they have on democracy. A healthy democracy is participatory and promotes gender inclusiveness. Sexism and misinformation intimidate women from taking vocal stands and are antithetical to a progressive society.

Historically, feminist movements have led to democratisation. Women empowerment cannot be separated from a modern society. Savitribai Phule could reform modern education in the 1800s because her husband Jotirao Phule, a 'Shudra' himself, equipped her with knowledge restricted for the Brahmin community. Jotirao was also fortunate to receive education in the first place because of the foresight of his widowed aunt. Menaka Guruswamy and Arundhati Katju, the only openly gay women lawyers in India, reformed the LGBTQ movement in the country by winning the landmark case in 2018 that decriminalised gay sex. These women went against the social norms of their time to make India more democratically sound. There is no extent to the reforms that women are capable of bringing and progress can happen faster with solidarity. But women who don't conform to social norms are almost never supported and the intersection of sexism and misinformation justifies their abuse. While social media gives a platform for women to raise issues, repeated abuse takes away that freedom. Social media, the place that bolstered the #MeToo movement, is the same place used to shut women down.

Unsteady in the CM's chair

West Bengal could face a crisis if Mamata Banerjee doesn't get elected within six months of Assembly polls

The space of discussion on electoral politics was disproportionately occupied by West Bengal before the Assembly elections and continues to be the case after Mamata Banerjee took oath as Chief Minister. While the Trinamool Congress won with a massive mandate, Ms. Banerjee lost to Suvendu Adhikari in Nandigram. Going by the provisions of the Constitution and in a normal situation, it should have been possible for the Election Commission of India (ECI) to hold by-elections to the seven vacant Assembly seats in West Bengal by now. But there is also a provision by which by-elections can be deferred for six months. If by-elections are held on time, Ms. Banerjee may find it quite easy to get elected from one of the seven seats, but if that does not happen, she will have to resign from the post of Chief Minister. This will cause her major embarrassment even if the State does not face a political crisis.

What the law says

Section 151A of the Representation of the People Act, 1951, mandates the ECI to fill the casual vacancies in the Houses of Parliament and State Legislatures through bye-elections within six months from the date of occurrence of the vacancy, provided that the remainder of the term of a member in relation to a vacancy is one year or more. While the ECI cannot cancel a national or State election, it can cancel an election to a seat in case of a death or an offence as this generally does not impact Assembly formation in the Centre or the State. Under Section 153 of the Act, read with Article 324 of the Constitution, the ECI can extend the time for completing any election, but such extension should not go beyond the six months. Article 172(1) states that in case of a state of Emergency, an election can be postponed for one year at a time in addition to a period of six months after the Emergency is lifted. It is important to note that Emergency here refers to a threat to the security and sovereignty of the nation, not a pandemic.

The Kolkata municipal elections, which were to be held before the Assembly elections, have also not been held yet. Given the strictures passed by the Madras High Court on the ECI at the time of the West Bengal Assembly election, the ECI would like to play it safe. If by-elections are not held within six months of the stipulated time, Ms. Banerjee will have to resign from her post. This is be-

cause Article 164(4) the Constitution states that "a Minister who for any period of six consecutive months is not a member of the Legislature of the State shall at the expiration of that period cease to be a Minister". The Supreme Court reaffirmed this in a 2001 ruling in the case pertaining to the re-appointment of Tej Prakash Singh notifying that if a non-MLA has served as minister for six months without getting elected to the Assembly, he cannot be reappointed as minister during the same term of the House. The son of the assassinated Punjab Chief Minister Beant Singh became a minister without being elected to the Assembly for six months and then resigned and again became a minister in 1995-96. The case brought the spotlight back on Jayalalithaa as she had managed to pull off another term as the Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu despite having been disqualified to contest elections. Ms. Banerjee, thus, has three more months to get elected as an MLA to continue in the Chief Minister's chair.

No Upper House in West Bengal

If Ms. Banerjee is forced to resign, the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) will likely take the moral high ground by remarking that the Trinamool appointed a leader who didn't win the election as Chief Minister when the BJP itself has faced similar situations. In 2017, the BIP appointed Manohar Parrikar as the Chief Minister of Goa, who was then the Union Defence Minister, when Laxmikant Parsekar lost his Assembly seat. In 2014, the BJP's Chief Minister front-runner, Arjun Munda, lost the election while his party won in the State. The party appointed Raghubar Das as the Chief Minister of Jharkhand. When Yogi Adityanath became the Chief Minister of Uttar Pradesh in 2017, he was not a member of the U.P. Assembly. He was elected an MLC within six months of taking oath as Chief Minister. Both his deputies, Dinesh Sharma and Keshav Prasad Maurya, entered the political foray through the Upper House along with him within six months. Uddhav Thackeray opted for the same route in 2019 in Maharashtra. But this route is not available to Ms. Baneriee as West Bengal has no Upper House. Though the Trinamool has passed a resolution for the Upper House to be reinstated in West Bengal, this seems unlikely to fructify because it also requires the approval of both Houses of Parliament. Both Rajasthan and Assam also passed resolutions in their Assemblies, in 2012 and 2010, respectively, for the same, but these resolutions are pending in the Rajya Sabha. West Bengal faces uncertainty and possibly a political crisis.

A circular economy for plastic

The India Plastics Pact will benefit society, the economy and the environment

The Confederation of Indian Industry (CII) has long been at the forefront of addressing issues challenging the well-being of society. Of the many sustainability challenges that impact societies, climate change and plastic waste have a special significance. A 2019 report by the Center for International Environmental Law suggests that by 2050, greenhouse gas emissions from plastic could reach over 56 gigatonnes, 10-13% of the remaining carbon budget. However, viewed from the angle of livelihoods, postconsumer segregation, collection and disposal of plastics make up about half of the income of 1.5-4 million waste-pickers in India.

A 2021 report commissioned by Google, Closing the Plastics Circularity Gap, suggests that unless largescale global interventions are made, "we should expect to mismanage more than 7.7 billion metric tonnes of plastic waste globally over the next 20 years... [which is] equivalent to 16times the weight of the human population..." Among the many applications of plastic, plastic packaging is the largest.

The solution

For India, the solution must be multipronged, systemic, and large scale, to create a visible impact. The Plastics Pacts model offers such a solution and is active in a number of countries including the U.K., South Africa, and Australia. It is now being brought to India by CII and WWF India.

The Plastics Pacts are business-led initiatives and transform the plastics packaging value chain for all formats and products. The Pacts bring together everyone from across the plastics value chain to implement practical solutions. All Pacts unite behind four targets: to eliminate unnecessary and problematic plastic packaging through redesign and innovation; to ensure all plastic packaging is reusable or recyclable; to increase the reuse, collection, and recycling of plastic packaging; and to increase recycled content in plastic packaging.

The India Plastics Pact, the first in

at the CII Annual Sustainability Summit. It can be expected to boost demand for recycled content, investments in recycling infrastructure, iobs in the waste sector, and beyond. The first Plastics Pact was launched in the U.K. in 2018, by WRAP, a global NGO based in the U.K., in partnership with the Ellen MacArthur Foundation. The U.K. Pact helped channel over £120 million worth of investments in recycling infrastructure resulting in 300,000 tonnes of new recycling capacity. The Pact will support the Extended Producer Responsibility framework of the government and improve solid waste management as envisioned in the Swachh Bharat Abhiyan. Integral to the Pact's framework is the involvement of the informal waste sector crucial to postconsumer segregation, collection and processing of plastic waste. The India Plastics Pact is supported by WRAP, which supports many Pacts globally. This association will ensure access to expertise and knowledge

from different Pacts worldwide.

The India Plastics Pact focuses on solutions and innovation. Members' accountability is ensured through ambitious targets and annual data reporting. The Pact will develop a road map for guidance, form action groups composed of members, and initiate innovation projects. While the India Plastics Pact will be active in India, it will link globally with other Plastics Pacts. Many Indian businesses and organisations have expressed an interest in signing up to the Pact. Deeper and long-lasting benefits will be felt across the supply chains of these businesses, most of which comprise MSMEs. The Pact will encourage development and maturing of the entire plastics production and management ecosystem. Apart from benefits to society and economy, delivering the targets will drive circularity of plastics and help tackle pollution. They will lead to significant reduction in greenhouse gas emissions.







FIFTY YEARS AGO AUGUST 10, 1971

Indo-Soviet Defence Treaty signed

India and the Soviet Union to-day [New Delhi, August 9] signed a 20-year treaty of peace, friendship and co-operation which offers credible assurances to India of Soviet assistance in the event of an attack by China or Pakistan. The historic treaty provides that if either country is attacked - or threatened with an attack – the two contracting parties will immediately enter into mutual consultations to take "appropriate effective measures" to remove such threat and ensure their peace and security. The treaty does not specifically mention China or Pakistan but the wording of the mutual assistance provisions and the context in which it has been signed make it abundantly clear that it is directed against them. And it has been made equally clear to the United States that this virtual Indo-Soviet alliance is the direct consequence of its overtures to China and support to Pakistan. India and the Soviet Union have an understanding under this treaty to abstain from providing any assistance to any third country that engages in armed conflict with either of them. They will not also enter into or participate in any military alliance directed against each other.

Dr. Tagore's message

The message delivered by Dr. Tagore in his lectures (said Mr. Bomanji) was one of harmony and peace. He strove to show that the Indian way of life, thought, and religion was not one of war. The materialistic civilisation of the West had found its fruition in militarism and imperialism – both radically the same; but what the war-worn world now needed was the spirituality and mysticism of the East, which could alone give lasting peace. The peace of the West was no real peace. As expressed in the Treaty of Versailles it was not worth the paper written on. To rise superior to the nationalism of the West, which was barbarism and cannibalism, the peoples must find spiritual unity with Nature and with the life of God in all humanity. Hitherto the West had gone to the East merely to exploit its material resources; whereas Dr. Tagore now invited the West to send its foremost minds to the East to acquire all that was best there of Eastern culture, and in return to offer all the intellectual fruits of the West.

IPCC forecasts a future of severe weather

In the most ambitious emissions pathway, the projection is that the globe would reach the 1.5 degrees Celsius scenario in the 2030s, overshoot to 1.6 degrees Celsius, with temperatures dropping back down to 1.4 degrees Celsius at the end of the century. India has not yet committed to a net zero timeline.

The Sixth Assessment Report has been finalised and approved by 234 authors and 195 governments and updates the scientific consensus on extreme weather, human attribution, the carbon budget, feedback cycles, and charts the future state of the climate since the Fifth Assessment Report of 2014. The 3,000-plus-page report said warming is already accelerating sea level rise and worsening extremes such as heatwaves, droughts, floods and storms.

Tropical cyclones Tropical cyclones are get-

ting stronger and wetter, while Arctic Sea ice is dwindling in the summerand permafrost is thawing. All these trends will get worse, the report said.

India is currently the world's third largest greenhouse gas emitter, but per capita emissions are much lower. The U.S. emitted nearly nine times more greenhouse gases per capita than India in 2018. Based on existing commitments by countries to curb their emission, the world is on track for global temperature warming by at least 2.7°C by 2100, predicts the report, calling it 'Code red for humanity'.

The latest scientific as-

sessment will influence discussions on the Conference of Parties meeting in Glasgow later this year where countries are expected to announce plans and steps they have taken to curb emissions. The report release follows a two-week long plenary session held virtually from July 26 to August 6, 2021, in which the report was scrutinized line-by-line for approval by government representatives in dialogue with report authors.

Hot extremes

Alok Sharma, COP26 President, said in a statement: "The science is clear. The impacts of the climate crisis can be seen around the world and if we don't act now, we will continue to see the worst effects impact lives, livelihoods and natural habitats. Our message to every country, government, business and part of society is simple. The next decade is decisive, follow the science and embrace your responsibility to keep the goal of 1.5C alive. We can do this together, by coming forward with ambitious 2030 emission reduction targets and long-term strategies with a pathway to net zero."

"Developed Countries have usurped far more than their fair share of the global carbon budget. Reaching net zero alone is not enough, as it is the cumulative emissions up to net zero that determine the temperature that is reached. This has been amply borne out in the IPCC report. Glaciers will keep shrinking: IPCC report

'Fall in snow cover in Hindu Kush Himalayan region'

Glaciers in the Hindu Kush Himalayan (HKH) region will keep shrinking and the snow cover will retreat to higher altitudes, the latest IPCC report said on Monday.

The Sixth Assessment Report (AR6) of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), approved by member-countries, warned that extreme precipitation is projected to increase in major mountainous regions with potential cascading consequences of floods, landslides and lake outbursts in all scenarios.

One of the authors of the report, Krishna Achuta Rao, said that in the HKH region, the snow cover had reduced

since the early 21st century and glaciers had thinned, retreated and lost mass since the 1970s. However, he said, the Karakoram glaciers had either slightly gained mass or were in an approximately balanced state.

"Snow-covered areas and snow volumes will decrease during the 21st century, snowline elevations will rise and glacier mass is likely to decline with greater mass loss in higher greenhouse gas emission scenarios. Rising temperatures and precipitation can increase the occurrence of glacial lake outburst floods and land-

Nirav Modi can appeal, says U.K. High Court

Judge refers to 'risk of suicide'

A U.K. High Court judge here on Monday granted fugitive diamond merchant Nirav Modi permission to appeal against a magistrates' court order, in favour of extradition to India to face charges of fraud and money laundering before the Indian courts, on mental health and human rights grounds.

Justice Martin Chamberlain delivered his verdict remotely under COVID-19 rules concluding that the arguments presented by the diamond merchant's legal team concerning his "severe depression" and "high risk of suicide" were arguable at a hearing.

"At this stage, the question for me is simply whether the appellant's case on these grounds is reasonably arguable. In my judgment, it is. I will grant permission to appeal on Grounds 3 and 4,"

the ruling notes.

Grounds 3 and 4 relate to Article 3 of the European Convention of Human Rights (ECHR), or the right to life, liberty and security, and Section 91 of the U.K.'s Criminal Justice Act 2003 related to fitness to plead.

The judge notes an overlap between both grounds as they both rely principally on the appellant Mr. Nirav Modi's mental ill health. "I will not restrict the ba-

sis on which those grounds can be argued, though it seems to me that there should be a particular focus on whether the judge was wrong to reach the conclusion he did, given the evidence as to the severity of the appellant's [Nirav Modi's] depression, the high risk of suicide and the adequacy of any measures capable of preventing successful suicide attempts in Arthur Road prison," the

PM sets out framework for maritime security

Prime Minister Modi outlined a five-principle framework for the debate. The first was removing barriers to maritime trade. In this context, Mr. Modi highlighted SAGAR ('Security and Growth for all in the Region') - a 2015 Indian framework for regional maritime

security. Second, Mr. Modi said, maritime disputes "should be resolved peacefully and in accordance with international law," adding that this was "extremely important for promoting mutual trust and confidence, and ensurpeace and stability",

"It was with this understanding, and maturity, that India resolved its maritime boundary with its neighbour Bangladesh," Prime Minister said.

Mr. Modi underlining the need for maritime disputes to be resolved peacefully is presumably aimed at China's actions in the South China Sea, where it has militarised islands and unilaterally enforced its claims over disputed waters.

The third principle Mr. Modi proposed at Monday's debate was that countries jointly tackle maritime threats from non-state actors and natural disasters.

Fourth, he said the maritime environment and marine resources needed to be conserved, highlighting pollution from plastic waste and oil spills.

Fifth, Mr. Modi called for responsible maritime connectivity, saying a structure was required to boost maritime trade, with the development of global norms

and standards. External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar chaired the meeting after Mr. Modi.

Blinken-Putin spat

Mr. Putin was the only Head of State/ Government of the Permanent-5 members of the UNSC who participated in the discussion.

"Russia has always played an important role in global maritime security. It is an important player in global security, safety and prosperity," Mr. Modi said after Mr. Putin's remarks.

'Curbs on beef, encouraging smaller families are for promoting social harmony'

Measures taken by his government to restrict beef sale and consumption, encourage smaller families among Muslims, and protect indigenous faiths and culture in Assam were meant to promote social harmony, says Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma, rejecting suggestions that they were advancing Hindutva politics.

"I am talking from a different perspective... Not the rightist connotations that are being alleged...When I am talking of protecting indigenous culture, I am talking of the impact, not only of conversions but also of Sanskritisation... Koran, Vedas or Bible... whatever it may be...We have to ensure that the traditional cultures do not get erased," Mr. Sarma told The Hindu in an exclusive interview.

Tribals in Rajasthan seek more panchayats in scheduled areas

This will facilitate control over minerals, forest produce

The tribal outfits in Rajasthan have demanded inclusion of over 165 village panchayats of seven districts in the scheduled areas under the Tribal Sub-Plan (TSP) to facilitate the control of local communities over minor minerals and minor forest produce as well as development activities in the region. It will also ensure statutory protection of the tribal population.

On the occasion of the International Day of the World's Indigenous Peoples on Monday, the tribal groups said the population of Scheduled Tribes in these panchayats had crossed 50%, making them eligible to be declared as scheduled areas. Consequently, the provisions of the Panchayats (Extension to Scheduled Areas) Act, 1996, will apply to these areas.

The scheduled areas at present comprise 5,697 villages in southern Rajasthan, having a tribal population of more than 50%, as notified in 2018. As per the 2011 Census, the total population of

scheduled areas was 64.63 lakh, in which the tribals were 45.57 lakh, making up 70.43% of the population.

Separate State

The tribal groups have also been spearheading a movement for creation of a separate State, Bhil Pradesh, to be carved out of the tribaldominated areas of Rajasthan, Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh and Maharashtra. The issue has gained strength after the victory of two Bharatiya Tribal Party (BTP) candidates in Dungarpur district in the 2018 State Assembly election.

In addition to the BTP, the tribal groups also submitted memorandums addressed to the President on this subject in several districts in the four States last month. BTP State president Velaram Ghogra said the tribals were not getting full benefit of reservation in the TSP areas despite forming the majority. "The government should stop its drive to bring the tribals to the so-called mainstream, because they are living in harmony with nature and taking care of precious natural resources," he said.

Former civil servant Satyanaryan Singh, who earlier served as the TSP Director, told The Hindu that the demand for creation of Bhil Pradesh was not practicable. "The allocation of funds and implementation of development programmes in the TSP areas have benefited tribals," he said.

The demand is also apparently linked with political developments last year, when the BTP withdrew its support to the ruling Congress over the latter allegedly blocking the election of a BTP-backed independent candidate to the post of Zila Pramukh in Dungarpur during the panchayat elections.

As an ally of the ruling party, the BTP had voted for the Congress' candidates in the Rajya Sabha elections held in June last year and backed Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot during the subsequent political turmoil. BTP MLAs Rajkumar Roat and Ram Prasad supported the Congress during the confidence vote on the floor of the State Assembly on August 14,

LS passes three Bills in 20 minutes

Opposition members question government's commitment to democratic norms

The Lok Sabha on Monday passed three Bills in 20 minutes as disruption by Opposition members over the Pegasus snooping controversy and the farms continued into the last week of the monsoon session of Parliament.

The Bill seeks to restore the power of State governments to identify Other Backward Classes (OBC) that are socially and economically backward after the Supreme Court, in a May 2021 order, had empowered only

the Centre for such identification.

The amendment has been necessitated after the Supreme Court in its Maratha reservation ruling upheld the 102nd Constitutional Amendment Act that inserted Articles 338B and Article 342A (with two clauses) after

Parliament passes Bills on tribunal reforms, taxation

Bill to set up new Central university in Ladakh also cleared

Parliament on Monday cleared three Bills to abolish several appellate tribunals, to end retrospective tax on indirect transfer of Indian assets, and create a new Central university in Ladakh. The three Bills were cleared by the Rajya Sabha, having been passed by the Lok Sabha earlier in the ongoing Monsoon Session of Parliament.

The first of the three Bills to be cleared, the Tribunals Reforms (Rationalisation and Conditions of Service) Bill, 2021, will replace an ordinance. During the discussion on the Bill, Biju Janata Dal's Sujeet Kumar, who was the first speaker, said that the legislation would help in removing an extra layer of adjudication. He, however, pointed out that there were still some key flaws in the Bill, including the fact that short tenures of the mem-



bers would ensure executive hold on the tribunals. Also age criterion set in the Bill was meaningless. "If you can become a High Court Judge at 40 years, it is not logical that to be a member of tribunals as per the Bill you have to be 50 years old," he said.

The Opposition utilised the opportunity to speak on the Bill to raise the Pegasus cyber attack issue. DMK MP N.R Elango said, "I oppose the Bill. The government wants to remove certain tribunals, which will increase the burden of the High

CPI(M) plans age limit for Central Committee

Party congress has to endorse it

In a bid to revamp its ageing leadership, the Central Committee of the Communist Party of India (Marxist) has decided to set a retirement age of 75 for all its members. Once the proposal is en-

dorsed at the party's 23rd Congress, scheduled to be held in Kannur, Kerala in April 2022, the age limit will become applicable.

The Central Committee is the highest decision-making body of the party which, in turn, elects the Polit Bureau (PB) from its members.

"Our decision is that those who have crossed 75 years will be relieved from the Central Committee. The State Committee normally has a lower age ceiling but we have left it to them to decide it," party general secretary Sitaram Yechury said at a press conference on the conclusion of the Central Committee meeting from August 6 to 8.

A few exceptions

If the rule is scrupulously applied, then 76-year-old Kerala Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan who is also a member of the Polit Bureau, will have to step down.

"Last time also, we made exceptions for certain people. The party will decide for those holding key positions. But in principle, the decision is to fix 75 years as the retirement age," Mr. Yechury added. An exception was made

in 2018 Party Congress for Polit Bureau member S. Ramachandran Pillai. The retirement age was 80. But Mr. Pillai, who was 81 at that time, was retained. In the current 17-member Polit Bureau, Mr. Ramachandran is the oldest member and 64year old Mohammed Salim and Nilotpal Basu are the youngest.

First step

The first step towards reducing the average age of members in the decision-making bodies was taken by the West Bengal State Committee. Currently, the State Committee has decided not to induct any member over the age of 60.

The age-ceiling will be applied in a two pronged way. First, the retirement age will be fixed at 75 for members in all the CPI(M)'s bodies including the Polit Bureau; second no new member above a certain age will be inducted in any of these forums.

Foreign nationals can now get vaccinated in India

Foreign nationals residing in India have been allowed to register on the Co-Win portal to take COVID-19 vaccines. The Health Ministry has said foreign nationals can use their passport as an identity document to register. "A significant number of foreign nationals are living in India. especially in metropolitan areas. In these areas, the potential of spread of COVID-19 is high due to higher population density. To counter any possibility of such occurrence, it is important to vaccinate all eligible persons," the Ministry said in a release.

Defence Ministry reports on border crossings

Since the military coup in Myanmar on February 1, 2021, 8,486 people crossed over into India from across the border and out of this, 5,796 were sent back, the government informed Parliament on Monday. With regard to the Pakistan border. the Defence Ministry said that there were 33 infiltration attempts this year till June 30. There were no cases of infiltration reported along the border with China this year. Minister of State for Defence Ajay Bhatt said in a written reply in the Rajya Sabha.

Indian Army to take part in **International Army Games**

A 101-member contingent of the Army will participate in the International Army Games 2021 in Russia from August 22 to September 4. "The Army contingent has been selected out of the best from various arms after three levels of screening. Participation in these annual games is a reflection of the level of professionalism of the Indian Army amongst the world Armies," the Army said in a statement on Monday. In the 7th edition of the games this year, more than 280 teams from 42 countries would

Court says its intervention in the matter may fuel hesitancy among people to take the jabs

A judicial order to publish data on clinical trials of CO-VID-19 vaccines and post vaccination side effects may feed vaccine hesitancy amid the pandemic, the Supreme Court said on Monday.

"Do you really think this is in the larger public interest? Fifty crore people have been vaccinated... By asking us to launch an enquiry now, are you not throwing doubts into the minds of people about the vaccines," Justice L. Nageswara Rao asked advocate Prashant Bhushan.

"But if you don't have transparency, there is more reason for vaccine hesitancy," Mr. Bhushan replied.

The court also voiced scepticism about Mr. Bhushan's criticism of the government's "coercive vaccine mandates", which banned the unvaccinated from public spaces, offices, shops

At one point, when Mr. Bhushan said thousands of deaths had been reported around the world due to the vaccines' side effects, Justice Rao pointed to how the vaccines may have saved lakhs of lives.

Mr. Bhushan said it was the first time in history that vaccines were granted Emergency Use Authorisation by the Drugs Controller General of India (DCGI). The authorities were required to publish the clinical trials' data under

the Declaration of Helsinki, recognised by India, and rules of the World Health Organization (WHO), submitted.

Justice Rao said, "You say that this [rolling out vaccines without publishing data of clinical trials] has never happened before. But we had not had a pandemic like this for 100 years... We have to balance the immediate need to give the vaccines with the potential risk."

Mr. Bhushan observed, "But experts need to see the data... Why keep it under a shroud? I am not saying they stop the vaccination. I am only urging them to be transparent. People have the right to be informed".

Court seeks information in 2 weeks

The Supreme Court on Monday gave the government two weeks to submit a report detailing the action taken to comply with the recommendations of the court-appointed National Task Force (NTF) to augment, secure and streamline the manufacture, allocation and supply of medical oxygen to the States and the Union Territories fighting the COVID-19 pandemic.

A Bench of Justices D.Y. Chandrachud and M.R. Shah directed the government to also place on record the report of the 12-member NTF along with its action taken report. Justice Chandrachud said, "The NTF consists of eminent doctors... The Union of India has to assure that recommendations have been acted upon at an enhanced level for the future..."

The NTF was formed by the court during the peak days of the second wave of the pandemic to ensure the "effective and transparent" allocation of liquid medical oxygen on a "scientific, rational and equitable basis". The court had expressed its dissatisfaction Centre's earlier "oxygen for bed" formula. This "rough and ready" arrangement, as the court put it then, was based on calculating the allotment of oxygen based on the number of ICU/non-ICU beds.

The court had reasoned that the formula did not take into consideration the fact that many COVID-19 patients in dire need of oxygen do not get beds or were confined in home care.

The NTF was "drawn of renowned national experts with diverse experience in health institutions" to function within the Central government apparatus in order to mould a public health response to the pandemic, based on scientific and specialised domain knowledge.



All hospitals should have a buffer oxygen capacity for emergencies, the task force's report said.

Justice Chandrachud had said that the ambit of its recommendations should go beyond cobbling together ad hoc solutions and lay the foundation for the future in the face of public health crisis.

In June, the NTF had come out with a report, focussing on the urgent need to make all 18 metro cities in the country oxygen-independent, with at least 100 MT storage in the city itself. It had recommended adopting a strategy to manufacture oxygen locally or in the neighbourhood of big cities to fullfil at least 50% of their Liquid Medical Oxygen (LMO) demand as road transportation is vulnerable. "This may be taken up in respect of Delhi and Mumbai on priority, due to their population density," it had stated.







The Vedas are timeless, with no specific author. The Vedas are profound, and cannot be easily understood. The help of a learned preceptor is needed to help one comprehend the full implication of any Vedic passage. There is a famous sloka, which says itihasa puranabhyam vedam samupabrmhayet. That means that one must study the Itihasas and Puranas, in addition to the Vedas. The reason is to enable a correct interpretation of the Vedas, said M.A. Venkatakrish-

Of the two, Itihasas are given more importance, which is why they are mentioned first. Actually, there is a Paninian sutra, which says when two words are being enunciated, the one with fewer letters must come first. In the case of Itihasa and Purana, the word 'Purana' has fewer letters. And yet Itihasa is used first. It may seem as if the Paninian rule is being flouted here, but it is not so. Panini maharishi also said that when two things are being spoken of, that which is superior must come first. So, when viewed in terms of this rule, it is only proper that Itihasa should precede Purana in a sloka.

But why are Itihasas superior to Puranas? Itihasa simply means that what happened was being reported. It is an account of something that took place at the very time when it took place. Itihasa means "This is what happened." So, the chance of interpolations or additions are not there in the case of Itihasas. We have two Itihasas in Sanskrit - Ramayana and Mahabharata. Purana is the narration of something that happened long ago, and so the chance of some inaccuracies in presentation is possible. Puraa means "long back." Purana means an account of long past events, which, however, seem to the listener or reader as if they are something relevant in the present.



The Taliban took control of of two more provincial capitals in Afghanistan on Monday, an official said. Their fall marked the latest development in a weeks-long, relentless Taliban offensive as American and NATO forces finalize their pullout from the war-torn country

militants ramped up their push across much of Afghanistan, turning their guns on provincial capitals after taking large swaths of land in the mostly rural countryside. At the same time, they have been waging an assassination campaign targeting senior government officials in the capital, Kabul.

The sweep comes despite condemnations by the international community and warnings from the UN that a military victory and takeover by the Taliban would not be recognised. The Taliban have also not heeded appeals to return to the negotiating table and continue long-stalled peace talks with the Afghan government.

After billions of dollars spent in aiding, training and shoring up Afghan forces, many are at odds how to explain the Taliban blitz that has threatened – and by now taken - several of the country's 34 provincial capitals.

Mr. Rahmani said the provincial capital had been under siege by the militants for weeks, with no reinforcements being sent to the overstretched Afghan forces.

Can't delay ambitious climate action any longer: Blinken

A bombshell climate science report "must sound a death knell" for coal, oil and gas, United Nations Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said on Monday, warning that fossil fuels were destroying the planet.

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change concluded that the 1.5 degrees Celsius temperature goal of the Paris Agreement would likely be breached around 2030 - a decade earlier than it itself projected just three years ago.

"This report must sound a death knell for coal and fossil fuels, before they destroy our planet," Mr. Guterres said in a statement.

World leaders, green groups and influencers reacted on Monday to the "terrifying" UN climate science report with a mix of horror and hopefulness as the scale of the emergency dawned on many.

"This moment requires

world leaders, the private sector and individuals to act together with urgency and do everything it takes to protect our planet," U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken said in a statement.

"We cannot delay ambitious climate action any longer," he added.

U.S. Presidential envoy on climate John Kerry said the IPCC report showed "the climate crisis is not only here, it is growing increasingly

'It's not too late'

Frans Timmermans, the European Union's deputy climate chief said the report showed "it's not too late to stem the tide and prevent runaway climate change".

Britain's Boris Johnson, whose government is hosting a crucial climate summit in November, said the assessment "makes for sobering reading".

"I hope today's IPCC report will be a wake-up call for the world to take action now, before we meet in Glasgow in November for the critical COP26 summit," he said.

Former Maldives President Mohamed Nasheed said the 3,500-page assessment confirmed that climate vulnerable nations were "on the edge of extinction".

French President Emmanuel Macron called for a deal at the Glasgow conference. "The time for outrage is behind us... In November, in Glasgow, let's seal a deal that matches the urgency," he wrote on Twitter.

Climate wunderkind Greta Thunberg said the report was a "solid (but cautious) summary" of the state of the planet. "It doesn't tell us what to do," she said on Twitter. "It is up to us to be brave and take decisions based on the scientific evidence provided in these reports. We can still avoid the worst consequences, but not if we continue like today, and not without treating the

Ex-Cuomo aide details groping allegations

She told CBS News: "The governor needs to be held accountable... What he did to me was a crime. He broke the law.'

Catholic priest murdered in France by suspected arsonist

He walks into a police station and confesses the crime

A Rwandan refugee suspected of causing a major fire that ravaged the cathedral in the French city of Nantes last year murdered a Catholic priest in western France on Monday, the Interior Minister and a source close to the investigation said.

"All my support for the Catholics of our country after the dramatic murder of a priest in the Vendee region," Interior Minister Gerald Darmanin wrote on Twitter.

A source close to the investigation, who asked not to be named, said a man had earlier gone to police in the town of Mortagne-sur-Sevre

and declared he had killed a priest. The man was already under judicial control over the fire at Nantes cathedral in July 2020, the source added.

The source added that the priest, aged 60, had been welcoming the man into his church for several months.

Cathedral fire

The man, named as Emmanuel A. has confessed to being behind the fire at the Gothic Nantes cathedral that horrified France on July 18,

He had initially been placed under arrest before being freed under judicial

Far-right leader Marine Le Pen, who accuses the government of being weak on immigration, sought to seize on the incident, saying that in France "you can be an illegal migrant, set fire to a cathedral, not be expelled and then reoffend by murdering a priest".

Mr. Darmanin immediately accused her of "making a polemic without knowing the facts", saying the man could not be expelled from France so long as he was under judicial control.

Immigration is set to be a major issue when Ms. Le Pen challenges centrist President Emmanuel Macron for the presidency next year.

Opposition was plotting coup: Lukashenko

He slams rivals on the first anniversary of election that triggered massive protests

Belarus's authoritarian leader on Monday charged that the Opposition was plotting a coup in the run-up to last year's presidential election that triggered a months-long wave of mass protests demanding his resignation.

President Alexander Lukashenko held his annual press conference on the oneyear anniversary of the vote that handed him a sixth term in office but was denounced by the Opposition and the West as rigged.

In his opening remarks, Mr. Lukashenko defended the election and accused the opposition of preparing a

Belarusian authorities responded to the protests with a relentless crackdown that saw more than 35,000 people arrested and thousands beaten by police. Leading opposition figures have been jailed or forced to leave the country.

'It's in everyone's interests that India take its rightful place'

Australian special envoy and former Prime Minister Tony Abbott said a free trade agreement between his nation and India would signal the "democratic world's tilt away from China." Mr. Abbott visited New

Delhi last week as Australia's special trade envoy for India as the Australian government gives priority to sealing a bilateral trade deal. In an opinion piece likely

to anger Beijing that that was published in *The Australian* newspaper on Monday, Mr. Abbott said the "answer to almost every question about China is India."

"With the world's other emerging superpower becoming more belligerent almost by the day, it's in eve-

ryone's interests that India take its rightful place among the nations as quickly as possible," Mr. Abbott wrote.

"Because trade deals are about politics as much as economics, a swift deal between India and Australia would be an important sign of the democratic world's tilt away from China, as well as boosting the long-term prosperity of both our countries," Mr. Abbott added.

Mr. Abbott was Prime Minister when China and Australia finalised a bilateral free trade deal which took effect in 2015. He also hosted a state visit by Chinese President Xi Jinping a year earlier.

Relations have since soured over issues, including Australia banning Chinese telecom giant Huawei from major communications infrastructure projects, outlawing covert foreign interference in Australian politics and calling for an independent investigation into the origins of the COVID-19

Economic activity nears level seen pre-pandemic: Nomura

'Prospect of surge in people mobility triggering third wave is a key risk'

India's economic activity reached its highest level, in the first week of August, since the onset of the CO-VID-19 pandemic last year, as per a business resumption

The Nomura India Business Resumption Index (NI-BRI) rose to a record high of 99.4 for the week ended August 8, from 94.0 in the previous week, near the prepandemic level of 100, and surpassing the pre-second wave peak of 99.3 in February 2021. The Nomura index is compiled using mobility data from Google and Apple, power demand and the labour force participation

rate, with February 2020 as the base. While the latest index estimate suggests a swifter-than-expected recovery from the second wave continues, Nomura said the prospect of a surge in mobility triggering a third wave is the

key risk to be monitored.

"After briefly plateauing, mobility picked up sharply, with Google workplace, retail & recreation and Apple driving index rising... Power demand also rose 5.3% week on week, after contracting for three consecutive weeks, while the labour participation rate rose to 41.5% from 39.8% previously, pushing up the unemployment rate to 8.1%," the firm noted.

Varied impact'

While COVID-19 cases remain flat at about 40,000 per day, Nomura economists Sonal Varma and Aurodeep Nandi noted that there are State-wide divergences on the sero-prevalence rate, infection cases, vaccinations and the lockdown situation.

"Some States are doubling down on restrictions (like Karnataka and Tamil Nadu), while others like Maharashtra are easing further," they pointed out.

MRF net leaps to ₹161 crore as sales climb

'India mulls sharp cuts in EV levies after Tesla push'

'May lower import duty to 40-60%'

India is considering slashing import duties on electric cars to as low as 40%, two senior government officials told Reuters, days after Tesla Inc's appeals for a cut polarised the country's auto industry. For imported electric

vehicles (EVs) with a value of less than \$40,000 including the car's cost, insurance and freight, the government is discussing slashing the tax rate to 40% from 60% presently, the officials told Reuters. For electric vehicles valued at more than \$40,000, the government is looking at cutting the rate to 60% from 100%, they said.

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LIC turns out to be a drag on life insurers' July show

Pvt. firms' first-year premium rises 8%

First year premium of life insurers stood at ₹20,434.72

crore in July, or 11% lower compared with the year-earlier period. Market leader Life Insu-

rance Corporation of India (LIC) weighed heavily on the overall performance with a 20.7% decline in first-year premium to ₹12,030.93 crore, the new business statement of the 24 life insurers released by insurance regulator IRDAI showed.

Private insurers together managed a 7.53% increase in first-year premium to ₹8,403.79 crore despite four of them reporting a decline in the new business.

For the four months ended July, a period marked by the second wave of the pan-



trictions, life insurers' firstvear-premium was 1.16% higher at ₹73,159.98 crore. However, they are yet to

report a year-on-year increase consecutively for two months this fiscal. In April, the first year premium mobilised was 44.76% higher at ₹9,738.79 crore while for May it declined 5.55% to ₹12,976.99 crore, only to register a 3.95% increase to ₹30,009.48 crore in June.



India breaks new ground, rekindles hope


Neeraj's historic launch of the javelin and men's hockey team's bronze struck an emotional chord

With an almighty heave, Neeraj Chopra made history. His 87.58m throw in the men's javelin event gave independent India her first Olympic medal in track and field.

Chopra's gold also ensured India's highest-ever medal tally at the Games (seven total), one better than the previous best achieved at London 2012.

No Olympic sport captures the imagination of the nation quite like hockey. Nationalistic fervour reigned when the men's team defeated Germany to win bronze – India's first hockey medal since V. Baskaran's men clinched gold in Moscow 1980. The women nearly made it a perfect outing, before suffering heartbreak at the hands of Great Britain in the third-place playoff match.

Mirabai Chanu provided the ideal start to the campaign, winning a weightlifting silver on the opening day. It was sweet redemption for the Manipuri athlete, who finished a bitterly disappointing 11th at Rio 2016.

Boxer Lovlina Borgohain may have entered Tokyo in the shadow of her illustrious compatriot Mary Kom, but her bronze finish thrust her into the spotlight. The 23-year-old from Assam already has her sights set on gold at Paris 2024.

P.V. Sindhu cemented her place among India's greatest ever athletes by winning her second Olympic medal. Her bronze at Tokyo made her only the second Indian, after wrestler Sushil Kumar, to medal twice in individual events. The badminton boom in India is set to continue.

Ravi Kumar Dahiya's epic comeback win against Nurislam Sanayev in the men's 57kg wrestling semifinal was one for the ages. Trailing 2-9 with just 90 seconds left, Dahiya closed the gap to 5-9 be-

fore pinning his Kazakh opponent to seal a dramatic win. Dahiya, who lost the final to two-time world champion Zavur Uguev, became the second Indian wrestler to win an Olympic silver after Sushil.

If Dahiya needed to dig deep, Bajrang Punia's 8-0 victory over Daulet Niyazbekov in the men's 65kg wrestling bronze medal playoff was a one-sided masterclass. India's proud record in the sport, kindled by K.D. Jadhav's bronze in Helsinki 1952, remained intact.

Aditi Ashok came close to pulling off the impossible, finishing just outside the medal

bracket in the women's golf tournament. A consistent Aditi started the final round in second spot, but a few missed putts and outstanding final flourishes from her rivals robbed her of the chance to gain India's first ever Olympic

Much was expected from the strong shooting contingent, led by Manu Bhaker and Saurabh Chaudhary. The group, however, returned empty-handed. These are worrying times for the National Rifle Association of India (NRAI), which had faced criticism when the shooters similarly drew a blank at Rio

India's Tokyo medallists felicitated by Sports Ministry

Olympic gold medallist javelin thrower Neeraj Chopra conveyed an important message to all athletes as he recalled his sterling performance in Tokyo. "Give your 100% and don't fear anyone," said Neeraj at the felicitation function organised by the Union Sports Ministry here on Monday.

The function, scheduled to be held at the Major Dhyan Chand National Stadium, had to be shifted to a hotel owing to wet weather conditions.

The golden boy Neeraj said he knew that his second attempt in the final was a "special throw" and that's why he celebrated immediately after it. The 87.58m effort eventually won him the gold. "I felt the effort in my shoulder and elbow next morning," he said cheerfully.

When Union Sports Minister Anurag Thakur asked Neeraj about the hardships faced by young athletes, he said that the shortcomings faced by the athletes made them more determined to achieve their goal and become an inspiration.

Former Sports Minister Kiren Rijiju made an emotional speech, praising the women's hockey players for making the whole country cry with them. "You played great, you won hearts," he

Rijiju was equally proud about India winning seven medals in six disciplines, emphasising that there was no event bigger than the Olympics for the whole world. He was happy that Neeraj had dedicated his medal to Milkha Singh.

India's men's hockey goalkeeper P.R. Sreejesh diverted the praise showered on him to the women's hockey goalkeeper Savita Punia.

Wrestling silver medallist
Ravi Dahiya said he was inspired by the deeds of Sushil
Kumar and Yogeshwar Dutt,
and wanted to perform like
them. Hockey captain Manpreet Singh acknowledged
the overwhelming support
of the Sports Authority of In-

dia (SAI) and the government, stressing that the entire team was like an extended family.

extended family.

"We will get back together soon, as we have the Asian Games and Commonwealth Games next year. We will focus on them," Manpreet

said.

Lovlina Borgohain, who won bronze, said she was "feeling very good after coming home." The boxer assured that her focus would stay on winning the gold in

the Paris Games in 2024.
Weighlifting silver medallist Mirabai Chanu and badminton star P.V. Sindhu had earlier arrived to a rousing reception.

Many firsts

Thakur said that the Tokyo Olympics witnessed many firsts for India and assured that the government would work with the federations to help the Indians shine more in the next two editions in 2024 and 2028.

Nisith Pramanik, Union Minister of State for sport, was also present.

Is Neeraj's gold India's greatest triumph across sports?

Worlds' bronze medallist Anju says yes, gold-winning captain Baskaran feels it is unfair to compare

Anju Bobby George believes Neeraj Chopra's Olympic gold is the country's greatest triumph across sports.

"This is the best triumph across all sports because athletics is the centrepiece event. We can compare athletics medals with something like World Cup football medals, otherwise there is no comparison between an athletics medal and any other medal," said the 2003 World championships long jump bronze medallist in a chat with *The Hindu* on Sunday.

"We are competing with multiple opponents, from more than 200 countries. It's a common sport, anybody can compete in this. So, the competition will be that much higher."

Great hockey record

India has had a magnificent record in hockey at the Olympics, winning eight golds including a hat-trick of triumphs in 1928, 1932 and 1936 a phase when Dhyan Chand mesmerised the world.

Then there had been a semifinal entry in football at the 1956 Melbourne Olym-

pics, during which Neville D'Souza scored a hat-trick, and in 1960 tennis great Ramanathan Krishnan made it to the last-four stage in the Wimbledon men's singles.

Then there's the 1983 cricket World Cup triumph which changed the face of the sport in the country.

P.V. Sindhu's 2019 World Championship badminton gold, chess legend Viswanathan Anand's and boxer Mary Kom's multiple World titles and shooter Abhinav Bindra's 2008 Olympic gold are the country's first in individual sport. And there are Pankaj Advani's multiple titles in cue sport and many more.

Does Neeraj's gold in jave-

lin throw fly high above all these?

"Just check the number of countries taking part and the amount of competition we have to do. Athletics is a global sport, football is a global sport. To win an athletics medal is the toughest.

"I'm not saying that their triumph is any way less, but competition-wise, toughness-wise and acceptancewise, Neeraj's gold is the biggest," says Anju.

V. Baskaran, who led India to the hockey gold at the 1980 Moscow Olympics, disagrees. "We cannot compare this and that, I will not do that. As a gold medallist, I can't say that this is higher than that. That would be un-

fair to the others," said Baskaran, who was also a leading Madras University sprinter decades ago.

Learning process

"But Neeraj won it with authority in his first Olympics and ended a 120-year wait for an athletics medal. (Abhinav) Bindra went through two Olympics before winning gold in his third.

"This win by Neeraj is a learning process for those who have come close to a medal and lost, how an athlete should train and compete.

"This is a new generation, our athletes showed a brave, confident new face. Like golfer Aditi Ashok, who was ranked 200 in the world but narrowly missed a medal and finished fourth, like the hockey teams who fought so well and the men's 4x400m relay team that broke the Asian record. The only events where our confidence level looked low were archery and shooting."

Meanwhile, cricketer Harbhajan Singh feels that Neeraj's gold should be celebrated in a massive way.

"Cricket is a sport played by 12 to 15 countries while the competition is much more at the Olympics. This victory should be celebrated 50 times more than how we celebrated our cricket World Cup triumph," said Harbhajan in a television interview.
